VJ Day remembered

A ceremony at the Gyratory Garden on 15th August commemorated the 80th anniversary of VJ Day and remembered those who had fallen, were held captive and endured unimaginable hardship in the Far East. After a moving citation by the Royal British Legion President, and a reflective service by Revd Sarah Edmonds, wreaths were laid by the Mayor of Shipston, the Royal British Legion and the High Sheriff of Warwickshire.



Karen Lynch, the 691st High Sheriff of Warwickshire (pictured right, below), said: 'The service was beautiful and so well attended – my thanks to the Royal British Legion and their volunteers for making it possible.' She went on afterwards to visit the Museum's special exhibition and hear the remarkable story of Cyril Mace, former Shipston resident and WWII veteran, from Cyril's daughter Barbara Harris. Cyril was a local postie who survived the sinking of the ship Lisbon Maru and spent three months on an island, being protected by Chinese fishermen. You can find out more about his incredible story at the Shipston Museum until the end of September.



Reaching for the sun

Joshua Allen knows how to bring out the sun – this is the second year in a row he has won the 11-and-under category of Shipston Rotary's annual Tallest Sunflower competition, now in its 10th year. This year Joshua, aged nine, grew his sunflower to an amazing 9ft 6ins, having saved the seed from his giant prize-wining sunflower last year which had measured over 1



sunflower last year, which had measured over 15ft.

Meanwhile 13-year-old Robyn Pelwenkhan managed to encourage her sunflower to reach the impressive height of 12ft 5ins to win the prize for the over-11s. Robyn last won the competition in 2020 when she used her prize money to buy a sunflower clock which she still has. The two winners each receive a £10 Amazon voucher. Other entrants this year included Beatrice Taylor (7ft 9ins) and Susan Perry (6ft 8ins) and Laila



Darbyshire, the youngest at age three, whose sunflower grew all the way to 6ft 5ins.

Where has the year gone?!

Personally, July was a special month for my family since our son James and his wife Sophie welcomed their first child, Edward, into the world. Then, like many of you, we decided to fly off to find out where the sun had gone! We still had some time to attend a lovely Mayor's Civic event in Coleshill along with many other mayors, and we also attended an inspiring evening of community volunteering awards hosted by the Warwickshire High Sheriff at the Sikh Temple in Leamington.

The Shipston community has a great deal to look forward to over the coming weeks with Bookfest preparations well underway for September and the Food Festival also looming. Meanwhile, 15th August marked the commemorative 80th anniversary for VJ Day (Victory in Japan) when the end of the second world war was finally achieved, albeit by arguably the most brutal and devastating events in human history with the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. If possible, please pay a visit to the Shipston Museum located next door to the Council Office. They put on a fascinating VJ Day display – Shipston Remembers – which included the story and uniform of Regimental Sgt Major Cyril Mace (Japanese PoW).

I don't have a single subject to get off my chest this month, but I thought it might be good to mention a few of the challenges we have that we, as a council, are facing and trying to support the town with.

The Youth Club is my nominated mayoral charity this year, to support their efforts to find a permanent home. We have identified a location near the Sheldon Bosley Hub where a purpose-built building can be located and a request for planning permission has been submitted. It is the council's intention to financially contribute and help the Youth Club in securing a new building that will become their permanent home and hopefully provide an exciting space for the youth of our town to enjoy.

The Twin Chapels at London Road Cemetery have recently been repaired externally, but the council needs to determine how the buildings will be used in the future, in order for us to qualify for additional funding to further improve them. However, with limited parking, a long walk and a cemetery location, any purpose would need to be sympathetic to the area. What should we do with it? That's a question for you, our community. How would you like to see this building used? We need your ideas, so any thoughts would be very welcome, either to our council email clerk@shipstontowncouncil.org or we can be contacted on our Council or Mayor's Facebook pages.

In August, there was a lot of talk that our esteemed Deputy Prime Minister, Angela Rayner, had put her foot in it by suggesting that councils will be able to sell off allotments. Cue many anxious and concerned calls from the community to our council office asking if we are selling off the allotments! The answer is simply NO. The council has no plans to sell off any allotments and no plans to even raise this as a matter for council discussion. So your prized runner beans and pumpkins will remain safe and well.

Of course, we still have the ongoing challenges of numerous housebuilders in our sights, and we are meeting and challenging a number of them on their plans ahead of the SWLP consultation outcome later this year. The Ellen Badger hospital also continues to be a flagship of town frustration, and the council remains fully aware of the strength of feeling on this subject by many in the community.

