Shipston Town Council supports plans which pave the way for a new medical centre

Long awaited proposals for a new medical centre to cater for the growing population of Shipston and surrounding villages have moved a step closer. Plans now being progressed could see the centre built on the Campden Road.

Shipston Medical Centre has been offered land on the Ainscough Strategic Land (ASL) site, north of Campden Road, which was granted planning permission on appeal for a supermarket, petrol station, extra care housing and new homes. The land was offered on condition that Stratford District Council gives permission for 95 new homes on another site, south of Campden Road, which has since been granted by SDC's planning committee.

Following a lengthy discussion at its meeting in April, Shipston Town Council voted to support 'in principle' ASL's latest planning application on the south of Campden Road, on the condition that land previously earmarked for a community building on the 'supermarket' site, would be given to the medical centre. Under the terms of the agreement, development on the south site will not be able to begin until the site identified for the medical centre has been transferred.

Councillors raised concerns both about the speed of the proposal and the prospect of more houses for Shipston, on top of other large schemes proposed or approved. Overall, however, the town council felt there was a wider benefit to the community of accepting the proposal.

Chair of the planning working group, Martin Ferrier, said: "We recognise that this is an emotive issue and there are

Shipston welcomes new councillors

With the recent boundary changes splitting the town into two wards, councillors now represent either the north or south ward. Councillors Ian Cooper, Ali



Henderson, Peter White and Fay Ivens all stood in the North ward, with remaining councillors representing the south. No voting took place as there were the same number of candidates as there were seats.

The first meeting of the new council will be on 11th May at 7pm, where the Town Crier will welcome all attendees and the new Mayor of Shipston will be elected.

no easy answers. It is clear that Shipston Medical Centre will not be able to continue to provide the current level of services without a new building and having considered all the arguments, the town council believes, on balance, that the proposal on the table is the best chance we have of securing the long term future of GP services for the town."

ASL is only providing the land for the medical centre and associated parking. Shipston Medical Centre will still need to apply for funding from NHS England to build the centre. Dr David Williams, GP Partner, said: "We are grateful to town and district councillors and our patients for their support in helping us take a big step forward in our plans to build a new medical centre."

Work will now begin on securing the vital funding from NHS England to enable a new centre to be built.

April's hot topics

New councillors: Mayor, Philip Vial, congratulated all re-elected and new councillors to the Town Council. Philip also thanked Arthur Ivens, who is stepping down from the council, for his years of service.

Highways headaches: Problems with the illuminated sign on Darlingscote Road and a pothole near Berry Avenue were reported by Jackie Warner and will be followed up by the Town Clerk.

CAB Directory: A directory of services, provided by the Citizen's Advice Bureau, is now available for residents to refer to at New Clark House. The document is full of useful information and signposts to relevant services.

Pavement parking: Ian Cooper raised concerns about vehicles parking on pavements, particularly large goods vehicles around the town centre. Councillors were advised to contact the Shipston Safer Neighbourhood Team if they spot a vehicle causing an obstruction.

Blooming marvellous: Fay lvens congratulated Shipston in Bloom on their spring displays which have been looking so vibrant around the town.

Woolly heritage: Ronnie Murphy announced that the Heritage Centre will shortly reopen at the Post Office and is expected to remain through the summer.

Cemetery concern: A resident raised concerns about some aspects of maintenance at the cemetery which the Town Clerk will follow up.

Campaigning for Shipston

Vehicle activated signs: The county council has confirmed money is still available for the vehicle activated signs previously agreed for Stratford Road and London Road. An update has been requested on when the signs will be installed.

Picnic benches: A local resident has requested additional picnic benches be placed alongside the river on the land owned by the district council. District councillors will follow this up.

Centenary Gardens support: Shipston Town Council will help fund the work needed to install the Centenary Garden at the Gyratory (see article on page 2).

Dog fouling campaign: Shipston Town Council is beginning work on a public information campaign to tackle the ongoing issue of dog fouling. Although most dog owners responsibly clear up after their pets, the minority who don't are causing an unsightly and unhealthy problem for everyone. Riverside Walk: Progress on the proposed Riverside Walk has been temporarily halted while the landowner considers some additional information. The working group is in contact with the landowner and hopes to be able to progress the project further soon.

Cemetery Lodge: Extensive work will soon have to be done at the cemetery lodge. The town council will be seeking a site visit and meeting with the district council conservation officer to help prepare an appropriate application for works to be carried out.

Astronomy and adventure

Children from Shipston Primary School have enjoyed lifetime opportunities in astronomy and adventure.

