#### Shipston's Food Festival weekend proves a sell out success

The Shipston Food Festival Weekend far exceeded even the most ambitious expectations, with hundreds of people turning up across the weekend to enjoy gastronomic delights.

Kick-starting the weekend was the first ever Beer and Curry Festival held at Shipston Rugby Club. With the gates opening at 4pm, the clubhouse and field was soon full as people made the most of the opportunity to try 16 local ales and five ciders, accompanied by homemade curries. Children were far from forgotten, with musical and combat entertainment laid on to suit different age groups, and food to satisfy all.

Dancing continued until late, with live entertainment provided by bands including Barney & Jerv, The Momettes, Ruck & Maul, and Battered Soul. Amongst the entertainment was the serious business of beer tasting and judging. Pure Gold from Purity Brewery Co. was crowned the overall winner of the Local Brewery Competition and the Drink of Shipston Rugby Club Season 2014 - 2015.

The Festival finale came on Sunday when the town centre was packed with hungry visitors. Stall holders ranged from local oil producers to gastronomic burger kitchens and plenty in between. Many stall holders sold out, with some rushing off to get more supplies to satisfy the crowds.

#### Town council news: September's hot topics

**Free-flowing drains:** Councillors and residents have reported that the recent repairs to drains on the Darlingscote Road have been successful, resolving a long term problem with rainwater collecting at the West Street end of the road.

**Speed activated signs:** The long awaited signs for London Road and Stratford Road are due to be installed around Christmas.

**Shoulderway Lane proposals:** Martin Ferrier, Philip Vial and both district councillors have met the planning agents working for David Wilson Homes to discuss the Shoulderway Lane proposals. Despite proposing a development of up to 100 houses, the agents had no plan to address infrastructure issues. They have since arranged a meeting with the Neighbourhood Plan team. A public consultation/information event was held on 11th September where the proposals were outlined. For an update on planning issues, see page 3.

**Pesky pigeons:** A number of councillors raised concerns about aggressive pigeons nesting in properties around the town centre and being fed by some residents. The council is looking at options to deal with the issue.

#### **Campaigning for Shipston**

**Recycling frustration:** Ian Cooper raised concerns that opening hours at the recycling centre are too short and don't fit in with when residents are most likely to use the facility. Councillors agreed to add an item for discussion to the next agenda.

**Centenary Fields:** Fay Ivens suggested that the new the football fields also be considered as potential Centenary Fields in Shipston. Further discussions will be held at the next council meeting.

#### **Town Council business**

**Monthly market:** Trial markets are planned for the 9th Nov and 14th Dec, both of which will have a Christmas theme.

**Communications update:** New legislation introduced by the government now allows members of the public to record council meetings. The council's Facebook page continues to be well read, with 7,000 people viewing the page in one exceptional week!

#### Special Feature: Planning Shipston's Future

#### Shipston's role in Stratford District's Development Plan

Stratford District Council is responsible for preparing Development Plan Documents, including a Core Strategy, which set out planning and housing policy for approximately 20 years.

One of the supporting documents will be a Site Allocations Plan which details sites that could be considered for development, whether for housing, retail, business or industrial use. The consultation on this document closes on the 2nd October.



Neighbourhood Plans can include site allocations, enabling the community to identify which sites might be most suitable for which types of developments at certain times. A Neighbourhood Plan can also allocate specific sites which should not be considered for any development. Although landowners can also put forward sites for evaluation, SDC has indicated it would prefer Neighbourhood Plans to take the lead on site allocations where they are being developed.

SDC has submitted its draft Core Strategy, covering the plan period 2011-2031. It is due to be adopted in Spring 2015. The Core Strategy identifies that 235 new dwellings should be built in Shipston during the plan period.

#### **Housing status**

As things currently stand, over 300 dwellings have been given planning permission within the core strategy plan period, including the following recent applications:

Hornsby Close (22 dwellings)
Former IMI Norgren site (112 dwellings)
Campden Road, south (72 dwellings)
London Road (55 dwellings)

Paddock View (15 dwellings)
Former Pettiphers Garage (8 dwellings)
Springhill (9 dwellings)

A decision is still awaited on the proposed housing and supermarket development, which includes 184 homes (or 205 if Plan B is progressed, without a supermarket). A further development of up to 100 dwellings is being proposed by David Wilson Homes on greenfield land off Shoulderway Lane.

Should these developments go ahead, over 600 homes could be built in Shipston within the next few years. With the planning applications that have been granted, Shipston has already exceeded its Core Strategy housing target.

#### Securing new infrastructure

Shipston Town Council and the Neighbourhood Plan team are particularly concerned about the impact of the amount of development on the town's infrastructure, including schools, health facilities and the road network.

The town council's Sustainability Group is working with the Neighbourhood Plan team and developers to try and ensure any future development is supported with



appropriate funding to pay for the additional infrastructure needed.

#### **Next steps**

Allocating sites for development in the Neighbourhood Plan would give our community a greater say over when, where and what type of development might go ahead in future. It

would not automatically mean those sites would be developed. Sites can be identified for specific purposes and for development at specific times as well as being identified as unsuitable for development.

Shipston Town Council has agreed to support the town's Neighbourhood Plan team in identifying sites, if appropriate, subject to clarification of costs.



#### The role of the Neighbourhood Plan

Shipston's Neighbourhood Plan is a community-led plan involving significant evidence gathering, consideration of the needs of the community, SDC's Core Strategy requirements, and public consultation. Good progress has been made and there are plans for more public consultation in the near future.

The Neighbourhood Plan supports the delivery of the district council's Core Strategy and covers the same time frame, but enables community input to ensure planning decisions reflect local needs.

The Plan can cover developments for economic or commercial use, infrastructure and services use, green or public spaces and public realm, as well as housing.

