Booked up!

The town's second annual Bookfest, a celebration of books and reading, got off to an upbeat start with the Bookshop Band playing their literary-themed music in the Townsend Hall. The first weekend



saw poetry performances from students at Shipston's Primary and High schools, local authors sharing their stories, a gripping true crime talk, and an inspiring writing workshop. Look out next month for a full report on the Bookfest, which ran 20th-28th September.

Prize veg

After a hot, dry summer, when keeping gardens going became a struggle, Shipston's New Street allotment-holders were delighted to be awarded third prize for best kept



allotment at the Moreton Show. They are yet to decide how they will spend the £50 prize money. Last year, after scooping second prize, the money was used to purchase a wooden shelf at the entrance to the site, where excess produce can be left for other holders to have free of charge.

Town Council news

News from Shipston Town Council's September meeting

Open forum

Jacey Jackson explained to the Council that the community speed watch, started in 2017, has now been disbanded (see article in centre pages). She requested speed limit roundels or further measures on Stratford Road, one of the worst roads for speeding. Council will take this up with Warwickshire Highways. Council thanked Jacey and the group for their efforts in monitoring speeds in town.

Reports from councillors

Red crosses painted on white road markings have been reported to Highways. Cllr H Kelly reported problems with construction vans parking in Callaways Road. She has completed playground training and has checked the playground on London Road.

Cllr Benjamin-Smith attended a meeting of residents of new-build houses, who have concerns over issues that have arisen since the developers left. Cllr Passingham has agreed to represent any of their concerns at District level. It was noted that developers have an obligation for road maintenance for a year after the development has finished, before this responsibility passes to Highways.

Youth Club

The proposed new Youth Club building has met with many questions despite permission having been granted for a building on the same site. It will go ahead, with groundworks needed. The Youth Club will be meeting in the hospital building in the meantime.

Police

Council has carried out a rent review with the police for their use of New Clark House.

Budget

A meeting has been set for October to agree the budget for next year. Each working group to set out their needs so that they are covered in a structured way.

John Dinnie

Cllr Dinnie steps down this month and the council will be thanking him for his hard work and service, including as the immediately preceding Mayor.

Mayor's event

This will be on 7th November with a 1940s theme.

District Council

Cllr Hatch reported that councillors had had an update on the decision to grant planning permission to the Bordon Hill development outside Stratford, which went to the planning inspector. It is feared this will open the floodgates on more

planning applications and they want to meet planning and policy officers about cumulative development.

There is now funding for a feasibility study into cycling routes in town.

Environment and Flood Action Group

The group has been revising the emergency flood action booklet and there is a question over the location of the designated emergency rest centre. With a number of options in town, the suggestion was to call the Council, which will be able to decide on the best location according to the situation at the time. All SAFAG expenditure was approved.

Blue light

The Shipston First Responders responded to 44 calls in August. The old Subaru will be donated to Alcester.

Ellen Badger

The call-in to the Secretary of State was accepted.

Nature

Bird walks at Cornmill Meadows identified 19 different species of bird, while a bat walk at the Twin Chapels identified three different kinds of bat. The Local Nature Action Plan is proceeding with a plan from another area being able to be adapted. The hedge surveying is continuing.

Planning

The Sainsbury's application for Tilemans Lane has been approved, with a list of conditions. Council disappointed that its comments, for example the working hours for the service yard, had not been taken into consideration. The planning application will remain live for three years, with the building work expected to take about a year.

The permission for the Bordon Hill housing scheme in Stratford is of concern as it is outside the built-up area boundary. It had been rejected by the planners but the planning inspector found in the developer's favour. The main argument in favour of the development was housing supply, with the inspector saying that building work in other areas was not proceeding at the expected rate. This could be due to a lack of demand as well as a shortage of labour.

Council assets

The repair of the churchyard wall awaits the decision of the diocese. A suggestion has been made for the use of the twin chapels – more suggestions welcome. A bench has been ordered for Worcester Place.