Along with their peers from sister school Acorns Primary in Long Compton, the children spent three days away from home reaching new heights with outdoor activities and team building experiences.

Students get first experience of new building

A group of students had the privilege of being the first to enter the new teaching block being constructed at the High School. The students are members of an enthusiastic band of wouldbe architects, engineers, designers and other construction industry professionals who have been regularly giving up lunchtimes to visit the site to see the building taking shape. They have been keenly following its development since it started and have been eager to don helmets and high visibility vests to view the site. They were not disappointed.

Although still very much a work in progress, the students were able to climb the stairs to the first floor to see the size and shape of the new classrooms and other areas. Despite the lack of any internal walls, they could easily imagine the other spaces including the location of the lift. The most eye-catching feature is the two storey atrium which will have a balcony



running around it on the first floor with views down to what will be a large foyer with an open plan study area downstairs, and a view up to a giant glazed area of the roof that will flood the new building with light.

The children stopped off on the way at the Owl and Small Breeds Centre in Kington (Herefordshire) where they were shown various animals up close including tortoises, goats, ferrets and owls. Pupils learnt that owls cannot turn their heads all the way round and they are not all nocturnal.

The group finally arrived at the Abernant Lake Hotel in beautiful sunshine. Pupils were soon participating in their first activity and over the three days were always active in numerous physically and mentally demanding challenges such as the zip wire, abseiling, climbing and an obstacle course. Children learnt how to canoe and kayak on the lake, with some finding the water was much colder than they anticipated!

Parents, carers and the wider world were updated with photos and videos via twitter and the school website.

Head of Federation Christian Hilton said: "The staff and I were very proud of the pupils as they challenged themselves in

every activity, often surprising themselves with their hidden abilities. collaboration skills and determination to overcome their fears."



The regular visits to the site have only been made possible by the generosity of Trendgrey, the construction company, and Kevin Wynne their Site



Manager. They have willingly supported the visits as part of their ongoing commitment to education and to promoting careers in the construction industry. Meanwhile the school is continuing to press ahead with the next two phases of its complete re-development and has just received approval to develop the plans for planning permission.



People who depend on electricity for home medical care, or who have special communication needs, can find power cuts particularly worrying. Western Power Distribution, who maintains the infrastructure for our electricity supply, offers a priority service for people who rely on medical equipment, such as oxygen or nebulisers, which need electricity to run. This service is also available to people with stair lifts, people who are visually impaired and people recovering from operations. Families with young babies may also be eligible. Registered users will be given a direct phone number to call in the event of a power cut, an agreed password prior to any visits to help people feel safe and the provision of special help, if needed, through organisations such as the Red Cross. Remembering Shipston's Fallen – May 2015

7930 Private ARCHIBALD HENRY NICHOLS

Archie was born on 31st March 1888 to parents William John Edward and Emma Nichols, of New St., Shipston-on-Stour. On the 13th April 1891 Archie enrolled in the Infants School moving up to the Boys School on 2nd July 1894 which he left on 30th March 1901. The census taken the following day shows the family living in Telegraph Street, and William working as a Pork Butcher.

After leaving school Archie joined the Gloucestershire Regiment serving for nine years before transferring to the Reserves in January 1914. He joined Warwickshire Constabulary in February 1914 but was called back to the colours when the 1st Battalion mobilised on the 4th August. The Gloucesters landed in France on the 13th August and first went into the front line on the 23rd August at Mons. They came into contact with the enemy the following day.

Through the Autumn the Battalion fought a series of battles and suffered heavily, losing the vast majority of its original soldiers. In December 1914 Archie was wounded at Givenchy and on 22nd January 1915 the Stratford Herald reported that he was in hospital in Sheffield recovering. Returning to France in March 1915 Archie joined the 2nd Btn Gloucestershire Regiment. 8th May saw the Germans attack on Frezenberg Ridge and the 2nd Gloucesters came under a furious barrage with shells directly hitting their front line trenches. This caused very heavy casualties, some platoons being reduced to a mere handful of men.

The following day, anticipating another attack, the Gloucesters retired the majority of the men, leaving a small force to hold the line. The Germans attacked and after desperate fighting broke into the Gloucesters' trenches. They were eventually driven off but the Battalion had lost 5 officers and 140 men. Whilst the official date of Archie's death is 10th May, it is presumed that he was actually killed on the 9th May.

Archie's body was not found and he is listed on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium and is remembered on the Town and County School Memorials.