If and when adopted our Neighbourhood Plan would become part of SDC's overarching District Development Plan, supporting the delivery of the Core Strategy. This means it carries weight in planning policy for Shipston.

Shipston Neighbourhood Plan team is drawing together evidence, needs and ideas and talking to key stakeholders across its 4 main topic areas – infrastructure, housing, economy and environment – to form proposals and suggestions that will be put to the wider community for comment and input later this year.

These proposals will then be refined, amended and further developed before a final Neighbourhood Plan can be produced. Prior to adoption, the plan will be examined by Stratford District Council and a public referendum will be held.

We want you to make the most of any opportunities to get involved and have your say as the Neighbourhood Plan enters the most important stages of input on the emerging proposals.



an extensive external assessment, the school has been awarded the prestigious ICT Mark for the second time

The 2014 award recognises the school's success in developing the strategic use of technology in administration and across the curriculum over the past five years. Head of Federation Christian Hilton said: "I am delighted we have been awarded the ICT Mark. It recognises our positive approach to the use of technology and the benefits it is bringing to our children."

Mark Chambers is CEO of Naace, a professional association which works to advance education through ICT. He said: "Shipston Primary thoroughly deserves the accolade of an ICT Mark accreditation. They clearly demonstrate how important it is to take a whole school approach to using technology in schools."

Shipston Primary has invested significantly in technology and ICT training. Children from the age of four use technology every day to enhance literacy, maths and creative play, while older children learn computer programming, in addition to video editing and podcasting.

Shipston High School has built up an impressive tradition of success in public speaking. Last year nearly two-thirds of the school entered the annual inter-House public speaking competition and teams of speakers have reached the final stages of competitions at local, regional and national level.

Jonathan Baker, said, 'The reason we put such an emphasis on speaking in public is that it is really important in helping students build up their confidence and character and it teaches them a skill much in demand by higher education and employers.'







It is always a pleasure to welcome Bill Hannis to our meetings. He seems to have a never-ending list of talks. On 1st August, he started with an account of his first flight which was to Copenhagen, and then a trip to

A small amount of stillness and movement is all it takes to soothe the nerves and refresh the brain. Give it a try. We look forward to Lee's visit again on Friday, 7th November.

On 5th September we had a thought-provoking talk from Maggie Drury, a Speech and Language Therapist from Cape Road Clinic in Warwick. Her subjects were 'Communication' and 'Eating and Swallowing'. These basic activities can become a problem for people in the later stages of their dementia experience and their carers. We took part in a practical exercise trying to communicate messages to each other without using our voices, rather like Charades. We all agreed that it was difficult and frustrating, took a long time, made us feel like giving up and embarrassing for all parties - rather like being in a foreign country and not knowing the language. #### **Age Concern**

We have lunch clubs that are scheduled to meet on Tuesdays and Fridays at the Community Lounge at Stour court, Old road, Shipston and on Thursdays at Rainbow Fields, the Driftway. We run a programme of trips, once a month during the summer months, using and supporting the Shipston Link. We also run a nail clipping service in Shipston and Quinton using qualified NHS practitioners.

Currently, our Friday lunch club is dormant, for lack of volunteers and our main Thursday cook has given notice to retire at Christmas. Many of our volunteers have given many years service, but all stand down at some stage.

Our lunch clubs and excursion programmes are in danger of closing unless we recruit more volunteers to help operate them. For that little bit of service to those who might otherwise be alone, please give a little bit of your time often less that half a day per week to volunteer to be part of our team.

There are also serious implications for Shipston's already overloaded infrastructure, especially the medical centre, schools and roads. Landscape issues and access along the narrow Shoulderway Lane also are matters of great concern.

In addition I think these plans are premature given that the local Neighbourhood Plan and the District Council's Core Strategy are making good progress. The much delayed Core Strategy housing master plan should hopefully be adopted in the early part of 2015.

I am very keen to see a Neighbourhood Plan for Shipston. This will be a locally agreed plan, which will define development in the town with regard to infrastructure and need.

#### In other news:

The District Council is consulting on the location of polling stations. I have put forward the case for making use of the Scout Hut in future elections but if you have any further views please let me know.

I have been very pleased to be able to help the parents of the young firefighters scheme in their desire to keep the scheme going in Shipston. This is now looking very possible and may come under the umbrella of the Shipston Youth Club management committee.

#### **Shipston Medical Centre**

#### Help protect yourself from shingles and pneumonia

Shingles is an infection of the nerves and skin around it. It is caused by the herpes zoster virus, which most people catch as chicken pox when they are young. The virus stays dormant (inactive) in the body, kept that way by the body's immune system. As we get older our immune systems can be less effective, and sometimes the virus becomes reactivated, causing the painful rash that is the main symptom of shingles.

Older people are particularly vulnerable to suffering complications from shingles, some of which can be quite serious, such as nerve pain, hearing loss and pneumonia. To prevent this from happening there is a national vaccination programme to vaccinate those aged 70 against Shingles. This year, there is also a 'catch up' campaign to vaccinate those aged 78 and 79 (born between 02/09/34 and 01/09/36).

If you are going to be eligible for this vaccination we will write

to you individually to advise you how you can receive the vaccination. We would encourage all those offered the vaccine to take it up.

Similarly, those aged 65 and above are entitled to be vaccinated against pneumococcal infection which is caused by Streptococcus pneumoniae – a common cause of pneumonia, which can also lead to invasive diseases including meningitis and septicaemia. Again, the complications from these diseases are more significant for older people. If you are 65 this year we will invite you to have the vaccine. If you are 65 or above and have not had the vaccine, you don't need to wait for an invite – book an appointment with the practice nurse before 31st March 2015.