Banking

Cllr Williams reported that the independent assessor is reading his 20-page submission on the case for a banking hub and was expected to report shortly. (See story on page 5.)


Flu and Covid vaccines will be offered within the same appointment to those who are eligible.

On Wednesday 27th August SWFT were asked to attend the SDC Overview and Scrutiny

of the retained estate (Princess Diana 1992 Building). Mr Carson responded with the list of nurse-led clinics we have seen before and an indication of future consultant-led clinics but with no real certainty on time scale. He did however reveal that in addition to the GPs moving into their 11 rooms (10 consulting and one treatment) in the Spring of 2026, there would be a 'pilot' of a Medical Case Day Unit, and the League of Friends have managed to further clarify that the pilot will be in the retained 1992 building and an undertaking to review the possibility of using space in the new building as the pilot progresses. We welcome this engagement with Mr Carson and to hear that SWFT are discussing these developments with the Shipston Medical Centre and Dr George Naylor in his role as clinical director of the local Primary Care Network (Wellesbourne, Quinton and Shipston GPs working together).

Thank you all for your continued support. We continue to campaign for extended and improved medical services in the Ellen Badger Hospital and to look for opportunities to bring inpatient services closer to our community. We continue to press for greater diagnostic capability, especially as it will be required for this Medical Case Day Unit. We would also like to see the Ellen Badger return to its key role of reducing the number of admissions to acute hospitals from our community.

population, the town has a free to use ATM with capacity to pick up Lloyds' ATM transactions and a Post Office with capacity to pick up the counter transactions.'



She acknowledged that the Post Office is not fully accessible and recommended that LINK engage with the Post Office to ensure that it is.

'This is very disappointing,' says John Williams. 'Shipston's businesses, retailers and charities are left with the option of using an ATM and the Post Office. We were told that is OK as it is possible to get to Moreton, our nearest branch of Lloyds, by bus in under 30 minutes, although we know a round trip can take up to three hours due to bus times. We are just being left high and dry.'

Bank latest

Here's more background on why a banking hub will not be coming to Shipston, even after a long series of

communications with LINK, the UK banking network. A banking hub is a place where personal and business banking transactions can be carried out face-to-face with a community banker. It is a shared space where multiple banks collaborate to provide in-person services. Staff from different banks rotate throughout



the week. In other words, a place you can do your regular banking, no matter what bank you are with. It is held up as an alternative for communities whose banks have closed, as is increasingly the case. One in three bank branches have closed in the past five years.

Cllr John Williams has lobbied for months to retain banking services for the town's businesses and bank account holders, by pointing out that LINK had made errors in its assessment of the banking alternatives available to people in Shipston, as well as the way it did the town's rural categorisation, and the number of retailers within a three-mile radius. After rejecting these arguments, LINK's independent assessor, Joanna Wallace, wrote:

'Shipston does not qualify for any additional facilities as whilst it does have an older and less digitally connected



Community Grant Awards

Shipston Town Council is inviting grant applications for the 2026/2027 financial year.

Grants are made to support a wide range of community initiatives across the town, delivered by voluntary groups and charities.

The scheme is open to any voluntary group or charity based in Shipston, or those who actively work in the town.

Applications must be made for specific projects, for example, the purchase of equipment or to support a planned event.

Grants typically range from £250 - £2,000.

Larger sums may be awarded for certain causes.

What is Cornmill Meadows? Cornmill Meadows is a designated wildlife site normally open to the public every day of the year.



Who runs Cornmill Meadows? It is owned and run by Shipston Town Council. Much of the work is undertaken by a small but active group of volunteers. Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, Severn Rivers Trust and other environmental bodies also provide advice and assistance.

Where is it? Just opposite the cemetery on the London Road A3400, post code CV36 4HZ; /// dislodge.wonderfully.pounces

Is there a car park? No, it is within about 15 minutes walk from the centre of Shipston.

