#### Town Council to move home following completion of police station purchase

Shipston Town Council's purchase of the former police station on West Street has been completed. The council hopes to move into the building ahead of its next meeting on 16th April 2012.

As a result of the purchase, Shipston's Safer Neighbourhood Team will be able to remain in the town and has signed a lease to rent space from the town council for nine years. SNT Sergeant for Shipston, Bob Shaw, said: "We are really pleased that the Safer Neighbourhood Team is staying in the town. It shows our commitment to the community and also enables us to continue to strengthen our links with the people of Shipston."

Town Mayor, Paul Rathkey, commented: "I am delighted that Shipston will continue to be policed from Shipston and that the town council has been able to make a prudent investment in the future of this town."

The town council is aiming to occupy the building in early April, and all future council meetings will be held at the new location. In the meantime, the existing Clark House building will be sold or rented.

As before, the SNT base at the former police station will not provide a public access point, and those requiring non emergency policing services should use the Warwickshire Direct public access point at Shipston Library in Church Street.



#### Transition Shipston mounts anti-supermarket campaign

Local environmental group, Transition Shipston, has mounted a campaign to encourage people to object to the proposed supermarket, petrol station and associated housing proposal on the Campden Road.

Following an initial public meeting, which manv turned were away due to an unexpectedly high turnout, group raised concerns about potential impact on the town centre's shops were the proposal to go ahead. The meeting was swiftly followed a shop

window

'blackout' stunt, to highlight to shoppers what shop windows could look like if local traders went out of business.

Local MP, Nadhim Zahawi, who visited Shipston to see the impact of the stunt, commented: "The fact is, that whilst we have to accept the concerns of those in favour of a supermarket and do something about them, opening a large store on the edge of this town is not the solution. A supermarket would destroy Shipston's vibrant high street turning it into the ghost town we see this morning."

Despite opposition to the proposals, there are also many residents in favour of the plans, on the basis that a supermarket may provide cheaper shopping and enable more people to shop closer to home.

The decision on whether to allow planning permission is now with Stratford District Council.

#### Stratford District Council Tax set to be lowest in Warwickshire

District Councillors have now set the district element of the council tax. The council tax from Stratford-upon-Avon District Council for residents for each of the valuation bands is: **A** £85.37, **B** £99.59, **C** £113.82, **D** £128.05, **E** £156.51, **F** £184.96, **G** £213.42, **H** £256.10.

This means that the services provided by the district council will cost £2.46 per week for a Band D household.

#### March's hot topics

**Public referendum:** A public referendum will take place at the request of ten residents in Shipston who are seeking a public meeting to debate the town council's purchase of the police station. Shipston Town Council (STC) has objected to the referendum on the grounds that the purchase has already been made and therefore, spending £1,500-1,800 of public money on this is a waste. However, the town council has confirmed it will happily hold an open day at the police station should that prove to be the will of the public.

**Smarter cemetery:** The railings at the cemetery have been stripped and will be repainted to match the newly sandblasted gates.

**Unhelpful gesture:** STC will look into suitable paints which could discourage graffitti in light of the recent unpleasant drawing added to the Stratford Road bus shelter.

**Clark Close:** Following a request from a resident, STC will investigate the status of the adoption of Clark Close by the highway authority.

**Litter nuisance:** Complaints have been received about litter on the Stratford Road. STC will investigate but residents are urged to use the bins provided or take their litter home.

#### **Campaigning for Shipston**

Core Strategy: Councillors and the public commented on the draft core strategy presented by Stratford District Council. The document highlights target housing numbers to 2028 and identifies associated needs such as infrastructure, employment etc. Principal concerns raised by councillors and the public included lack of emphasis on sustainability, lack of proper consultation with the town council, reliance on potentially flawed studies to reach certain conclusions and the time delay before the document can be adopted which leaves Shipston open to mass development.

The town council agreed to meet again on 26th March to finalise its response to the Core Strategy. Members of the public are also encouraged to respond by 31st March.

**Health and Wellbeing Park:** STC will seek clarity from the Medical Centre and WCC regarding the potential implications of the proposals on the Ellen Badger Hospital, including confirmation of the ownership of the hospital.

**ASL Proposal:** There has been healthy debate about the pros and cons of a supermarket, with strong views expressed on both sides. However, STC remains opposed to the proposal on a number of planning grounds and will be submitting an objection accordingly.

#### **Town Council business**

**Grass cutting victory:** Thanks to careful mapping work and detailed negotiations with the district council, rather than seeing the funding received by the district council reduce to £240, STC will now receive £810. However, this is still a long way short of the actual cost of doing the work.

**Draining time ahead:** Members of the general purposes committee will carry out a visual inspection of the drains in the town before reporting all blocked drains to the county council.

**Housing needs:** STC will investigate the costs of conducting a local housing needs survey.

**Planning meetings:** STC will meet Cala Homes to discuss amendments to its proposals for the Norgren Site. The council will not, however, accept Banner Homes' request for a meeting as no planning application has yet been put forward.

**Finance:** Additional expenditure required to furnish and equip the police station will be managed by the finance committee, up to £10,000. Any items over that amount must be brought back to the full council for discussion.

**Council nominations:** Nominations for those wanting to stand for election to the town council must be received by Stratford District Council by 12 noon on 4th April. Any forms arriving after 12pm or incorrectly filled in will not be counted. For advice, please contact the Town Clerk.



Shipston's achievement builds on their success in reaching the National Finals of this competition last year.


#### **Speakers**



After flipping themselves out of the sea they hurried up the beach to take a shower under an overhanging rock. There was much to enjoy and wonder at in this talk.

#### **District Council update**

At the recent District Council budget meeting it was decided that the SDC part of the Council Tax demand for a Band D household next year will be 1% less than last year. This is due to savings and financial assistance from central government offered to those Councils who do not increase their Council Tax.



It was also agreed to look into the possibility of allocating a percentage of the New Homes Bonus to town and parish councils where development has taken place. This is potentially good news for Shipston.

It has been agreed that the present system of all planning applications being considered by the relevant Area Planning committee should be retained. There had been a move to create a single committee for major planning applications. It is hoped that the planning committee will meet in Shipston for the important plans that are coming forward.

The deadline for submitting responses to the Draft Core Strategy is 30th. March. Submissions may be accepted for a few days after this but check with the SDC web site first. The planning policy officers will now consider all the responses made along with various policy documents and submit a final draft for consultation in autumn this year following approval by the District Council. The Core Strategy will then be considered by a Planning Inspector.

It is intended that the whole process will be signed off in May 2013.

#### **County Council update**

#### **London Road**

The County Council is proposing an extension to the 30 mph speed limit in London Road. A 50 mph limit is



proposed along the dangerous stretch beyond the town boundary.

#### **Stour Court**

If there is no yellow line, there is no parking restriction.

Signs put up around Stour Court have no authority and can be ignored. The highway, including the cul-de-sac up to the garages is adopted by the County Council. Whereas, local residents will require some consideration, no parking enforcement can take place, except where there is a yellow line on the road.

#### **Public Health Agenda**

The county council have held a public interest debate on the future of Public Health services.

Medical Health issues will remain with the NHS, but many Public Health issues transfer to local authorities in April next year

Warwickshire County Council has already appointed a new Director of Public Health to act jointly with the NHS. The new arrangements will help ensure services will now become more directly accountable to the public. Your local councillors can ensure that services become accountable in a way that has not been seen for a long time.


