New Youth Shelter to be installed this month

Shipston's youngsters will soon have a new place to gather and socialise thanks to the combined efforts of the Safer Neighbourhood Team, Shipston Town Council, Stratford District Council and the youngsters themselves.

As previously reported (Shipston Forum, March 2013), the shelter concept was agreed as a priority at a recent Community Forum meeting.

Following the award of a larger than expected grant from the town council last month, PCSO Andy Steventon was tasked with finding out what type of shelter young people really wanted, and finding a suitable solution within a budget of £5,000.

After discussion with students at the High School and youngsters in the town, it became clear that the shelter needed to be inviting and weather-proof, while avoiding a closed structure that would restrict visibility and accessibility.

Following careful research and some impressive bartering by Andy Steventon, a new shelter has been purchased from Sutcliffe Play and is due to be installed mid to late April. The structure has been custom made and finished to match the existing materials at the Skate Park, where the shelter will be installed.

Andy Steventon said "I have been overwhelmed by the amount of support and the speed with which we have been

able to progress this project. I'm delighted we have been able to find the right solution for Shipston's youngsters and would like to thank everyone who has helped this project come to fruition."

Mayor, Fay Ivens, added "Shipston Town Council is very pleased to have been able to fund this shelter as part of our commitment to improving services for younger people. We hope to see the shelter put to good use in the coming months."

Potholes beware – Town Councillors are on the warpath

Shipston Town Councillors are to conduct a thorough assessment of the roads in Shipston after repeated complaints about potholes and blocked drains. The town has been split into ten segments, with most councillors taking on at least one section.

Armed with maps, the councillors will be recording any hazardous potholes that present a danger to road users or which could damage cars or bicycles. The results will be collated by the Town Clerk and fed back to Warwickshire County Council's Highways Department for urgent action.

Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "although we accept that the recent weather conditions have damaged the road surfaces, the number and severity of potholes and blocked drains around Shipston has got out of hand. Despite repeated efforts to get these problems fixed, progress has been slow. We hope that this thorough assessment will encourage the county council to take the necessary action."

Although the audit will focus on potholes, blocked drains and other highways issues will be recorded where possible. In the meantime, residents are encouraged to continue reporting potholes via the county council website at www.warwickshire.gov.uk/potholes or by calling 01926 412515.

Councillors seek a solution for Turbine Blading employees

After operating for almost 40 years in Shipston, Turbine Blading looks set to close with the loss of 64 local jobs. Recognising the impact of the potential closure on the town, a group of town and district councillors and representatives from Stour United Businesses met senior executives of the parent company, General Electric (GE), to discuss options.

GE acknowledged the workforce is highly skilled, loyal and productive and that Shipston is considered a good location. However, a downturn in the market has led to a capacity problem. *Continued on page 2*

At the invitation of the Chairman of Warwickshire County Council we were proud to represent Shipston at his dinner for civic heads at Shire Hall, Warwick.




The guidebook has been compiled by Peter Titchmarsh in memory of his wife, Janet, and is his way of thanking all the Shipston Home




Knitters needed - we're 30 squares from success!

Following its commitment to tackle road safety (March 2013 Forum), Shipston Town Council has agreed additional steps to improve the safety of pedestrians on Stratford Road.

Warwickshire County Council has confirmed that a traffic survey will be undertaken on the Stratford Road before Easter. Alongside the survey, Shipston Town Council will make every effort to secure funding for illuminated slow down signs on both sides of the Stratford Road, including applications to the two developers due to build developments on the edge of the town, an application to next year's county council member fund, and a request via Stratford District Council for Section 106 money.


In the meantime, councillors agreed to fund a temporary 'know your speed' sign for 12 months at Stratford Road, visible to traffic coming into the town.

(Continued from page 1) GE has confirmed that it is open to written offers for acquiring the business, which would see the land retained for industrial use. Any such offers should be sent to GE's Business Development Section as soon as possible.

