What a year! Shipston Forum recalls some of the highlights

2012 has been a whirlwind of activity in Shipston, thanks to the dedication and enthusiasm of local volunteers.

For once, the sun truly shone on the annual Wool Fair, at which the Shipston Tapestry was launched. Woolly activities were swiftly followed by a wonderful weekend of Diamond Jubilee celebrations, including a community Songs of Praise and Flower Festival, plus a fun-packed event at the Sheldon Bosley Hub. The torchlight procession to the beacon is still talked about as one of the most memorable events in Shipston.

Hot on the heels of the Jubilee came the Shipston Proms – two weeks of eclectic musical performances to suit all tastes. The Last Night of the Proms celebration was one of the best-attended and enjoyable finales to this established Shipston event. We have also celebrated the 100 year anniversary of Shipston Town Band, culminating in a spectacular concert in October, while numerous other concerts, activities and fairs have taken place.

But it hasn't all been about events. 2012 saw the purchase of the police station by Shipston Town Council, the saving of the public toilets in Telegraph Street and the successful conclusion of a long-term battle for a new scout hut. In May, we saw the election of several new faces to represent the town and the Town Council is now operating without councillor vacancies for the first time in over a year. We also recently saw the successful reopening of Shipston Youth Club, under new management.

There have been plenty of challenges along the way, particularly in budget and planning terms, with many proposals for major developments coming forward and increased financial pressure on popular services.

As we head into December, there is no sign of a slow down in the events programme, with the Victorian Evening, Mayor's Charity Gala Dinner and several concerts among the highlights this month. All of these events and achievements are made possible thanks to the colossal amount of work done by Shipston residents, raising money for a broad variety of local and national charities.

Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "I feel privileged to have been Mayor during 2012, with the opportunity to attend so many important events in and around the town. On behalf of my fellow councillors, I would like to express our sincere thanks and congratulations to the many volunteers who have worked so hard to deliver exciting and successful fundraising events in Shipston."

Neighbourhood Plan gets green light to proceed

Shipston Town Council has voted to proceed with the development of a Neighbourhood Plan following a positive response from the public at the October launch event. This should be a community-led initiative, with the Town Council's role being primarily to fund and oversee the process to ensure it meets the criteria set by government.

The Neighbourhood Plan (NP) provides an opportunity for all residents to have a say in how the town should be developed. Through a series of community engagement activities, views will be sought on a range of planning issues including employment, housing development and infrastructure.

Work is now underway to develop a dedicated website – www.Shipstonnp.org – and community engagement plan to publicise the NP process. An overview of the next steps, will be included in the January Forum. In the meantime, please visit www.shipstononline.org to download the scoping document, which explains the process to date.

Shipston Town Council takes a view on major planning applications

Major planning proposals were in the spotlight once again at the November town council meeting.

Philip Vial, chair of the Planning Working Group, reported that Banner Homes is hoping to build 66 homes on its site on the Campden Road. The developer intends to delay any application until the Neighbourhood Plan has been completed. However, current council policy objects to any major development along the Campden Road.



Cala Homes has appealed against the decision to reject its planning application on the Norgren site and a public inquiry will be held in February 2013. Councillors voted to maintain the council's opposition to the development.

The appeal against the decision to reject proposed new houses on Hornsby Close will be heard on the 18th December. Having previously not made a representation, councillors voted to object to the application on a number of planning grounds including environmental impact, sustainability, and impact on existing residents and amenities.

Although Shipston Town Council does not have any powers to make decisions on planning matters, it does submit a view on each one which is a material consideration when the district council assesses applications. If you have a view on any application in Shipston, please share your thoughts with the Town Council as early as possible in addition to responding directly to any consultation.

Food bank arrives in Shipston

St Edmund's Church has launched a Food Bank to help local residents if they find they have run short of food and the cupboard is bare.

The Food Bank takes place at St Edmunds on Wednesday Mornings from 10.00am to 12.00pm and coincides with the church's coffee mornings. Rev Jill Tucker is encouraging those in need to pop in for a coffee and collect a bag of food. There is even a children's corner with toys to keep toddlers occupied.