Is it accessible for wheelchairs? The main entrance is wheelchair accessible, radar key needed. However, Meadows Way, leading to the meadows, is a grassy slope and likely to be waterlogged in winter. We are seeking funding to improve the

Are dogs allowed? Yes, but on leads only please. This is because wildlife and dogs are not compatible and non-dog owners may be nervous of free-ranging canines.

Where is the wildlife? (asked by a member of the public with a dog!). There are many animals living in the hedges, trees and grasses such as birds, butterflies, hedgehogs, field mice, voles, bats, rabbits, grass snakes, slow worms, foxes etc., but they will normally avoid human and canine contact!

What is special about Cornmill Meadows? Apart from providing us with lovely walks and views, it is home to over 20 species of bird (including Great Spotted woodpeckers and owls), 11 species of bumblebee, 39 types of butterflies and an unknown number of insects. Both Hill Meadow and River Meadow have quite rare grasses and wildflowers reflecting its cultivation as traditional hay and meadowland from medieval

What else is there? A community orchard planted in 2023; picnic tables and benches, riverside walk and peace. We are hoping to build a willow tunnel.

Can we cut down a bit of hedge that obscures our view or pick flowers? No! please do not remove or interfere with any plants. It is a designated Wildlife Site and hedges, trees and grasses are managed according to an ongoing plan over many years for the benefit of wildlife as well as public pleasure.

Shipston Museum: walks and talks

Talk - Witchcraft in the Cotswolds

From sick pigs and milkless cows to women shape-shifting into hares, our Cotswolds region has a long history of magical folklore and legends of witchcraft.

With a deep knowledge of witchcraft and witches in Victorian Britain, Dr Julia Phillips will introduce us to Witchcraft in The Cotswolds in our first talk for the Shipston Museum winter talks programme. Julia, who has written and spoken about witchcraft, says she has been interested in the subject since the 1970s: 'It's an area rich in legend,' she says. In her illustrated presentation, she will share some of the fascinating stories from the 12th to the 20th centuries.

Her talk is in November, which is particularly significant as this month is associated with the supernatural due to the Allhallowtide tradition, which begins with All Hallows' Eve and includes All Saints' Day (1st November) and All Souls' Day (2nd November), honouring the dead.

Watch

Shipston's Community Speed Watch is being discontinued after a decision by leader Jacey Jackson and the members who have been monitoring the speed of traffic on the main roads of Shipston since 2017, with the



aim of improving road safety. Many volunteers braved all four seasons to record vehicle registration numbers where drivers have exceeded the speed limit. These details were passed to the police who took further action as necessary.

Between 2017 and 2024 when Jacey's husband died, they amassed 190 hours of monitoring, amounting to 570 volunteer hours. In that time, 1,352 vehicles recorded as over the speed limit (most over 40mph) within the 30mph zone. A number of those recorded were repeat offenders.

Jacey thanked the team members for their reliable commitment and explained that the reasons for folding the group now were mainly to do with the change to her personal circumstances.

'I would like to feel we had achieved some calming of the traffic passing through Shipston over those years while we were standing in a group wearing our hi-viz jackets, but sadly, I believe there is still much to do to convince some drivers of the benefits to the local community of driving more slowly – less intimidation, less noise and vibration, less environmental pollution, greater ease and safety for cyclists and pedestrians using our urban road network and overall a more civil public realm. A little more involvement by the County Council Highways Department in this out of the way corner of Warwickshire could also achieve some notable improvements, at relatively little expense.'

She concluded: 'Although Speed Watch will no longer function under my watch, if anyone is interested in taking up the reins, then please do get in touch, before I return the kit to the police.' Jacey can be contacted on 01608 661288.

