Let's celebrate VE Day at 80

A party, music, beacon-lighting and a declaration by Winston Churchill! Shipston will be celebrating the 80th anniversary of VE (Victory in Europe) Day in style on 8th May with a whole day of activities. It's all been arranged by the local branch of the Royal British Legion, supporting the town council.

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Mayor's column

Dear Shipston,

Bryony and I have been very busy, as civic activities have become more frequent as the Mayoral year moves to its conclusion.

The civic dinner hosted by Judith Clarke, Mayor of Royal Leamington Spa, was held in the luxuriant setting of the Jephson Gardens Glasshouse; Dave Skinner's civic dinner at the Court House, Warwick and Angela John's civic dinner at the Bowling Green in Southam were equally enjoyable occasions. The County Chairman's civic dinner at the Gaydon Motor Museum is an interesting finale.

We are looking forward to the celebrations on the 80th anniversary of VE day marking the end of World War II in Europe, with a packed schedule on 8th of May. You can find details posted elsewhere in this edition. I would like to thank Mr and Mrs Withers of Whaddon Farm for allowing us all once again to enjoy the lighting of the beacon on Whaddon Hill at 9.30pm.

I have still to hear from the Integrated Care Board regarding the next steps and stakeholder engagement in the study forum on the health needs of our rural community. While waiting for this I feel it is important for all of us to consider the increasing number of elderly people in our local population. According to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA), falls are the number one priority. They have lots of useful information about fall prevention on their website: https://www.rospa.com/campaigns-and-fundraising/fall-prevention. Older people typically experience more falls and worse consequences because of adverse health conditions associated with biological ageing. However, we can all benefit from advice to reduce the occurrence of slips, trips and falls. For example, it has been drawn to my attention that gravel from driveways can find its way onto the pavement and be an unintentional hazard to pedestrians. A little bit of astute observation and thoughtful clearing up could prevent a nasty accident.

The Town Council had a very useful discussion about the devolution white paper and local government reorganisation into unitary and combined authorities with Cllr Isobel Seccombe, leader of Warwickshire County Council, just before the April town council meeting. Both County and District Councillors are actively engaged in crafting the new structures of local government. Clearly, many questions have still to be answered about the role of town and parish councils in the eventual arrangements. Everyone agreed it was important to keep the dialogue going as this activity proceeds.

Bryony and I are looking forward to attending the Stour Singers' 50th anniversary concert on the 10th May as our last official engagement. We have enjoyed our year in your service as Mayor and Mayoress, and all the other engagements we have been able to take part in.

It now remains for me to wish you all a safe and secure future in our amazing town as I prepare to hand on the role of Chair and Town Mayor to a new incumbent at the town council meeting on 12th May.

News from Shipston Town Council's April meeting

Civic Service

Councillors praised the Mayor's Civic Service and especially the performances from the shanty singers and the young people who took part. The event raised £277 for the First Responders.

Banking

Cllr Williams has discussed banking for the town with Link. The organisation has turned down the request to have a banking hub for the town. He will challenge their process and inaccurate information and will make a formal complaint. Cllr Barker is to email the County Council's economic development function to seek any help. The Warwickshire Rural Council is also supportive.

Environment and Flood Action

Cllr H Kelly attended a meeting with our MP and Severn Trent to discuss flooding and said Shipston Flood Action Group (SAFAG) made a very good case for its approach and methods. Izzy Seccombe has also praised SAFAG's work as an exemplar at national level. SAFAG will be leafleting areas of town affected by flooding to offer useful advice and information. Repair work to dams on Pig Brook will be carried out in May.

Funds have been awarded from Stratford District Council for hedge-laying, putting up bird boxes and a noticeboard in Cornmill Meadows. The organisers of Great Big Green Week have requested a food truck be allowed on Little Rec on 7th June, which was approved subject to licenses and insurance.

General purposes and assets

Work is now going ahead to repair the twin chapel roofs. Quotes to repair the damaged church wall have been received and work will go ahead. A holly tree that is spreading across graves including that of Ellen Badger will also be managed. Councillors are working hard to help get a facility in place for the Youth Club by September. The skatepark has been identified as needing repair and quotations for the work have been received.

