Memories and celebrations for VE Day at 80

'We should be renamed Shipston-on-Telly!' joked museum trustee Stephen Hartley after the BBC Midlands Today made the town the centrepiece of its coverage of the 80th anniversary of VE Day



on 8th May. Reporter Joan Cummins interviewed residents, including Doreen Knapton, 101, who remembered 'doing her bit' by working in the town's munitions factory. Bernard Maguire reminisced about the original VE celebrations while Graham Wilkes recalled the figure of Hitler on top of the celebratory bonfire.



Eighty years on, the blazing beacon lit up the night sky once more at the end of a day of events which began early with the Town Crier's proclamation and a wreath-laying ceremony at the Gyratory memorial.

Town Council news

News from Shipston Town Council's May meeting

New mayor voted in

Mayor-Making was the main item on the agenda of the Town Council meeting on 12th May. Town crier Marion Lowe introduced proceedings with a flourish, and then the annual change of Mayor took place. Outgoing Mayor John Dinnie proposed Tony Booth as his successor. The nomination was unanimously supported by all members of the council. Cllr Booth



then read his declaration of office, and the mayoral chain was duly handed over. The next step was the appointment of the Deputy Mayor, and the nomination of Cllr Richard Walters was again accepted unanimously.

Tribute to John Dinnie

Tony Booth paid tribute to his predecessor with a brief reflection on his time in office. He thanked John Dinnie for his work during a year which has not been without challenges, and said he had steered the ship smoothly, overseeing more efficient ways of working at the Council and a transition to a new office team, as well as being a welcome presence at many events and in his support for the businesses in town. He said John had shown unwavering commitment to the cause of the Ellen Badger hospital with his work for the Beds4Badger group as he navigated his conflicting position between campaigning, his council remit and his neutral position as Mayor, always showing compassion and drive to do the right thing. He concluded by saying the council was now in a better



position to take on the fresh challenges which he anticipated will include health, emergency services, the waste disposal site and local planning but there was also much to look forward to in the town's many events, which this year will include the anniversary celebrations of VJ Day in August.

Tony ended by saying 'I hope I will do you proud in taking on the mantle and will continue to support our amazing town and community.'

Thanks from John

John Dinnie thanked all the councillors, saying that every single one had always stepped up when asked to help out, even if they had disagreed. He thanked the council staff, including Helen Morgan who has now retired, for her invaluable knowledge.

Councillor G Kelly also finally received his medal of recognition for his time as Mayor from 2023-24.

Meet the new mayor

Tony Booth has lived in Shipston for over 20 years. An RAF baby born in Lincolnshire, Tony was educated mainly in Stratford. He and his wife Jane moved to the town from Buckingham and have brought up four children here. Emily, James, Oliver and Maria all attended Shipston High School and Jane works at Kitebrook School. Tony, who works in procurement for Jaguar Land Rover, has always given

his time to volunteer in the town. He has been Scout Leader, as well as a Youth Leader. The First Responders is a cause close to his heart, and he has volunteered with these vital local lifesavers for 13 years.

Tony has chosen Shipston Youth Club as his main charitable cause to support its ongoing efforts to find a permanent home, and will also support the Royal British Legion for their continuing work with veterans in this landmark year.

Planning

Council discussed the launch of an initiative by Bellway Homes over the potential development of two plots of land off Darlingscote Road. The developer has been issuing communications in the form of leafleting and social media which it has termed a public consultation over the developments. The Town Council will write to the planning authority to make clear that Bellway's actions do not constitute a public consultation and ask that the District Council strongly resists such speculative efforts while the new Local Plan is in progress, with a reminder that the town has already exceeded its allocation of housing under the current Local Plan without any additional infrastructure, health or education provision.

Stour Valley Lions - working for your community



All a-flutter in Cornmill Meadows

There is excellent news about our new Wildlife Site from Mike Slater, chair of Warwickshire Butterfly Conservation, following his latest survey of Cornmill Meadows.



In addition to recording

Large White, Peacock and Speckled Wood butterflies, Mike found eggs belonging to the Brimstone butterfly on the new hedge planted by our team of volunteers early in 2023. He also found Orange Tip butterfly eggs on some Garlic Mustard plants. The 900-plus hedge shrubs planted by our volunteers are now getting well established and it is wonderful that our planting is already improving the biodiversity of this wildlife site.