As many of you are aware, planning is going through a multitude of changes ranging from the preparation of the next South Warwickshire Local Plan (which will replace the current Stratford District Core Strategy) to Government pronouncements on

As part of the hierarchy of planning controls there are the Neighbourhood Plans. These are specific planning documents for individual towns and villages and have to be renewed every few years to reflect changes in legislation and the needs of those communities. Shipston has had a Neighbourhood Plan since 2018 but it is only valid until 2031. Prospective developers have to take this document into account when submitting their applications to Stratford District Council for housing development in Shipston.

The Town Council is presently planning for the replacement of the current Neighbourhood Plan and is looking for volunteers to help in the creation of the new Plan. So, if you are interested in helping shape the future of Shipston please let me know.



Play spaces



Shipston WI



Shipston Women's Institute September meeting after the summer break set a high standard for the coming year. Colin Millett came to talk about his passion for Worcester porcelain. He was accompanied by his wife Frances and a one-time pupil from his days as a teacher, none other than Shipston's Mayor, Tony Booth, and his wife Jane the Mayoress. Colin kindly donated his speaking fee to Tony's drive to provide a permanent clubhouse for Shipston Youth Club.

Frances introduced Colin with an amusing cautionary tale illustrating the passion of collecting - despite vows and promises that he had enough Worcester pieces, Colin couldn't resist buying just one more piece without her knowing, or so he

thought. Francis described the piece as hideous and indeed it was, but Colin loves it. No-one in the audience liked it either.

Colin developed a love of porcelain and became a valuer at a famous auction house in Stourbridge where he honed his knowledge of Worcester-ware. Worcester Porcelain was established in 1751 as an amalgam of several porcelain works. It remained one of the greatest porcelain producers for 250 years. Colin showed one of his earliest pieces - a small plate of 1753 which was transfer printed. The print was faint at this time - a 'smoky primitive' - but this was a breakthrough because patterned china could become available to ordinary people. Until this time, patterned china had to be hand painted which was time-consuming and expensive. The technique of transfer printing was refined over the years and is still used today.

However, rich colours, elaborate scenes of cattle and sheep, bowls of fruit etc, became Worcester Porcelain's hallmark. An extremely skilled body of artists excelled in this work which often became a family skill - father to son, and many women too.

Worcester Porcelain was given a publicity boost in 1802 when Admiral Nelson ordered a very elaborate breakfast and dinner service. George III and Queen Charlotte had visited in 1789 and awarded Worcester Porcelain a royal warrant hence Royal Worcester Porcelain and they have been the recipients of many Royal Warrants since that time.

A successful company relies on the quality of its workers and Worcester recognised this. They trained and endeavoured to retain their best workers. Experts can recognise the work of individuals. Women played an important role in the decoration of pieces which were elaborate and often finished with gold. The Great Depression of the 1930s threatened the prosperity of the factory and they turned to modelling. Here again it was women who excelled. In 1948 the then Queen Elizabeth visited and commissioned a model of her daughter. One hundred editions of the then Princess Elizabeth on horseback were produced. The Queen Mother took two, the remaining 98 were sold. In 1972 Queen Elizabeth II commissioned a model of her daughter, Anne, jumping on Doublet.

Colin did not mention the very sad closure of the Royal Worcester Porcelain factory but many of his audience remember it with affection. However, the Museum is still open and worth visiting.

During the summer Shipston WI had participated in the Brailes Show. A cancelled visit (due to excessive heat) to Waterperry Gardens will be re-arranged. It is intended to have an Open Morning in the Old Bank in Shipston High Street on 26th October. The WI will be participating with refreshments at the Cotswolds Arts Weekend in the Townsend Hall in December.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday 1st October, when Kate Tanner will be talking about the role of a Tudor Maid. The meeting in the Catholic Church Hall, Darlingscote Road at 7pm and visitors are always welcome.

