

#### Act now to represent your community as a Shipston Town Councillor

Shipston Town Council is calling on residents to consider putting their name forward to become a town councillor ahead of the forthcoming elections.

Local elections will be taking place on the 7th May alongside the general election. For the first time, Shipston will be split into two wards – north and south – with nine councillors representing the south and four the north. The boundary runs along Darlingscote Road and down West Street.

Residents can put themselves forward for either ward, irrespective of where they live in the town, but their proposer and seconder must live in the relevant ward which they propose to represent.

Nomination forms can be collected from New Clark House and the deadline for receipt of nominations is the 6th April (if handed to New Clark House) or 9th April if delivered by hand directly to Stratford District Council.

Town Mayor, Philip Vial, said: "I urge anyone who has some time available and is passionate about the future of Shipston to put themselves forward for election. Being a town councillor does require a reasonable time commitment but can be extremely rewarding and provides an excellent

The recent Race Night fundraiser held at the Townsend Hall, netted an impressive  $\pounds1,450$  for Cancer Research UK.



As part of Shipston's WW1 Centenary commemorations, the town's fallen during the conflict are to be remembered in the Gyratory Garden, which is to become a Centenary Field. The creation of Centenary Fields is a national move to identify places in local towns and villages where people can remember the sacrifices made by soldiers in the line of duty.

During WWI, 36 Shipston men fell and each one will have a terracotta coloured paver with his name and date of death inscribed upon it. These will be placed in the flower bed in the centre of the Gyratory garden.



#### Plant lover? Register a kilometre in the National Plant Monitoring Scheme

A National Plant Monitoring Scheme has been launched across the UK to find out more about local plants.

The scheme is the first of its kind and asks for volunteers to visit a kilometre square local to them and record the plants they find there in several different plots. The scheme will explore how plants in different habitats are responding to changes in the environment.

The NPMS is backed by the Government and is being delivered by a partnership comprising Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland; Centre for Ecology; Joint Nature Conservation Committee and Plantlife.

All volunteers registering for a square on the website - www.npms.org.uk will receive a survey pack which includes survey guidance, a species list and a species guidebook. Volunteers will also have access to free training courses as well as telephone and email support provided by the volunteer coordinator.

Volunteers are being asked to record up to 30 plant species in any one square or linear plot as long as it fits into 1 of the 28 NPMS habitats. More information about the scheme and how it works is available from the NPMS website www.npms.org.uk.

#### Shipston councillors to begin negotiations with ASL after appeal outcome

Following the recent decision by the Planning Inspector to grant the appeal for the proposed housing, supermarket and petrol station development on the Campden Road, Shipston Town Council is to begin exploring options with ASL which could benefit the local community.

Councillors who are members of both the Sustainability Working Group and the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, will begin 'without prejudice' discussions with ASL to see what changes, additions or contributions



might be considered as part of the scheme. Topics for discussion could include the provision of land for a new medical centre or funding for a school sixth form.

The councillors will be exploring options only and will not enter into any agreements with ASL or other developers. Any proposals will be brought to council for discussion and approval.

#### March's hot topics

**CCTV concerns:** Stratford District Council's response to the town council's letter suggests they do not fully understand the situation. Councillors expressed concern about the tone taken in the letter. The Mayor and town clerk will draft a response clearly stating the town council's position.

**Perilous pothole:** A gaping hole is causing problems for those parking in the New Street car park. The Town Clerk will follow this up.

**Portobello Crossroads:** Petitioners are continuing to seek a meeting directly with the relevant council officers and local police to discuss potential action to improve safety at the Portobello Road crossing. In the meantime, consideration is being given to the possibility of additional signage to help reduce accidents.

**Riverside walk:** Progress is being made to appoint solicitors to help with this project and potential ideas are being considered by the Riverside Walk working group.

#### Campaigning for Shipston

**Sports Club expansion:** The Finance Working Group chair confirmed that the town council would be able to support the Sports Club in their expansion plans by putting expenditure through the council in order to claim back the VAT.

**Junior fire fighters fight on:** A meeting to discuss the long term future of the junior fire fighters club is likely to see a national organisation help to manage and guide the club. Local fundraising will be necessary, however, to keep the club going.

**Neighbourhood Plan:** Councillors expressed their desire to maintain the momentum in developing the Neighbourhood Plan and recognised the need for strong leadership and financial rigour. Brian Cooper and Martin Ferrier will join the Steering Group with Martin Ferrier chairing the group. Monthly reports will be provided to the town council.

**Anti dog-fouling campaign:** General Purposes working group is looking into a new anti dog fouling campaign to tackle what is becoming a growing problem. A number of ideas are currently being discussed including naming and shaming as well as positive incentives to clear up after your dog.

#### Town Council business

**Proms clarification:** Following the reference made to the Police request to cease selling alcohol after 7pm, please note this only applies to the final Saturday, when the live band plays in the High Street during the "Last Night of the Proms" event.

**Sunday markets:** The town council voted to set up a new working group to look at bringing regular markets to Shipston. Input from the community and local traders will be sought.