Another new hedge has been planted in River Meadow, again with the help of volunteers; hopefully this will become a source of more breeding by butterflies.

A lovely little flowering plant known as Lady's Smock is beginning to establish itself around the site, especially welcome as this, along with Garlic Mustard, is an important foodplant for the Orange Tip



butterfly. However, more work is needed to encourage both plants to flourish.

The community orchard continues to grow well, and a decision will be taken soon about whether to let some trees fruit this year or give them another year to improve their root structure.

We are delighted to receive a grant from Stratford District Council for an information board by the entrance to the site.

We have been aware that background information concerning Cornmill Meadows has been lacking; the new board will enable us to inform people about what is happening, and what to look out for.

First Responders' new wheels

Two years ago, Community First Responder Tony Booth entered an internal competition at Jaguar Land Rover, where he works, to compete against other charity groups for the opportunity to win a new car. He and the team were delighted when they found out last year that they had won a brand new Land Rover Discovery Sport and since then the car has been manufactured and liveried up ready for service in Shipston.

On Thursday 8th May, Tony along with Scheme coordinator Stuart Eastbury and other colleagues, attended the JLR HQ at Gaydon to take receipt of the car. Tony said, 'this is a very proud moment both as an employee of JLR and as a First Responder. We are very grateful to JLR for this incredibly generous donation of a Land Rover Discovery Sport which will help us to serve the community for years to come and enable us to attend call-outs in our rural community where access can sometimes be particularly difficult. The car will no doubt help us to save lives.'

The car will be fitted out with lights and radio equipment over the coming weeks by West Midlands Ambulance Service to bring it up to operational readiness. It will replace the older ambulance which, in turn, will be transferred to Alcester First Responders and the new Discovery will join the new Subaru ambulance that was kindly gifted by the generous fund raising of the town and local charities last year

Both vehicles will be used by our growing team that now numbers 15 First Responders with additional members who support community training and defibrillator management.

Around town

Big day for the Royal British Legion

To commemorate the Anniversary Victory in Europe, the Shipston Branch of the British Legion Royal participated in various activities throughout the day, in collaboration with the Town Council and the Stour Valley Lions. The day began at 8am with a proclamation in the High Street by the Town Crier.



This was followed by a small ceremony at the Gyratory Memorial Garden, where the VE Day flag was raised. Speeches were delivered by the Mayor, John Dinnie, and the President of the Shipston branch of the Royal British Legion, David Kernohan, with wreaths laid at the memorial by vice chairman Nick Wilkes.

At 3pm there was a gathering in the High Street to listen to Winston Churchill's 1945 address to the nation, marking the end of the war in Europe. This was swiftly followed by the judging of the Best Dressed Shop Window competition, keenly contested by 30 shops. The winner was ArchiWildish, with judges noting, 'Everyone had made a big effort, but the judges felt that the winners, the Brownies and Rainbows, had put a great deal of imagination, time, and enthusiasm into making their window stand out. The pictures and bunting were all very carefully cut out and coloured in, and the Union flags made a striking impression. Shipston Museum on VE Day

'Action!' was the word at the start of BBC Midlands Today filming at our Museum on VE day. As part of the TV coverage of its 80th Anniversary, the BBC team was drawn by our Shipston Remembers evocative display covering both front-line memorabilia like medals and uniforms to the home front of the Home Guard, women's land army and reminders like gas masks and rationing cards.

But of course, it was the personal interviews that brought the programme, broadcast that evening, really alive. Trustee Stephen Hartley pointed out how local people had come forward to contribute with memories and items to tell their family stories.

One very special story came from 101-year-old Doreen Knapton. Her memories of that time are still clear as she told BBC journalist Joan Cummins about her time working in the Peak Engineering Munitions factory where Tesco now stands. This was a dangerous but vital job, producing the weapons and ammunition needed to fight the war. Doreen laughed when asked if she was proud of her work then: 'I was doing my bit,' she said. And in typical wartime spirt she and the women with whom she worked also had fun – and escapades like scrumping for apples.

