## Housing report provides insight into Shipston's record growth


Figures presented by the Neighbourhood Plan team at the October town council meeting paint a startling picture of rapid housing growth and population change in Shipston. Presented alongside the results of an independent survey into current housing needs, the figures suggest that Shipston will continue to grow more rapidly than the county and national average, with a larger percentage of the population being over 65 when compared with other areas.

The Neighbourhood Plan's Housing Group has analysed household and population figures over time in order to try and predict likely changes over the next 20 years.

Statistics show there has been a significant increase in population since World War II. In addition, the average size of households has reduced from three people per house to two as single adult households become more prevalent.

Shipston's under 16 population has been declining as a percentage of the total population. The median age in Shipston is older than those of the district, county and country as a whole which has implications for health and transport needs.

Using a combination of historical data and national population trends, the NP team believes Shipston could be heading towards a third of the population being 65+ by 2021.



The team also demonstrated that the rate of housing growth in Shipston is much higher than in other areas, with over 100% growth in the period from 1981 to 2011. Taking into consideration the permissions already

granted, this sharp growth trajectory looks set to continue, with the number of households rising to 3000 by 2021 if the current development proposals under review go ahead.

Ed Jackson, Housing Group representative, said: "With the expected demographic changes, we need to think carefully about the infrastructure the town will require. Health and transport needs are particularly key, but we may also need to be considering small scale practical changes such as dedicated parking for mobility scooters in the town."

Alongside this analysis, Warwickshire Rural Community Council conducted an independent survey into housing needs in Shipston. The survey found that there was a current need for approximately 50 houses of varying sizes to meet local demand, of which 24 would be local market housing, 24 housing association rented and two shared ownership. How and where these homes could be found will be considered as part of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Mayor, Philip Vial, said: "We are grateful to both Warwickshire Rural Community Council and the Neighbourhood Plan team for providing such informative reports. Our town has faced considerable pressure from developers in recent years and there is no sign of a let up with ASL submitting a new application in mid October for 95 houses on a new site on the Campden Road.

"Not only do we need to work together as a community to ensure future development is appropriate and sustainable, we need to address current and future infrastructure needs to ensure we meet the changing demands of existing residents."


There is also good news that the hard work of the Sports Club may soon result in a significant improvement in its facilities.

#### Remembrance Sunday will mark the 100th anniversary of WW1

#### Latest news on proposed large-scale developments

RCA Consulting, the agents acting for David Wilson Homes, have presented the findings from a recent public consultation about the proposed development of 93 houses off Shoulderway Lane

The results indicate just nine per cent of respondents support housing development in Shipston. Eighty-nine per cent of respondents do not support the principle of housing development on the Shoulderway Lane, with a further 8% unsure. However, 70% felt there was a need for additional healthcare provision in Shipston, although only 20% felt the Shoulderway Site could accommodate a new surgery.

In response to feedback at the consultation event, the number of proposed houses has been amended to 93 to minimise overlooking, and changes have been made to deal with concerns about run-off water and flood risk.

RCA confirmed that should the development go ahead, Shoulderway Lane would be widened to a 5.5 metre road, including a footpath. The work would affect the side of the road where housing already exists.

Concerns were raised by councillors about the strength of public opposition to the site and the long term sustainability of another large scale development. A planning application has not yet been submitted but is expected in the coming weeks.

In other development news, the Planning Inspector has announced plans to review both ASL applications for the land on the north side of Campden Road in March. In addition, the District Council is to re-examine the proposed Orbit Homes development on London Road in light of the district's five year housing supply.

More detail about the latest ASL application on the south side of the Campden Road will be reported in next month's Forum.

#### October's hot topics

**Lumpy tarmac:** Residents from Springfield Road have reported concerns about tree routes pushing the Tarmac up. The Town Clerk will follow up with the Highways Department.

**Riverside walk:** Sheelagh Saunders reported progress being made on establishing a riverside walk. There are mixed views from landowners and some landscaping help on the cards. Further news will be shared when known.

**Housing concerns:** A member of the public raised concerns about the impact of the proposed development off Shoulderway Lane.

**Polling station location:** Having looked at the turnout figures in recent years, councillors have supported keeping the polling station at the Sheldon Bosley Hub. Although slightly out of town, parking provision is good and the turnout has improved in recent years.

#### Campaigning for Shipston

**Dementia awareness workshop:** The town council is working with the medical centre and other stakeholders to arrange a dementia awareness session for service providers, councillors and local businesses in January as part of Shipston's 'Dementia-Friendly town' campaign. The date will be advertised nearer the time.

**Gyratory Garden:** The Town Council will purchase the Gyratory Garden land from the Highways Agency for £2,000 to secure the site as open space for the public. This is in response to a letter from the HA notifying the council that if it did not wish to purchase the land, it would be sold on the open market.