Rev Jill Tucker said "we can help you with an emergency food pack to help you through a crisis – such as unexpected bills, benefit payment delay, job loss, or on a low income. We would expect a referral through your GP or Care Provider, but I'm very happy to hear from anyone who wants to find out more."

November's hot topics

Priority potholes: Ronnie Murphy has reported potholes in Queen's Avenue directly to Jeff Morris at WCC. Swift action is expected.

Soggy playground: Libbylous Playground has been badly affected by flooding recently and has had to be closed on occasion for safety reasons. Arthur Ivens is now checking the playground daily. The gates will be locked if the park is flooded.

Drains and flooding: Melanie Trapp raised concerns about flooding on the Darlingscote Road and Fosseway junction. Chris Saint believes the problem may be overland drainage as the Highway drains are working effectively. The drain on Stratford Road by Cripplegate continues to cause problems and will be raised again with WCC.

Mind your head: Melanie Trapp raised concerns about congestion in Tilemans Lane and the impact on safety, after narrowly avoiding being hit on the head by a bus' wing mirror. All councillors echoed concerns about the parking issue. The Town Clerk will speak to the bus company to see if any changes can be made to the route during the school run.

Missing lights mystery: Ian Cooper raised concerns about streetlights that have been removed but not replaced. Chris Saint will look into what is happening and whether replacements are expected. Shipston Town Council (STC) has requested that any replacements use LED lights if possible.

Campaigning for Shipston

Sheep Street changes: Warwickshire County Council has taken on board recommendations from STC and has updated its plans to alter Sheep Street to safeguard access for emergency vehicles.

ASL proposal: ASL has submitted an amendment to its planning application, including a change in the height of the Extra Care Housing and the removal of community allotments. A short period of consultation will follow. As a result, the Stratford District Council planning meeting has been deferred until the New Year.

Neighbourhood Plan: STC voted to proceed with a Neighbourhood Plan which will be overseen by a Steering Group chaired by Stephen Miles. Ian Cooper (finance), Adrian Jelf (planning) and Richard Cheney (district council) will sit on the group, with others being co-opted if necessary. The new district councillor will also be invited to join.

Town Council business

Planning briefing: A number of councillors attended the meeting with Acting Planning Manager, Peter Yates, who visited Shipston to understand the town better. Some councillors are to take up planning training offered by Mr Yates/SDC.

Remembrance Sunday: All councillors congratulated Georgina Beaumont for her handling of the road closures for the Remembrance Parade.

Highways Schemes: Chris Saint encouraged STC to put forward suggestions for small highways schemes which could be delivered through the individual county councillors' budget scheme.

Precept setting: The precept-setting meeting will be on the 3rd December, which will include the allocation of community grants. Recommendations will be brought to the 10th December full council meeting for sign off.

New Clark House Update

Winter weather warning

After such a soggy summer, it is hard to imagine anything other than rain coming our way this winter. If you are concerned about flooding, please sign up to



the Environment Agency's flood warning system by calling 0845 988 1188. Please report any blocked drains to New Clark House as these can contribute to flooding.

Wet roads can mean icy conditions, particularly at night or in the early morning. Please take extra care when out and about.

If we do have snow, the town council's volunteer snow wardens will help to clear footpaths and entrances to facilities such as the Medical Centre. It's a good idea to ensure you have your own supply of grit to keep your drive or paths as safe as possible.

Beware door-to-door sales

Reports of door-to-door sellers have increased. While it is not illegal to sell goods door to door, anyone doing so must have a police issued Pedlars Certificate which will indicate that the person has had some background checks made on them and that they are of good character.

The Safer Neighbourhood Team has issued the following advice:

- Place a card visibly in a window stating you don't buy items at the door
- Always keep front and back doors locked, even when you are in the house and ensure that side gates are kept locked.
- Ask to see a Pedlars Certificate
- Do not invite a stranger into your home, even if they ask to use your loo or have a glass of water.
- Do not feel obliged to buy something. If their selling techniques are forceful or you have suspicions, contact the police on 999.