Other interviews were with Museum volunteer Bernard Maguire who reminisced about the street parties to rejoice at the end of the war while Graham Wilkes recalled the figure of Hitler atop the bonfire to celebrate VE day 80 years ago.

Joan, the BBC reporter, told us: 'I had a delightful afternoon at Shipston Museum. This treasure trove of memories and memorabilia offered unexpected opportunities to speak to amazing people with incredible stories.' She added that Doreen shared an insight into work at the munitions factory while Bernard revealed life in Croydon living through the war.

'Graham shared vivid memories of VE Day,' she said, 'Including being dressed up as Charlie Chaplin for the children's parade. Eighty years later he still questions why he didn't win first prize!'

Of course, not all the amazing local accounts could be covered in a short news report, but the display is on until September, so you can still hear and share these stories – and items even as far back as the Boer War.

Trustee Michaela Davis who designed this fascinating display said that it was really interesting working with our volunteers to put together such a varied exhibition. 'It shows how deeply conflict affects a community like Shipston.'



The fact that conflict is not always over was demonstrated with the array of medals worn by our visitors from the Shipston Branch of the British Legion. Asked about service, 'We have been around, yes,' said chairman Alex Black, 'Including Gulf war, Bosnia, Kosovo, Iraq and Afghanistan.' He said that the group had enjoyed their visit, although it was far too short, adding a well done and thanks for a fantastic exhibition. The news item on Midlands Today was lovely, he said, and quite poignant.

The BBC is planning to film a further feature at Shipston Museum about Sgt Major Cyril Mace (RA), a Japanese PoW, ahead of VJ Day80.

Play

We have been busy creating more spaces for our children to play in. Many thanks to all the staff who gave up their holiday time to tidy up, build our new sandpit and tunnel and to prepare all of our new den building equipment. The children have loved playing with them. Many thanks as well to our Tilemans Lane neighbours at Timpsons, Europipes Ltd., Venture 4x4, Sydenhams and Steve Clarke Builders for their help and support with donations of resources and time. Thanks also to Mr Aubrey and Mr Hart for their help and time over the last few weeks.

Our work with OPAL has made such a huge difference to our children already and is something we are committed to developing further in the future. Play is a vital part of our children's development and something we should not stop doing just because we become 'grown up'. This is a growing national focus. Research shows that our children spend 50% less time outdoors than a generation ago which is shocking.

By its very nature, learning is constantly happening whenever play takes place – from basic numeracy or literacy skills to the learning and development of life skills, such as problem-solving, communication, self-regulation, negotiation or resilience.

Play can improve core strength, stability, balance, spatial awareness, co-ordination and agility, as well as having a positive link with motor skills development.

Play is also a core component of a child's personal, social, and emotional development. Time spent outdoors can improve mental wellbeing, enhance memories and self-discipline, moderate stress and encourage children to form supportive social groups.

By contrast, 'play deprivation' can lead to a fall in brain and muscle development and reduced communication, problem-solving, and social skills. Play needs to start from birth and last throughout our lifetimes. As the saying goes, 'We don't stop playing because we grow old, we grow old because we stop playing.'

Parish churches have been a focal point of our towns and villages for centuries and today, in the 21st century, bellringers from Shipston and its surrounding villages are as proud as their forebears once were to uphold the tradition of ringing for the local churches and the community. Shipston Probus

We welcomed speaker Martin Gower, a member of neighbouring Stratford upon Avon Probus Club, to hear his talk The NHS: a jewel in the crown, or a patient in need of some therapy?



After a career in journalism, Martin took on the role of nonexecutive director for two NHS Trusts including chair of the Coventry and Warwickshire Partnership NHS Trust. His move from the private sector to a government-run organisation was not easy. For example, in his new role Martin was presented with a file of 300+ pages to digest and had to get to grip with numerous acronyms, from ICB (Integrated Care Board) and MUS (medically unexplained symptoms) to DRE (digital rectal examination) and DNA (did not attend), to name a few!

Martin's view is that the NHS is very beneficial despite its 38 political leaders since 1948. Like most large and complicated organisations, it contains the good, the complacent and the inadequate!

Running costs have inevitably greatly increased, from initially about £3.02 per head per year to the current £2,850. We spend 11.6% of our GDP on the NHS, but the amount per head is reducing. The NHS employs around 1.3 million full time equivalent workers, similar to Amazon globally. On an average day, 1.2m patients attend an appointment, 70% of them face-to-face, and over 7% fail to attend, at huge cost to the country.