County Council

Hold onto your hats - Dave and I are both writing about local planning this month - and we agreed it! Many of you have been deluged with glossy blurbs from developers. Some of them regard this as consultation. Gladman - for the Shoulderway Lane site - have said they consulted me well they sent me an email...I am not sure I feel consulted. Anyway, quite a few of you know that this is the site which crosses a red line with me and is where I am threatening to lie in front of bulldozers.

Well, that was last week.

NOW we have an attempt to develop the Fell Mill Lane site - which could add 1,800 homes to Barcheston, Willington, Honington and Shipston! That would swamp three villages, destroy fragile flood meadow, disrupt raptors, hares and I'll whisper it - water voles (when I lived at Greystones, there was evidence of these rare beasties – even rarer than Conservative County Councillors).

So, the SOS team has swung into action. It's a big joint effort: Malcolm Littlewood, Olivia Hatch, Dave Passingham and me as the councillors and so many volunteers. The application is not in yet, but some more cheeky 'consultation' has been going on by Lichfield, representing the developers. I am never anything less than grumpy (and often incandescent) when told anything which does not quite add up. I am told that the masterplan which has been produced – a copy of which I am still awaiting – was asked for by SDC. I suspect that it was offered as a push for development. Please be aware of how much money is at stake for the locals who may sell their land – so the motivation is high, and this becomes a very high stakes game.

I give a bit of colour to set the scene before the application goes in. We think it won't be long - the reviewed list of sites in the SWLP (South Warwickshire Local Plan) comes out this month and developers are working to pre-empt this.

So, what can WE do?

SOS will help people to object using planning reasons and again (like for the SWLP) every comment counts.

I will be in close contact with Highways and Severn Trent and the CNL Board on which I serve. We will use the Shipston Noticeboard and other social media to stay in touch. Posters and notes will be available for those who don't use social media (phone/text me if you would like these once they are produced).

Shipston (and the villages) have done their bit to provide housing - we have had 200 more homes built than were assessed for Shipston. Another Shipston-sized settlement on the other side of the river is too much!

In other news, I am writing from a damp Cornwall, on holiday! I hope you have all enjoyed the Food Festival and Bookfest - I need to book my holidays with a little more forethought!

District Council

A year ago, in an attempt to kick-start the economy and deal with the housing crisis, the Government doubled the target number of houses to be built in Stratford District. Developers have been quick off the mark to try and cash in, and that is why councils all over the country are receiving an unprecedented number of planning applications for housing developments. In Shipston this means three applications have been submitted and there are more that we know of waiting in the sidelines.

Unfortunately, developers won a planning appeal for a housing estate on the edge of Stratford last month. The implication of this is that even if the District Council reject the planning applications around Shipston, the Government Inspector could override that decision.

If all the land put forward by landowners were granted this could amount to an additional 3.000 houses and double the size of Shipston. This would put an intolerable strain on Shipston's infrastructure.

Unfortunately, stopping the developments was made more difficult because Council planning officers put forward Shipston as a potential Strategic Growth Area as part of the South Warwickshire Local Plan, and asked landowners to come forward with land available for housing. Olivia and I, along with many residents, opposed Shipston even being considered a Strategic Growth Area at the consultation at the beginning of this year. We should find out if we were successful by the end of the year. If it is rejected as a growth area, we will have a stronger argument against new developments.

As a member of the District Council Overview & Scrutiny Committee I attended the August meeting at which South Warwickshire NHS Foundation Trust (SWIFT) were called to answer questions about the Ellen Badger. When questioning Adam Carson the Chief Executive I said how disappointed many people in Shipston were to not have the hospital restored with beds as originally planned. He stuck to the SWIFT line that 'care in the community is better'. When asked for evidence of that he could not give any, but said he would forward some. None has been received to date. However, he did say they are intending to provide additional services in a trial Medical Day Case Unit. This is a welcome extra provision but unfortunately it will not include Minor Injuries. The service is due to start on 6th October in the retained building next to the new Ellen Badger building. They could not say how the unit would be staffed but it promises to be a useful addition to what we have.