District Council

Cllr Passingham is checking whether the application for the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) at the school is still live. Town councillors showed preference for any MUGA to be located at the Hub. Cllr Passingham has asked Atkins for a costing for the Shaping Travel in Shipston to be included in the Local Plan.

Blue light report

Shipston First Responders have received 101 callouts this year so far, 34 in category 1 (life-threatening). There were eight defibrillator activations and there have been new installations in the villages.

Council is still seeking more volunteers to help deliver the Forum.

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Ellen Badger

The new building is due to be finished in June. Nothing has been heard back from the Integrated Care Board about rural health needs.

High School

Work on the next phase of the new sports hall is now due to start in September.

Open Forum

Following a request from resident Liz Cameron about concern over an over-large lime tree near Station Road, the town council is to confirm the tree is on its list of assets.

Planning

Council proposed no representations to permissions sought for properties in Furze Hill Road, Bosley Close and Hanson Avenue.

Sainsburys is appealing the decision of Stratford District Council, which rejected the supermarket's application on the basis of:

- unacceptable impact on the character of the area
- unattractiveness of proposed elevation
- parking layout
- proximity of service yard to residences.

Town Council will restate its original objections concerning:

- HGV routing
- necessary improvements to the Darlingscote/Fosseway junction given further fatalities here
- speed limit on Darlingscote Road
- no cycle lane provision
- proximity of service yard to Brickfield Close
- timing of deliveries given proximity of the school

while adding that businesses in town have since closed, citing the threat posed by Sainsburys.




Update from Beds for Badger campaign



We have received further clarification of the ICB's Neighbourhood Integrated Health Approach and six core components:

1. Population health management. Developing linked datasets for comprehensive health analysis to inform care delivery.



- 3. Standardising community health services. Integrating community health services into neighbourhood health plans to ensure seamless, coordinated care.
- 4. Neighbourhood multi-disciplinary teams (MDTs). Forming proactive teams to provide a comprehensive holistic approach and coordinated care for complex cases.
- 5. Integrated intermediate care with a 'home first' approach. Offering short-term rehabilitation and recovery services at home to maintain independence.
- 6. Urgent neighbourhood services. Aligning community response and virtual ward services to local demand, ensuring timely interventions and reducing unnecessary hospital admissions.

The ICB confirmed that 'the impact of living in rural areas was heard very strongly in the feedback from the consultation and the need for locally based services.' Also, that 'the ICB are committed to using Shipston and the surrounding areas as a pilot for how this approach could be tailored to rural needs and to working with the local community to ensure that local voices shape future service development, and that Shipston remains connected to the wider health and care system.'

You may wonder if this will get beyond a talking shop. Especially as ICBs are in major reorganisation at present. This may free up resources that can be redeployed to the above activity. Or it may not. For this reason, we are progressing with seeking potential engagement with suitable stakeholders from Primary, Secondary and Community care organisations in support of an Integrated Local Healthcare Model aligned to the above.

Lastly, in case the above fail, and they might, we must seriously consider taking the amply demonstrated will of the people through our democratic representatives to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Services in a process known as a 'call in'.

Do you look after someone?

NHS England describes a carer as 'anyone, including children and adults, who looks after a family member, partner or friend who needs help because of their illness, frailty, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction and cannot cope without their support. The care they give is unpaid.'

There are many unpaid carers in our local area. Many people don't think of themselves as carers; they just look after someone close to them. Caring often just happens to you, as you find that someone close to you gradually needs more help.

Becoming a carer can feel isolating and it's often a struggle to get the information you need.

When you are looking after someone, it's important to have some help and support for yourself, such as a break from caring. As a carer, it is important that you look after your own health; it is easy not to look after yourself when you are looking after someone else.

Here at Shipston Medical Centre we want to be able to do all we can to try to help you to stay as fit and healthy as possible. We will do our best to help you look after yourself as well as the person you care for. For example, we are keen to offer flu vaccinations to carers each Autumn, help you develop a plan for care if something happens to you and can support you in ensuring you get any benefits you are entitled to. If you consider yourself to be a carer, please let us know and we can arrange an initial telephone appointment with one of our carer champions to see what we can do to help you.