Festive family fun awaits at the Primary School Christmas Bazaar

Just days after watching top women's teams Birmingham City and Arsenal Ladies, the girls from Shipston were inspired to raise their game and clinched the South Warwickshire Schools' FA Cup.



The journey to the final saw Shipston winning all three matches in Group 1 including Tanworth (2-0), The Willows (1-0) and Bridgetown (1-0). Shipston Girls then went on to play Bidford in the semi-final where they scored two goals against one scored by Bidford within extra time.

The actual final between Shipston and St Nicolas C of E Primary, Alcester, was full of drama.

Jim Armstrong PE Leader at Shipston Primary congratulated the team and said: "The girls' attitude, enthusiasm and willingness to improve has made it a pleasure to coach them: it even made me start taking my FA coaching badges! With Women's football bigger than ever after the introduction of the Women's Super League and massive interest in the Olympics, it is really fantastic that girls' football has established its own identity at Shipston."

Girls' football has gone from strength to strength at Shipston Primary, ever since Birmingham City Ladies Football Club visited two years ago. The school is passionate about giving children the best possible sporting opportunities, forging links to strengthen the PE curriculum and competitive sport. The school has worked with Paul Eden a UEFA 'B' Licensed Coach from Stratford Town FC; Paul Bearman, Stratford Athletics Coach; as well as Olympic Athletes in the past two years.

News from St Edmund's

We are in the process of appointing a new Rector of the Shipston Benefice, which includes St. Edmunds, Shipston, with Tidmington, All Saints' Honington and St. James the Great, Idlicote, Unfortunately, the appointment process is a long one and we do not expect to appoint a new Rector until early 2013.

Meanwhile as the Advent and Christmas season draws nearer, we would like to reassure you that life at all the Churches continues as normal. Rev Jill Tucker, along with Rev Mike Harris and the other members of the ministry team, has taken over much of the day-to-day duties of the parish churches, and can be called upon for the normal Baptisms, Weddings and Funeral enquiries.

We look forward to welcoming everyone to the churches who has not been for a while or perhaps have never been to a Sunday morning service (times and dates can be found on your local church notice board). Coffee and biscuits are served after the St Edmunds 10 am service. We especially look forward to welcoming everyone to the Advent and Christmas services, details of which are above.

Shipston Arts and Crafts Society

The Society met in October to hear Dr Richard Yeomans talk on Islamic Architecture. In fact, Dr Yeomans spoke of the history of the Islamic religion and culture, illustrating with slides of the mosques and citadels built by the people over the centuries.

The faith was started by Mohammed, born in 400 AD, beginning in Mecca - the world's oldest and biggest trading centre. It is still the main place of pilgrimage today for all Muslims. The faith spread across the Middle East, Far East, Asia, into China and even southern Spain, splitting into factions and diversifying, creating the beautiful buildings seen today.

The Arabian people were traders and travellers, not builders, so most of the buildings, either in stone, clay or bricks, were built by Roman, Greek and Byzantine craftsmen, leaving their influence on the varying designs. A mosque was a place of worship and refuge for the travelling people. A citadel is even greater and would also be a place of learning, teaching the Muslim faith and care for the sick.

In Spain the Islamic faith was replaced by the Christian faith, leaving behind the famous Alhambra of Granada as one of the buildings of Arabesque influence. The lecture was a dual learning evening of both the faith and architectural heritage of the Muslim people, which we found most interesting. There is no meeting in December.

It's been a very busy time for Stour Valley Lions. On Remembrance Sunday, Lions provided road traffic control for the town's Annual British Legion Parade, following a request from the British Legion. In



addition to manning the road barriers Lion President John Cavana also laid a wreath on behalf of Stour Valley Lions.

The evening commenced with "Crisantemi" (The Chrysanthemums) a short, but hard to play piece, written in a single night by Puccini in 1890 in response to the death of Duke Amedeo of Savoy. It was performed by the Orchestras strings section with their usual great passion.