#### Shipston Youth Club is bursting at the seams!

Membership of Shipston Youth Club has now reached over 200 young people across the three youth clubs, two for juniors and one senior. With support from Shipston High School, the Youth Club uses the floodlights to illuminate the area to the rear of the youth club so that the outside can be used when the weather allows. With this, plus the use of the school gym for games and occasionally hiring one of the temporary classrooms, the club has just about managed to accommodate the growing numbers.

Two new youth workers have been employed bringing the core team to four in all, ably supported by a band of volunteers. The club is still keen to find more volunteers both to help run the clubs and also to join the management committee. Club evenings have been lively and sociable with a very happy atmosphere. The various usual activities provided in the club and the gym have been enhanced by Rachel Walker, one of the new youth workers who has run some contemporary dance sessions. In addition, the Community Police Safer Neighbourhood Team have run workshops on 'Keeping Yourself Safe' - outdoors, online and in relation to drug awareness. Archery lessons and go karting trips are also being planned

#### Inspection confirms Shipston students are 'second to none'

For the third inspection in a row, Shipston High School students have been rated as 'outstanding' by Ofsted in its latest inspection of the school.

Following a two day inspection in January, inspectors rated the school as 'good' with many excellent and outstanding features including the behaviour of its students which was described as 'outstanding' and 'exemplary'. The report continues by praising the students for their 'excellent attitudes to learning'.

The inspectors also picked out for special praise the leadership and management of the school and the fact that the school has 'a strong ethos and powerful community spirit in which students' achievement and personal development thrive.' Furthermore, they commented positively on how students achieve well across the curriculum and on how the vast majority of students make good progress, including the most able and those with special educational needs.

Other strengths they noted were the quality of the teaching and the positive relationships between students and staff, the careers information, advice and guidance provided as well as the promotion of students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural understanding.

Headteacher, Jonathan Baker, said: "The report is a fantastic vindication of everything we have been working hard to achieve at the school. Although there are still some areas we need to improve on, we are delighted that the report is so positive. The

inspectors actually said to us, 'Your students are second to none' which only confirms what we always say, that our students are our best advertisement."

Thanks to the generous loan of the Bower Willis showroom and a commercial oven, plus a donation of 85kg of flour from Shipston Mill, volunteers, including Mayor, Philip Vial, began a relentless production line from Friday night to Saturday morning to ensure there was plenty of bread to sell the next day.

From sourdough to individual focaccia, the freshly made bread proved incredibly popular with everything selling out by 11 o'clock. All sales were on the basis of donations. This year's impressive total was more than double the amount raised during the team's first bread nose day in 2013.

Dan Scobie said: "We're absolutely thrilled to have raised such a large sum and I would like to thank everyone who supported this event, including bakers and buyers and the shops and businesses who supported us. Although there is a lot of hard work involved, it has also been great fun to run such a community-focused event for such great causes."





#### **Shipston Beekeepers**

#### Is it a Swarm?



If the 'swarm' is thousands of bees in flight darkening the sky or a grapefruit sized or larger accumulation of bees clustered together – then Yes. Otherwise – No.

Most honeybee colonies swarm each year when the old queen leaves the nest with half of the bees to find a new home. Whilst scout bees search for a suitable nest site the rest of the swarm cluster around the queen, perhaps in a tree, somewhere near their old home where at least one virgin queen is waiting to hatch, mate, and be the new matriarch of the colony.

Unless disturbed, a cluster of honeybees is not a problem and, if accessible, your local beekeeper will be pleased to come and take them away to his / her local apiary. All other manifestations of bees – be they honeybees in chimneys, garden bumble bees in compost heaps, miner bees in the ground, tree bees in bird boxes, masonry bees in soft mortared brick walls – are of no interest to a beekeeper other than for the part they play in the wonderful world of nature.

No honeybee or variety of bumble bee is naturally

aggressive if left alone. Be grateful that they have temporarily chosen your home as a 'des res' – all bee colonies die off in the autumn other than honeybees and even they will not survive as a colony for more than a year or two unless they are in a hive competently managed by a beekeeper.

A feral honeybee colony cannot be enticed out of its chosen home. It will not cause any damage to the fabric of a building and only in extremis should a pest controller be employed to eradicate any specie of bee. Wasps are a different matter!

In the months of April, May and June the British Beekeeping Association (BBKA) routinely receives a thousand telephone calls a week from ill-informed members of the public who are gently (normally!) directed to the BBKA website http://www.bbka.org.uk/help/do\_you\_have\_a\_ swarm.php where there are pictures of bees, wasps and hornets for identification purposes. Should the so-called 'swarm' be exactly that (see beginning of article!), the nearest registered beekeeper(s) can be found by the simple expedient of entering the affected property's postcode.

#### Concert report – View from the Podium

The work of an orchestra goes well beyond the public concert and most of the time is spent raising funds to keep the Orchestra afloat. This was the introductory remark by David Curtis founder and artistic director of the Orchestra of the Swan

in Stratford. It is well known that only about 40% of an orchestra's income is derived from box office receipts the rest coming from fund raising by Friends, grants from local government and Arts Council funding and every member of the orchestra has to play a part in this activity.