Great Big Green Week


Get ready for Shipston's Great Big Green Week 7-15th June

Museum honours VE Day

The 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day is marked on 8th May. As it is such a momentous moment in our history, our museum is opening its doors for this special occasion and invites you to see our Shipston Remembers display.

Our collection recognises local people, from the Women's Land Army to the Royal Flying Corps and the Home Guard. The cabinets include memorial plaques, medals, and civil defence leaflets. One highlight is the rare example of a Royal Flying Corps tunic, the uniform prior to the RAF. Not surprisingly this is fragile since it was last worn over 100 years ago.

Items such as this are too delicate and precious to touch, but we also have some 'handling' items like the VE Day and D-Day newspapers to look at and some ration books, war food recipes and cards. All are reproductions and touchable!







Probus

Cornwall's communication heritage

Probus member John Moyle has had an unusual career; having started with Mullards radio valve company he changed to medicine, subsequently working in the hospice movement and palliative care. In retirement, John researched the history of Cornish communications for a PhD.

The invention of the Morse code, and using copper wires to transmit messages, introduced the 'copper era' in the 19th century. This was a great advance but restricted to land only, until the development of submarine cables. A cable station was built in 1870 at Porthcurno in west Cornwall, but messages were limited by the technology of the cables: the early transmission managed about four words every minute.

Copper cables were superseded by wireless communication. Marconi is attributed with the first wireless transmission across the Atlantic. During World War II, three to four hundred words per minute could be sent from West Cornwall to America.

With the onset of the space age, Goonhilly Downs Satellite Earth Station on the Lizard Peninsular has over 60 satellite dishes; a location chosen despite the advice of Marconi who claimed: 'it is a bog, do not use'. On the north coast of Cornwall, near Bude, GCHQ has a satellite receiving station on high isolated cliffs, all very top secret!

Probus members thanked John for a fascinating, well-illustrated presentation and pressed him with many questions until the bar opened followed by our usual most satisfying lunch.

Shipston Literary Society

When it comes to telling a story, Dame Prof Karin Barber can really cast a spell over her listening audience. At times she had members of the Shipston and District Literary Society in fits of laughter, at times she had us concentrating, at all times she held our attention.

Karin, who is Emeritus Professor of African Cultural Anthropology at Birmingham University and Visiting Professor of Anthropology at the London School of Economics, lived and worked for 11 years in southwest Nigeria. It was here that she obtained her PhD, researching the oral culture of African peoples – storytelling and theatre. Her research was based on the Yoruba people in her part of Nigeria, but referenced all parts of the continent.



Storytelling and performance came before written literature in all cultures. Even before beginning to write a book, you must have a good story to tell. But storytelling is much more complex than that and is still just as strong today as when the Yoruba were telling tales around the fire generations ago. Think about when you read stories to your young children and take on all the voices of all the characters. You're not just reading words written in a book. By giving a performance, you are bringing the tale to life. And look closely at modern day rap music, she said. The performer is giving a tale of life on the street, or the condition parts of society find themselves in, told in an emotional and powerful way.

She spoke about how storytelling has evolved and is

evolving. Globally, it was once the most powerful means of communication, then fell out of favour and is now seeing a revival. The renewed form is not the same as the old storytelling, for example in the Yoruba region a new travelling theatre is becoming increasingly popular. A band of young actors travels from region to region and puts on spontaneous performances, referencing people and events in the villages and towns they visit. Often they satirise bad behaviour and local wrongdoing.

It was a fascinating evening well spent.

Our programme of speakers has now finished for the year and will restart in September. For the summer we have our social gatherings, from our ever-popular cheese and wine event through to the annual outing, this year to Canons Ashby in Northamptonshire. The AGM, when our new programme will be announced, is in August at the Tredington Community Hall and will be followed by a lunch.



Astronomical Society News

The Stratford-upon-Avon Astronomical Society meets every first and third Tuesday at 8pm (doors open at 7.30pm) at Alderminster Village Hall.



Adrian Wakeham sets out what to look out for this month.

As the days lengthen, and the nights shorten, the astronomy opportunities lessen but we must make the best of what's available.