A revamp of the Council website is currently underway, and we hope to provide more information and useful links to the community as it becomes more user friendly and interactive. Watch this space.

Finally, on behalf of Shipston Town Council I would like to take this opportunity to make a very public thank you to Mike McCarthy, a founding member of Shipston Area Flood Action Group (SAFAG). Without the support and active flood mitigation measures that this group has introduced over the years, our town and surrounding areas could have been seriously flooded many times over. Mike has worked closely with the Council and has been instrumental in putting in many flood mitigation initiatives. Our town is a much safer place to live because of SAFAG. Mike will be stepping down from his role due to a pending house move, but he will continue to support and guide the team over the next few months. Mike's SAFAG legacy will continue to thrive and protect our town, and we wish him well for the future. Thank you, Mike, for your invaluable contribution to the ongoing safety of our community.

Town Council news

News from Shipston Town Council's August meeting

Councillors out and about

Cllr Howarth attended Townsend Hall AGM, Taylor Wimpey consultation, and a Digital Towns meeting in which they heard how Abergavenny is successfully using a Local Area Network. Cllr Dinnie attended the Sainsbury's planning appeal meeting. Cllrs attended Brailes show.

Banking

Cllr Williams continues robustly to challenge the Link cash access assessments over their factual errors in how they have categorised the town, including its number of shops, transport links to Moreton – suggested as the nearest alternative banking centre – and accessibility of the Post Office.

Stratford District Council

The consultation over devolution to a unitary authority is out and Cllr Hatch encouraged all councillors to fill it in before the deadline of 25 August. Cllr Hatch will attend a meeting with the SDC case officer for the latest application for Darlingscote Road and has requested that dialogue is kept open.

Warwickshire County Council

Cllr Barker reminded the meeting that the Rural Development Fund is available to help businesses. She has fielded a number of concerns about footpath maintenance which she will pass on to the relevant officer at WCC. A dropped pavement will be installed at Sadlers Avenue.

Ellen Badger

Around 30-40 people attended a demonstration outside the EBH. The local MP is requesting a call-in to the Secretary of State for Health to review the consultation process and the decisions made. Council voted not to support the call-in request.

Stour Health and Wellbeing Partnership

The organisation has a new CEO, Kirsty Holder, who was previously charity manager at VASA, the community transport organisation.

Open forum

Debbie Williams spoke as an allotment-holder concerned that allotments may be vulnerable to being given over to housing after comments by the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government saying that local authorities could consider selling allotments. With other residents expressing the same concern, councillors wanted to assure people that the Council has no intention of selling the allotments.

Environmental and Flood Action

Severn Rivers Trust will put in a scrape on Cornmill Meadows which will help to 're-wet' an area for wildlife. A query on fishing resulted in a reminder that these should be channelled via Shipston Angling Club.

Planning

Council has submitted a detailed objection to a plan for housing on Darlingscote Road. It was noted that as of 12th July, the Government has withdrawn all funding for the neighbourhood plans, making it harder for councils to produce one. The current Neighbourhood Plan for Shipston is in force until 2031. STC is committed to carrying out the next one, due to run for a further 15 years. Planning for this will need to begin this autumn, and volunteers to work on the team for this immense task will be required. Council has some reserves set aside.

General purposes

An audit of play areas has been carried out since the last meeting. Cllr Benjamin-Smith completed playground safety training and Cllr M Kelly has also carried out an inspection. The Skate Park failed the inspection and this will be rectified. Planning permission for a new Youth Club facility has been submitted and progress is being made with securing new building. Meanwhile a container has been sourced for the club to store its equipment.

Mike McCarthy, the last of the original members of SAFAG, will shortly be moving out of the area and giving up his position of team leader.

Over the years, Mike has steadfastly supported SAFAG's local flood mitigation efforts, by arranging

meetings, attending presentations, liaising with landowners, farmers, contractors and various agencies, to walking the fields and pathways leading the group members to inspect the condition of over 850 interventions (leaky woody dams, ponds, wetlands, bunds, and scrapes) installed upstream of Shipston.

Mike's experience and knowledge isn't readily replaceable. Fortunately, during the current interim transitional period, Mike will be helping to shape and plan the future role and objectives of SAFAG covering the next couple of years.

The SAFAG team's efforts to 'slow the flow,' has helped to reduce the risk and impact of localised flooding, which has historically affected Shipston and the local communities bordering the Stour.

Mike's efforts deserve recognition, and the thanks of all local residents who have benefited from his commitment and enthusiasm.