The group of community representatives were given assurances that should staff be made redundant, offers of redeployment would be considered and the fullest possible careers advice would be provided.

At the time of going to press, no further details had been announced but the group intend to meet with GE again once the future of the plant becomes clear. Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "our meeting was productive and left GE in no doubt as to the impact closure will have on Shipston. I sincerely hope that an alternative solution can be found."

March's hot topics

Recycling removal: The recycling bins at the Sheldon Bosley Hub have been removed following consistent dumping of household rubbish. Residents are urged not to take any recycling or other rubbish to the Hub from now on, as it will not be collected.

No butts: Following concerns raised by Jackie Warner about cigarette butts mounting up outside the Falcon, the Town Clerk will write to all pubs to remind them to keep the pavements outside their properties clean.

Stratford Road development: A number of residents raised concerns about the planned development of 15 houses on the Stratford Road. Specifically, there were fears that the new dwellings would be too close to existing properties on River Way, that some would be built too close to the floodplain and that many existing gardens will be overlooked by the new verandas proposed. Town Councillors expressed sympathy with the issues raised, although the site does already have outline planning permission. After some discussion, councillors voted to support the planning application.

Forum fury: Councillors and members of the public expressed concern that delivery of the Forum was becoming increasingly patchy. The Forum should be tucked inside the Midweek newspaper and delivered on the last Tues or Weds of the month. The newspaper group has taken some action to resolve known issues but residents are encouraged to continue reporting non-deliveries to the Town Clerk. Please call 01608 662180 if you haven't received a copy. Spare copies can be collected from New Clark House or downloaded via www.shipstononline.org. In the meantime, the Communications Working Group will consider alternative delivery options.

Parents' parking: Following complaints from the police, Shipston Town Council will write to Shipston Primary School to request that parents be encouraged to park more courteously, particularly on the Driftway.

Slow progress with Orbit: Concerns were raised by town and district councillors that Orbit residents were experiencing problems in getting the housing association to solve issues such as lack of hot water in some properties.

Campaigning for Shipston

Neighbourhood Plan: Councillors were joined by a small number of members of the public at a drop-in session on 9th March. Feedback is being collated alongside previous input and a report will be submitted to the next Steering Group committee meeting.

Tackling Turbine Blading: District and town councillors, alongside Stour United Businesses representatives, met with the key decision makers at Turbine Blading to understand the reason for the plant's planned closure (see page 1).

Part-night street lighting: Part-night street lighting will begin in Shipston on 1st April. Town councillors remain strongly opposed to the plans and are still collecting signatures for a petition which they hope to present to Warwickshire County Council at its March Full Council meeting.

Town Council business

Asbestos report: Town Councillors voted to fund an asbestos report for the Sports and Social Club prior to work being undertaken to install new beer pumps.

Shipston Charities reappointed: Shipston Charities is a small charity managing a group of ancient charities dating back to the 1500s. Their focus is on alleviating poverty within Shipston. Following a request by the charity, STC has reappointed Richard Taylor and James Little as its two nominative trustees.

Drainage works: The new drainage system is now in place at the Shoulder Way Allotments and has already alleviated the flooding problem being experienced by a neighbour.

Shipston's larger Cooperative Food Store is planning a major



refit. The store manager has informed us that the improvements will see the existing store stripped back to a shell, with long term issues such as the flooring and chilling cabinets given a complete overhaul.

Due to the extensiveness of the refit, the store will need to close for a period of approximately 12 days. At the time of going to press, the store anticipated closing on the 20th April, reopening on the 2nd May.

Arrangements have been made to provide Paypoint services at the smaller Co-Operative Store for the duration of the temporary closure.

It provides 24 hour palliative care to children aged 0 to 5 years, and specialist one-to-one care to children who suffer from life limiting and life threatening conditions.



The Trust covers the Coventry and Warwickshire area and provides regular short-term care to the children, to enable their parents to have a much-needed break. The trust's annual running costs are £75,000 and they rely totally on donations from public support.