Over the years, significant changes include an increase in referrals for mental health services. Over six million patients are prescribed anti-depressants each year. The number of GPs and consultants have increased, but many of them work part-time. Specialist hospitals are on the increase, patient safety and quality of care is greater than ever, but on the negative side access to services is more difficult, admin is more complicated and local leadership reduced. Just one in five people in 2024 said they were satisfied with the way the NHS is run. This is the lowest level of satisfaction recorded since the survey began in

The NHS undoubtedly is facing huge challenges; funding, cutting bureaucracy, effective political leadership, waiting times, links with social care, to name a few. The jewel needs constant resetting to meet ever changing and increasing demand!

Astronomical Society News

Adrian Wakeham writes:

Return to the Moon

In the last year or so, and probably in the next few months, you'll hear about America's plans to return to the Moon.

When, in December 1972, as astronauts Harrison Schimdt and Gene Cernan sealed the lunar module before returning to the command module of Apollo 17, not many thought it would be over 50 years before humans would return to the Moon.

Many countries have sent missions to the Moon and landed on the lunar surface. The Russians and Chinese have returned samples of the surface, the Chinese from the far side (also known as the dark side).

Artemis 1 was an unmanned version of the craft which America hopes to use to return humans to the Moon and this orbited the Moon in 2022. Artemis 2 intends to

send four astronauts into lunar orbit but not land. This is unlikely to be before April 2026.

If successful, Artemis 3 will land astronauts on the Moon. It will carry four Astronauts, including a woman, an African American and a non-American. The mission is intended to last 30 days.

It intends to land close to the South Pole, hoping to find water, which will be very useful for any permanent lunar settlement.

The next stage will be a permanent lunar gateway in orbit. Then, the next challenge would be to launch a mission to Mars, from the Moon base.

One 'fly in the ointment' for the Americans could be the Chinese. They are secretive about their future plans and may try to beat the Americans in this new space race!

The Stratford-upon-Avon Astronomical Society meets every first and third Tuesday at 8pm (doors open at 7.30pm) at Alderminster Village Hall. Everyone is welcome, especially beginners and those wanting to learn more. The first Tuesday is a club night, in June that will be on 3rd June and the speaker on the third Tuesday 17th June at 8pm will be Professor Christine Done, from Durham University, with a talk called Black Holes – recent breakthrough results.

So, June approacheth, and I'm back in the saddle, surgeries and all.



Bellway Homes and Ashbury Homes have circulated their plans to build 200 homes on land on the edge of Shipston. Many concerned residents have contacted us about the proposals. The land is along Darlingscote Road and Tilemans



There have been ongoing problems around the Darlingscote Road travellers' site. Even though the site is close to Shipston it is in Tredington Ward and as such is the responsibility of neighbouring Councillors. However, we have emailed the surrounding Councillors to join in on a cross party effort to improve the situation.

We recently received the latest data from the Office for National Statistics on Fuel Poverty across Stratford District. We were shocked to see that over 15% of households in Shipston are classified as being in fuel poverty according to the report. This is above the average for Stratford District. Fuel poverty is the condition by which a household is unable to afford to heat (or cool) their home to an adequate temperature. This can be caused by a combination of low income, high fuel prices, poor energy efficiency, unaffordable housing prices and poor quality private rental housing. For households needing help with energy bills, you can contact Act on Energy on (freephone) 0800 988 2881. Tips and hints for reducing energy costs can be found in the Energy Advice section of the District Council website.

Beds for Badger Campaign

We are going to request a 'call in' to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Services, asking that the health needs of our rural community, including the needs for some inpatient beds, be recognised and acted upon.

We're taking this course of action because we - and the primary, secondary and community stakeholders we've been engaging with - have received a letter from Laura Nelson, chief integration officer at the Integrated Care Board, implying a delay while the ICB works through differing priorities and awaits the NHS Long Term Plan, about which there are limited details. This is inconsistent with the previous letter from the ICB chair Danielle Oum, so we have asked for an explanation. A delay would be totally unacceptable to the residents of Shipston and the surrounding area.