Those who are able will continue to meet at 11am on the first Wednesday of each month, for coffee/lunch at the Horseshoe.

We have made two requests for improvements to the facilities at the 'Ellen Badger':

1. That midwives conducting maternity clinics be given access to ultrasound scanning equipment and blood testing capability. The SWFT response to this was: 'Ultrasound services are delivered at the South Warwickshire Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC) in Stratford for Shipston residents, as part of the national diagnostic strategy. This centralised model ensures patients have access to high-quality imaging services in the most appropriate setting.'

Our community goes a lot further than Shipston and we can only suggest that mums-to-be head for North Cotswolds Hospital in Moreton which does have ultrasound.

2. We asked about the EBH becoming a Neighbourhood Health Centre under the National Neighbourhood Health Implementation Programme. The ICB response was: 'The NNHIP will be delivered at Place level, i.e. Warwickshire...The ICB will be submitting two bids, one for Warwickshire and one for Coventry.'

The ICB has again missed our understanding of a community and a neighbourhood.

We will continue to battle for improved healthcare in our community, that rough diamond from Wellesbourne to Little Compton, Stretton on Fosse to Tysoe. The NHS practitioners are trying their hardest. It is the layers of expensive management that are failing.

Your repeat prescriptions

Our dispensary is a valuable element of the practice. It provides an important and convenient service for patients and having a dispensary helps to provide funding and stability for other elements of the practice. What goes on behind the scenes?

Step 1 – medication requested by patient

- Requests can come in paper form, via our website, via the NHS app or via our phone line
- A dispenser reviews the order to ensure the request is valid and there are no concerns
- If there are concerns (regarding safety, over-use etc) this is flagged for GP review
- Requests are reviewed until 2pm; orders after this time are reviewed the following day

Step 2 - GP signature

- All dispensary requests are printed and sent to our GP team for signing
- On average the dispensary prints around 250 forms a day for this purpose
- The dispensers need to wait until a GP has had time to review, sign and return the forms
- Prescriptions to go to local pharmacies, generally sent electronically after the GP has signed them

Step 3 – stock and ordering

- Dispensers will now check if we have the required medication in stock at the practice
- As with most pharmacies, commonly used items are generally held in stock
- Less commonly used items need to be ordered in; this usually arrives same or next day
- Sometimes a medicine is nationally unavailable; in recent years this is happening more often. Where this occurs, the dispenser must identify a suitable alternative by discussing with a GP

Step 4 – dispensing

- With the form signed and the drug in stock, our dispenser can dispense the medication
- The dispenser goes through a series of checks to ensure the medication is correct, including drug name, strength, formulation and quantity



It is a complex process with numerous members of our practice team involved. Dispensing is a skilled role, and our team undergo regular training in line with national standards. Our dispensary team do a great job; we dispense to over 5,000 patients and process over 10,000 medications a month as well as emergency 'on the day' prescriptions which need to be dispensed urgently. We do so as efficiently as possible, but all these steps require time; it is for this reason that we ask patients to order medications at least four working days before they need them.

We recognise there will be times when patients need medication at short notice, often when they have either forgotten to place an order or lost their medication. The team do their best to help on these occasions as they recognise how important medications are. However, the number of urgent requests has grown significantly in recent times which makes it harder to work efficiently. If remembering to order is an issue, please discuss with the dispensary team as regular monthly items can be ordered automatically for patients.

Legally the practice is only allowed to dispense to patients who live more than a mile from a pharmacy, which means that people who live in Shipston cannot have their medications dispensed by us.

Please remember that the practice dispensary is closed on bank holidays which are thus not working days; note that on bank holiday weeks the team have fewer days to process the same number of requests. We hope this helps you understand the work done behind the scenes as well as the scale of work that our team undertake and thank you for your continued use of, and support for, our dispensary.




Walk or run for a great cause

National roles for Shipston's brass musicians

Two young south Warwickshire brass musicians have secured principal positions in the UK's leading band for children and young people.

In a first for Shipston Town Band, two of its former players, Alec Banner and Alex Jeffery have been appointed principal percussionist and principal trombone in the National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain (NYBBGB). Both players spent the beginnings of their brass band careers at Shipston Town Band and Alec started at its training band, which is about to launch its new term in September.

Earlier this year, at the age of 17, Alec Banner became the conductor of the training band, guiding budding musicians and helping develop their skills as part of an ensemble. Alec, who himself started as a beginner with the training band, is now a percussionist with the world-renowned Flowers Band and Principal Percussionist for the Swan Youth Orchestra. He has been the Principal Percussionist of the National Children's Brass Band, principal percussionist of Youth Brass 2000 and won the Katie Ogden Solo Prize for the percussion section in 2024.