"Centuries of Meditation" was commissioned by the Three Choirs Festival and first performed this year. Written by Dobrinka Tabakova, the young British/Bulgarian composer it is a setting of the words by the 17th Century mystic Thomas Traherne which inspired Tom Denny's four stained glass windows in the Audley Chapel of Hereford Cathedral. The orchestra and choirs performance of this work, like the burnished reds, gold and greens of the window, positively glowed, with superb performances from the soloist's soprano Suzannah Pemberton and bass Simon Oberst. Faure's "Requiem" concluded the evening's programme, a unique work, concentrating on the serene and peaceful acceptance of death as rest.

Shirley explained that the process of thinking and talking about past experiences can make people feel valued and respected, it gives them a chance to escape from everyday problems and, in a group setting, can create links with other people and forge new friendships. Triggers used should aim to stimulate the senses of sight, hearing, smell, taste and touch, and also movement which can help with co-ordination.

Letter from Martin Ferrier

I believe there are issues arising from the report into the Shottery planning decision which affect Shipston. The District Council does not appear to have a Draft Core Strategy (the local plan) which stands up to appeal by developers because it is inconsistent with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

Up to 50% more houses will be needed to satisfy the requirements of the NPPF, that is 3-4,000 more! Actual delivery is already nearly 1,000 houses behind. There will be pressure on Shipston to accommodate even more houses than currently predicted. Shipston can cope with 300 more houses only if at the same time it negotiates for significant improvement in the sustainability of Shipston. To resist more houses you need to demonstrate that Shipston is not sustainable.

We need a rethink on the town's relationships with the County Council, District Council, and developers.

Firstly the town council should go through the NPPF and find out objectively where the town stands with respect to sustainability. Secondly it should accelerate the developments of parts of the neighbourhood plan such as sustainability, transport, and housing location, creating an abbreviated plan. We need leverage now in negotiations with the District Council as they struggle to develop an acceptable local plan.

District Council update

The District Council is reviewing its planning policies, following the planning Inspectors decision allowing the Shottery housing development to take place. The Inspector said that the Core Strategy should allow for the building of 11,000 to 12,000 houses in the district between 2008 and 2028, instead



of the 8,000 proposed by the council's Cabinet. At the time of writing we are not sure what the impact of this will be on Shipston but I do think it will be some time before there are approved planning policies in place that could be a defence against large scale developments here and elsewhere. The NPPF does of course stress that any new development should be 'sustainable'.

Preparations for a Shipston Neighbourhood Plan are progressing. I have been asked to be a member of the steering group that is going to oversee this valuable project. I am very happy to join this body and help to ensure that the Neighbourhood Plan is developed in a fair and representative manner and that the views of all Shipston residents are heard and taken into account when considering the future development of Shipston.

I understand that the planning application for a 2,500 sq. metre supermarket, 130 Extra Care houses, 50 market houses and a petrol station in the fields off the Campden Road is now likely to go to planning committee in the new year. I am still maintaining my objection to this developerled proposal.

County Council update

Remembrance Sunday

I write just after the Annual Service of remembrance, but before the elections for a Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC).



There were concerns that Police might not support the parade in Shipston, which cannot take place without traffic control. Councillors had worked behind the scenes to maintain a Police presence and I was pleased to see them in action. Our new PCC will be asked to maintain the budget for this type of work.

Bus services

Operating both sides of the County Boundary, services 50 and 50A are subsidised by both Warwickshire and Oxfordshire County Councils.

Oxfordshire's relationship with Stagecoach has led to Sunday service changes on the number 50 to Oxford via Long Compton. There are no changes to the service 50A to Brailes and Banbury.

There will now be four buses, each Sunday, direct to Oxford and four back. I'm sorry for the short notice, but I only learned about the changes a few days before they were introduced on 11th November.

Community Links transport

We have lost the funding for our local service where the public could book a Community Links vehicle for the price of a bus fare and this service is at risk. Sadly it costs over £100,000 a year to maintain across the District for less than 350 regular users, so we will look at more innovative ways of helping those who are isolated through lack of transport.