**Shipston Young Firefighters:** Thanks to a coordinated effort including town and district councillors, parents and children, Shipston Young Firefighters will continue but as a new charity in its own right. For details see page 4.

**A welcoming sign:** Shipston's Tourism Group is proposing new signs for some of the entrances to the town, particularly the London Road entrance where the current sign is particularly poor. General Purposes will seek quotes for the signs for further discussion.

#### **Town Council business**

**Council vacancies:** The town council has two vacancies. There has not been a request for an election so the council can co-opt new members. With a full council election taking place in May 2015, new members will only be co-opted for a short period of time. For details see page 10.

**Boundary changes:** The proposed changes to county council patch boundaries will have minimal impact on Shipston as the ward remains unchanged.

**Noisy drains:** The town council joined a district council enforcement officer to inspect noise disturbance being caused by a drainage grate at the entrance to the Rugby Club. The noise is significant and work is needed to remedy the issue. The council is clarifying who will be responsible for the repairs.

**CCTV provision:** The Mayor is due to attend a meeting to understand the statistics behind CCTV provision, including analysing the impact of 24 hour surveillance. The outcome will feed into any future discussions about CCTV funding.

#### Can you read this?\*

We're so used to reading road signs, books,

newspapers, birthday cards, emails, labels in supermarkets, that most of us never give it a second thought. But what if we couldn't make out any of the hundreds of messages that appear in front of us every day? It would be like being outsiders in an alien world.

But the shocking truth is that one in twenty adults in this country have exactly that problem. They've never learned to read. Usually it's because for one reason or another in their childhood, they couldn't get on at school.

As adults, they often feel ashamed, and go to great lengths to hide their lack of understanding.

Read Easy teaches adults to read, not in a class, but one-to-one. Everyone who wants to learn has their own individual teacher. This means that learning progresses at the reader's own pace, and most important, the whole process remains private.

Read Easy is now looking for adults in Shipston-on-Stour who'd like to meet one of our reading coaches, find out more and perhaps start to learn.

Of course, as you'll now have realised, it's not easy to get in touch with those who might benefit from our scheme. For

a start, this article is just a jumble of squiggles to them. So that's where we need your help.

### **District Council update**

#### **Shipston Young Firefighters**

It is good to begin with positive news that about the future of Shipston Young Firefighters. I convened a meeting with the Fire Service and parents to hammer out an agreement to transfer the operation to a local group of parents and volunteers. The group and the young firefighters are determined to make this succeed.



#### Roy Munden

I would like to pay tribute to Roy Munden who has sadly passed away. Roy made a huge contribution not just on the Town Council but in the community, caring for people, and as a football referee working with young people. His infectious humour and kindness will be greatly missed.

#### **Planning issues**

I oppose a pending application to build 93 homes on Shoulderway Lane. I am concerned about environmental issues, road access and the proximity of the proposed homes to Hawthorn Way. In my opinion it is regrettable that this site was identified for potential development by the district. As one site had to be identified, it would have been better to choose the proposed supermarket site instead, bearing in mind the level of local support for that development.

A staggering  $\mathfrak{L}141,000$  has already been spent by the Council on the supermarket appeal. Now the Inspector is reopening the inquiry next March to hear "new evidence" on the District's housing supply. In my opinion this is unnecessary as 70% of the housing would be extra-care housing which is needed according to the recent Shipston Housing Needs Survey because of the ageing of the population.

#### **Top Winter Health Tips**

There always seems to be more illness around during winter, so take precautions to keep well. Wash your hands regularly to help prevent colds, as this kills any bugs you might have picked up. Sore throats are common in winter and are almost always caused by viral infections. Gargling with warm salty water will help sooth a sore throat as it has anti-inflammatory properties.

Asthmatics can experience worsened symptoms as the weather gets colder, so try and stay indoors on cold windy days. Use a scarf to cover your nose and mouth if you do need to go out. Make sure you take your regular inhalers and have your rescue inhaler nearby, in case it is needed.

#### Flu - symptoms and management

Flu starts with a raised temperature, fever, headache, muscle aches and chestiness. There is no cure. The virus has to run its course. To help relieve symptoms in adults:

Stay somewhere where the temperature is even and drink plenty of fluids

Taking regular doses of paracetamol, according to guidelines on

the packet, will relieve headaches and help reduce the fever.

Ibuprofen 200mg x 1 or 2 every 4-6 hours will help relieve muscular pain



It is safe to take both paracetamol and ibuprofen at the same time, but please do not exceed the dosage on the packet. Do be careful when taking cold and flu remedies, as these often have paracetamol in them.

The symptoms of flu can continue for up to two weeks, although the fever should resolve in 3 to 5 days. If you think you have flu, please avoid infecting other people by covering your nose when you sneeze and by washing your hands regularly.

Contact your GP if your symptoms have got much worse, or you have developed other symptoms that are not typical of seasonal flu, such as a rash, your symptoms have lasted for longer than a week or you have a medical condition that is making your flu worse.
