Internal Audit of Shipston on Stour Town Council for the year 2020-2021

It will be noted that in the Annual Internal Audit Report 2020/21 page 5 for Shipston on Stour Town Council, Section 2 – Accounting Statements 2020/21 the year end brought forward balance differs by the sum of £108,771 (one hundred and eight thousand seven hundred and seventy-one pounds).

As a part of the internal audit process for 2019/20 a number of transactions were identified relating to Shipston Wool Fair and Shipston Area Flood Action Group which should not have been processed within the Town Council accounting system as they are not formally under the Town Council's direct control, any grants received were not obtained in the name of the Town Council and expenditure is not presented for approval by the Town Council.

In addition to the processing of the payments and receipts, items have been included with the Town Council's VAT returns resulting in an overclaim of £23,654.83 between June 2015 and September 2019. It should be noted that bank accounts exist for both of these entities and identification and clarification as to the amounts owing is easily identifiable.

I can now confirm that the required remedial steps have been taken by the Town Council to remove these items from the accounts and to ensure that going forward transactions for these entities will not be processed within the Town Council's accounting system. This process has meant a reduction in the brought forward position as recorded in paragraph 1 which relates to the cash balances on the accounts relating to these two entities.