David then went on to explain how different a large concert orchestra with its full time members is from the small chamber orchestra which has to build its programme from freelance players. Large or small, both have to plan their activities well in advance and a lead time of two years or more is quite common. The programme has to be planned, venues arranged, players booked, marketing organised and when playing in venues around the country or internationally there is additional work arranging travel of players and the larger instruments. David is fortunate to have a small but dedicated staff in Stratford to assist.

The most important thing a conductor of an orchestra does is lead the members of the orchestra through rehearsals and performances. Standing on a podium in front of the musicians while executing a series of specific arm movements allows his musicians to interpret these, gaining information such as how fast or loud to play and although they learn this as part of their education each develops a style of their own which makes each orchestra unique. Rehearsals are a fundamental part of the conductor's work as he needs to describe exactly what he wants each member to do to get the specific sound he wants. An understanding of every instrument is therefore an important part of the job. In the second half of the evening David played some extracts from recordings made by the Orchestra of the Swan concluding with Copland's Appalachian Spring that had been recorded in the Townsend Hall in 2010.

#### **Shipston WI**

Muriel Pilkington delighted Shipston WI **UCC** with a fascinating talk on a local family the Mitfords of Batsford. The Mitfords are



an ancient family, tracing their roots back to the 8thc. when as Saxons they came to Northumberland from Scandinavia. They settled and there is still a Mitford village in the Redesdale area. The family prospered and after the Conquest, Sybil Mitford married a Norman knight. There is a family tradition of marrying wisely and well. They supported the Royalist cause in the Civil War and after the Restoration Charles II rewarded them by inviting John Mitford to London to help in re-building London after the Great Fire. John married an heiress who owned the Batsford estate and thus in the 17thc. the Mitfords came to Gloucestershire where they continued to prosper.

David Mitford married a wealthy lady (keeping up the family tradition) and on the death of his brother in 1915, unexpectedly inherited the title of Redesdale and the estate. These were the parents of the famous Mitford sisters. The girls were educated at home (except Nancy who insisted in going to school), and they were as different from each other as chalk is from cheese. All of them excelled in what they did: whether it was admirable or not, they threw themselves in wholeheartedly. Some were fascists, one a communist, another a journalist, one a successful novelist,

and the youngest, famously, saved Chatsworth which was facing ruin. Like all families, theirs was full of ups and downs, tragedies and farces, but the Mitfords had to live out their lives in the full glare of publicity.

The meeting continued with WI business. A skittles evening has been arranged, there will be a visit to the Jewellery Quarter in Birmingham and a visit to learn how Oxford coped during the Civil War. In the Autumn it is hoped to visit Bletchley Park which promises to be fascinating.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday, 1st April, 7pm in the Catholic Church Hall, Darlingscote Road, when the speaker will be Jo Carter talking about the Life of a Lady's Maid. All are welcome.

## New service to promote health in patients aged 75 and over

Along with other practices in South Warwickshire, we have recently launched a new service which aims to provide holistic clinical reviews for those aged 75 and over. The reviews will be conducted by Heidi Williams, who has been seconded from her previous role as Community Matron in order to work with the practice on the project.

The purpose of the review is to undertake an in-depth assessment of the health status of the person being reviewed, with a view to considering what pro-active measures may be helpful in helping the person maintain good health. Additionally, for those who are more frail or who have poorer health we have teamed up with Age UK Warwickshire who will undertake a thorough assessment covering aspects such as ability to look after oneself on a daily basis, transport, financial wellbeing and safety. It is hoped that these comprehensive reviews will complement each other and we will be able to improve the care we provide to individuals, as well as signposting them onto other services and resources that can assist in living healthily and happily. The practice

will be contacting patients individually throughout the year to offer them the opportunity to participate in this service.

The 'over 75s project' is a pilot running to 31st March 2016. ### Proud of My Town: Remembering Shipston's Fallen – April 2015

#### 9167 Acting Sargeant CHARLES BARRETT

Charles was the son of Henry and Eliza Barrett and was born in Fifield, Gloucestershire in the summer of 1884. The Barrett family arrived in Shipston in 1898 and a couple of years later the 1901 census shows Charles working as a Grocer's Porter and living in the family home in Station Road.

On the 21st June 1908 Charles married Annie Sumners, a Shipston girl,



in St Edmund's Church. The parish registers show Charles as being a soldier who was living in Surrey.

Having previously served 8 years with the Royal Warwickshire Regiment, Charles was a reservist and was called back to serve with the 1st Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment at the outbreak of war. The Battalion was at full strength by the 7th August 1914 and were ordered to Southampton where on the morning of the 22nd August 1914 they boarded the SS Caledonia arriving in Boulogne that evening.

By late April 1915, after an awful winter in the trenches, the Battalion was ordered to Ypres. The war diary for 25th of April, the day of Charles' death reports that they attacked at 4.30am. The Battalion's casualties were very heavy, 17 Officers, 500 other ranks, killed, wounded and missing. Charles was killed in this attack and his death was reported in the Stratford Herald and Evesham Journal. He is buried at the New Irish Farm Cemetery, Ypres, Belgium, and is remembered on the Town Memorial and the Adult School Memorial.