The obvious constellations are Leo the Lion (although it looks

more like a flat iron or mouse) and Virgo (the Y) which is dominated by the bright white star Spica. If you head backwards up towards the Plough's panhandle, you'll see the bright yellow star Arcturus, which is the nearest red giant star just over 36 light years away.

Two planets will be dominant. In the evening, Mars, which is the pink star closest to Gemini's stars Castor and Pollux. On the third of May Mars will be closest to the Beehive Cluster (which is just visible to the naked eye, but is a beautiful sight in binoculars). The "star" of the morning is the planet Venus emerging from the glare of the Sun. On the 22nd to 24th, Venus, Saturn and the Moon are all in close proximity. Please make sure that the Sun is below the horizon, you can then use binoculars to reveal the crescent shape of Venus.

It's a privilege to be a county councillor. It's not always easy and you're not always popular. I can say that I always do my best, and to anyone who has ever asked for help, you will know my mantra is that the hungry, homeless and abused always take precedence. We do live in a difficult time where change seems constant and the 'system' seems pitched against us, so I seem to be asked for help more than ever.

I first agreed to stand as a county councillor because I thought there had to be a way through the bureaucracy and waste. I still think that, and have redoubled my efforts to challenge wasteful practices, but it can be like wading through treacle.

I have given this preamble for two reasons. First, it is harder than ever to encourage people to put themselves forward in public positions. As I write there are two vacancies on Shipston Town Council - again. The commitment and responsibility can feel overwhelming at times, for volunteers, but we have great staff and a can-do attitude and I find the cooperation in our lovely town to be inspiring. We also have fun! The second reason is more personal. I enjoy what I do, even when I get brickbats thrown at me (though I might moan about it - ask my husband!) I truly believe that there is a better way of doing government, at whatever level. I have been encouraged over the last few months of campaigning with the amazing conversations I have had with you.

So here are a few examples of what local people are thinking and my thoughts

'Why do all these road works take so long?' Over complicated arrangements for short term fixes - do we really need this many traffic lights?

'Why can't my child take the school bus?' You opt for the choice you want for your child and if WCC does not support your application for a bus place you have to pay. Choice is there by law, but the unintended consequence is the potential cost or need to take your child to school. This is just one example of not thinking things through to their logical consequence which drives us

'How come we are being asked to have another 3,000 homes built here?' Arbitrary numbers applied across the board, ignoring the obvious - such as Fell Mill is a floodplain (clue is in the name) - or that any more sewage in our system will mean we are wading in it. I know I have become obsessed by what is not us under our feet, but I am afraid it is obvious that not many decision makers is not us!

'Why do I have to wait so long for my carer to come?' We need to value carers and their profession. We don't do so properly and even though we do our best we all need to think of the real value (and cost). Let's try and get them spread less thin.

The big news this month is (not the election!) we can now put all that pesky plastic wrapping in our recycling bin! Of course, it's better to buy less stuff with less packaging, but sometimes it can't be avoided. These are the new items that Warwickshire now recycles:



Plastic bags (including those used for fruit and veg, frozen food, bread, cereal); confectionery wrappers (including those used for sweets, biscuits, cakes, ice cream, and chewing gum); foil lined packaging (including crisp and snack packets and coffee bags); plastic film and sleeves; outer wrappings (including for fish, meat, and cheese); bubble wrap (max 1m sections); cling film; and fruit and veg net bags.

Remember all recycling needs to be rinsed – strictly no food in your rubbish or recycling bins; scrape it all into your food

And if this means your recycling bin starts to overflow, you can put any extra in a rigid container, cardboard box, or clear plastic bag. All items will be separated for sorting at the recycling facility in Coventry, so it should all be loose within the recycling bins. Also, next to your bins, you can put in separate bags; textiles, household batteries, and small

Hopefully, your black bins will be emptier, but the following still needs to go in there: sachets and pouches, polystyrene, foam, blister packs, crisp tubes, disposable nappies.

Recycling is something Stratford District can be proud of. We are third in England, recycling 61% of our household

A total of 6,084 people responded to the South Warks Local Plan. I know a good number of them were from Shipston, so we wait until the winter to see if they still think Shipston can 'strategically grow'.