Alex Jeffery, 18, began playing trombone at 11 years old. He is a pupil at King Edward VI School, Stratford and is due to begin

studies at the Royal Northern College of Music in September. As well as performing with Shipston Town Band, he also plays with the National Youth Orchestra, English Schools Orchestra and English Symphony Youth.

Shipston Probus

Graham Short had Probus members rolling in the aisles with stories of life as a micro-artist



Aged 15, Graham left school to work in a print works in Birmingham. He rose from engraving letterheads to become the royal engraver for 30 years, where he met and worked for royals.

Micro-artists can engrave the Lord's Prayer on a pinhead. To do such exacting detail, Graham works from midnight to dawn, three nights a week, not because he cannot sleep but to avoid vibrations of passing traffic. He must medically slow his heart and work between heart beats. Needles are sharpened to the finest of points and he uses a microscope and an oversized sketch with guidelines which can subsequently be polished out.

In 2012, he spent nine months engraving Nothing is Impossible along the sharp edge of a razor blade, a project he titled Cutting Edge. To mark the late Queen's Diamond Jubilee, he created a portrait of her on a gold speck inserted into the eye of a needle.

At an exhibition of his work to an English-speaking group in Japan, Graham decided to say a few words in their own language. Noting the 'Ladies and Gentlemen' sign over the toilet, he addressed his audience who smiled politely. At the end, the chairman thanked him but enquired as to why he had started with the words 'toilets and urinals'?

Famous customers abound: Simon Rattle, Uri Geller, Trevor Brooking, Banksy, Ozzy Osbourne and Ronnie Barker. Ronnie had a memorabilia shop in Chipping Norton and asked Graham to engrave the Lord's Prayer on a nail head which subsequently led to him doing the same on a pin head. Graham's work can be seen in museums around the world including the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust.








I joined Shipston u3a and found a community

District Council

Help shape the future of local government for Warwickshire

As we may have mentioned before, the government, via the English Devolution White Paper, has mandated changes to the way local government works, combining District and County Councils to make Unitary Authorities.



A consultation is now underway (closing on 14th September) seeking your view on having two Unitary Authorities - one for North Warwickshire (Nuneaton Bedworth / Rugby) and one for South Warwickshire (Warwick, Leamington & Stratford). You can find out more by clicking on 'engagement booklet' at www.stratford.gov.uk/news/press.cfm/current/1/item/138570. We currently favour the two Unitary Authority solution over an all-Warwickshire Unitary Authority for two reasons:

- 1. The English Devolution White Paper also requires Unitary Authorities to group together to form 'Strategic Authorities'. It is early days and things may change, but as it stands, it's not clear who we could group with. Many of the bordering Authorities have already identified their group and it does not include Warwickshire. By having a north and south unitary authority, we can combine to make a whole Warwickshire Strategic Authority.
- 2. We're concerned that any new authority, which will be larger and cover a wider area than the District Council will be more remote from residents and Parish Councils. There is a balance between gaining efficiencies associated with larger organisations and the organisation becoming too large to be a part of the community it seeks to serve. My view is that balance is closer with the two Unitary Authority solution.

Both solutions risk spreading councillors too thin. In my submission I have pressed for the new Unitary Authority to keep the same size areas as the current district Council (about 3,500 residents) to ensure no reduction in service to residents.

The questionnaire (www.shapingourcouncils.co.uk/get-involved) takes just a few minutes, and your opinions matter.

Warm Homes Local Grant

The new funding scheme to help homeowners and private rented tenants stay warm and cut energy costs is now open for applications. The Warm Homes Local Grant funding aims to improve the warmth and comfort of more of the worst performing homes across the District, whilst also reducing energy bills, carbon emissions and levels of fuel poverty.

There are two key criteria for eligibility:

- Having a combined annual household income under £36,000 (savings are not assessed) or receive means-tested benefits or are vulnerable to the cold.
- · Having a home EPC rating D or worse. But you don't need an EPC rating

I would suggest anyone whose household income is below £36,000 and has a house more than 40 years old should apply.

The initial online application takes five minutes and asks you some simple questions about your house if you do not have an EPC rating. After this, an assessor will ring you to discuss your application in more detail. If you are eligible for the scheme, an assessor will visit your home to determine the best energy efficiency measures, which could be various types of insulation, double glazing or clean heating sources. Any approved measures will be installed completely free of charge. Whilst this is paid for by the District Council, EON are the service provider.