Cookies was able to start in Shipston simply because local enterprise is not stifled by aggressive supermarket pricing competition to the detriment of local entrepreneurs.

A Supermarket in Shipston will not end the recession but it will stifle and destroy Shipston's unique shopping centre.

To anyone wanting a Supermarket, ask yourself this: what do you want your children to grow up with? A thriving local community or a desolate town square?

And if your child wants to start up a business, it certainly would not be in a rundown Shipston.

Firstly, supermarkets are predatory creatures - their aim is to be the sole supplier in their catchment area. They will sell products at a loss until they shut down any competition. Once that is achieved, up go the prices.

Secondly, there is the location. Are mothers with toddlers, and the elderly, without cars, going to enjoy walking up there on a cold wet day when the town centre is all but closed down?

Thirdly, even if every car in the town and surrounding area fills up an empty tank every week, which is unlikely, that is nothing near the amount of fuel to warrant the cost running a petrol station to a supermarket. The majority of traffic in this area is on the Fosse Way, all passing traffic. How will they know it's there?

Finally jobs. It's unlikely anywhere near 200 would ever be achieved, it's doubtful Tesco in Stratford employs anything like that and they're open 24hrs. This is mostly developers' and politicians' dreams.

Shipston Town Council held a Planning Group meeting on Monday, 25th February. Prior notice of this meeting was put on the notice board outside New Clark House. So the Council can claim that they have complied with their obligations. I do look at the Shipston web site from time to time, but notice of the above meeting was not shown.

I understand that although members of the public can attend the meeting, they are not specifically invited. There was one item, the proposed development on Stratford Road adjacent to River Way in which I had a particular interest. A reminder has been issued to bus pass holders to ensure that they have a valid pass on April 1.



New bus passes have been sent out automatically, but some pass holders may not have received them because they have moved house and it has been sent to an old address, or because the county council does not have a copy of a photograph of the applicant.

Anyone who does not have a valid pass on April 1 may not be allowed to travel, so it is important to ensure WCC has the correct information to renew each bus pass. Pass holders can get in touch by visiting the Warwickshire Direct One Stop Shop at Shipston Library or by calling 01926 418026.

Bogus HMRC emails

WCC's Trading Standards team has been warning residents not to respond to bogus emails that falsely claim to come from HMRC relating to tax credit 'refunds'.

Warwickshire Trading Standards has received complaints from consumers who received these unexpected emails asking them to follow a link in the email to obtain their 'refund'. In reality the refunds do not exist and the emails are sent in order to steal personal or financial information.

Patient Survey results

Many thanks to all the patients who completed our patient survey at the end of last year. We had 318 responses, which represents comments from 2.7% of patients registered with us.

We were very pleased to hear that over 80% of patients surveyed were able to get an appointment with the GP of their choice within a week. Additionally the vast majority of those surveyed felt that the doctor they saw was very good at making them feel at ease; listening to them; assessing their condition; explaining the condition and treatment and involving them in decisions about their care. In fact 100% of respondents felt they were confident in the Doctor's ability to provide care.

Those completing the survey were asked for their comments about the things that they felt could be improved about the service we provide. There were some really great suggestions and in response we have already changed the message on our phone system. We also have plans to:

- look at whether it is possible to improve the clarity of the tannoy in the waiting room
- improve our systems for identifying patients with hearing

difficulties and visual impairment so we can be more sensitive to their needs



- improve our processes for advising patients when clinicians are running late
- continue to lobby the NHS for new, larger premises with better car parking facilities.

The presence of Bobby the cat in the waiting room was a significant theme in the feedback. Whilst we recognise that many patients enjoy his company, it is not appropriate for a cat to be in a healthcare environment, and we are concerned about the risk of patients falling over him. A significant proportion of our patients do not like cats or are allergic to them. We therefore would very much appreciate the help of all our patients in keeping Bobby out of the building.


