Successful outcomes for Shipston thanks to partnership working among all age groups

Positive improvements have been implemented thanks to successful partnership working between the Shipston and Stour Community Forum and young people in the district.

The Community Forum approached youngsters at Shipston High School and Youth Club back in March to find out what their priorities were for Shipston. The first initiative was to provide a shelter for young people which has since been implemented at the Skate Park and is already proving popular.

Second on the list was the persistent problem of dog fouling on the streets of the town, particularly around the high school and primary school. The Community Forum launched a poster competition to encourage owners to clean up after their pets.

Imogen Cross, aged 11, from Shipston High School was recently crowned winner of the competition with her football-themed 'No Fouling' poster. The poster will be printed and distributed in and around Shipston and the wider Stour area.

Stratford-on-Avon District Council's Dog Warden, Sophie Peacock, joined Councillor Mike Brain from Warwickshire County Council, PCSO Andy Steventon and Georgina Beaumont from Shipston Town Council, to present Imogen with her prizes. Imogen was also invited to the Community Forum meeting on the 11 June where she was presented with a framed certificate and copy of her winning poster.

All pupils who took part in the competition were presented with gingerbread men/dogs, courtesy of the local bakers in Shipston.

All local residents are encouraged to attend the Community Forum meetings which take place quarterly around the local area, with two meetings a year held in Shipston. The meetings provide an opportunity to discuss local issues with the police, county and district councils as well as voting on policing priorities for the Safer Neighbourhood Team. groups. More volunteers are needed and there is still plenty of scope to get involved.

Make sure you turn the key on the opportunist burglar

With the prospect of warmer weather finally on the horizon, Warwickshire Police is keen for people to make sure they don't fall foul of sneak-in burglars.

As the weather warms up people will be spending more time outside catching up on jobs in the garden, or simply enjoying the chance of being out in the fresh air. But the message from Warwickshire Police is make sure you close and lock the door behind you when you go outside.

George Stepney, Community Protection Manager for Warwickshire Police said, "Burglary has decreased significantly in Warwickshire. However as soon as the warm weather arrives, we see an increase in the number of sneak-in burglaries where householders haven't locked their doors or have left a window open."

Despite warmer evenings and overnight temperatures, residents are also advised to make sure that all doors, patio doors and downstairs windows are securely locked at night.

"It only takes a couple of minutes, but it will save you a great deal of time and heartache replacing property that has been stolen in a burglary" George Stepney added.

June's hot topics

Wool Fair thanks: Fay Ivens led the congratulations to the Wool Fair committee on organising another successful event for the town (see pages 1 and 6 for details).

Weed killer concerns: Concerns about the overuse of weed killer were raised by a number of councillors. Specific sites were reported which will be investigated by the town council.

River blockages: Fay Ivens has received a number of complaints about the build up of silt which is now blocking two arches of the bridge over the river. The Town Clerk will write to the Environment Agency to request action.

Cemetery damage: Jackie Warner raised concerns about the damage to some gravestones and the removal of some grave markers at the cemetery. Photographs of the damage were provided to aid an investigation which the town council's General Purposes Working Group will undertake immediately.

Trip hazard: Roy Munden reported concerns about uneven block paving at Cats Corner (the corner of Church St and Stratford Rd) which presents a trip hazard, particularly to elderly people. STC will raise with the highways department.

Blocked drains: Further concerns were raised about blocked drains around the town, all of which have been previously reported to WCC Highways Department.

Dangerous driving: Adrian Jelf reported concerns about erratic driving at the rugby club. The issue has been reported to the police who are now discussing options with the club. Meanwhile excessive speeds and overtaking has been witnessed on the Stratford Road heading out of Shipston. The General Purposes Working Group is already looking at a range of initiatives to try and tackle the problem.

Food Festival: Shipston Town Council agreed to formally support the Shipston Food Festival which will take place on the 29th September.

Campaigning for Shipston

Cala Homes Appeal: Town councillors, Ian Cooper and Paul Rathkey, gave evidence at the inquiry into the Cala Homes planning application appeal, as did district councillors, Richard Cheney and Jeff Kenner. Paul Rathkey focused on the concerns about the visual impact of the proposed development at the Norgren site, while Ian Cooper, representing Stour United Businesses, focused on the need to retain the land for employment use. The evidence was believed to be well received and the outcome is due in a few weeks.

Streetlights petition: Melanie Trapp and Fay Ivens attended the WCC council meeting to submit the petition calling for a change to the part night street lighting policy. The petition attracted over 1,000 signatures. There will be a review of the policy in September and the petition will be included as part of that process.

Tourism group: Following useful sessions with 'Hidden Britain', Trev Trevethick will be leading a group to focus on developing a tourism strategy for Shipston, with a view to securing opportunities for employment and business growth for the town. The town council supported the move and will be represented on the group by Ronnie Murphy and Georgina Beaumont.

Town Council business

Forum deliveries: There continue to be patches across the town where the Forum is not being delivered. The Communications Group will look again at whether an alternative, cost effective delivery solution can be found.

Annual Accounts: The 2012/13 accounts have been reviewed by the auditor and accepted by the town council. The Finance Group were thanked for successfully ensuring the council completed the year within budget.

District council changes: A public consultation is under way regarding the boundary review which will see the number of district councillors reduced across the district, together with proposal to elect all councillors in one four year cycle. Comments from the public are invited until 5th August. Please visit www.stratford.gov.uk for details.

New Clark House Update

Allotment price rises:



Following the announcement of the plan to increase allotment fees next year, a number of allotment holders attended the June meeting to voice concerns.

Complaints included concerns about whether the costs associated with running the allotments had been calculated over a suitable amount of time, as well as whether there might be potential to minimise costs by reducing the amount of grass cutting and other maintenance paid for by the council.

Councillors listened to the concerns and, following a lengthy discussion, it was agreed that the General Purposes Group would look again at the rises, specifically checking the cost of allotment provision over a five year term and whether concessions might be possible for certain groups.

The council will take the opportunity to gauge reaction from a wider group of allotment holders and will provide clear information about the cost to the council of running the allotments. Allotment holders will be invited to take part in the discussions.

Any price rises will not be implemented until 1 July 2014.

Employment tribunal:

Following reports in the local media, the Town Council would like to clarify that it did not 'lose' the unfair dismissal claim against it at the recent employment tribunal. A settlement was agreed. The council is unable to comment further as all parties in the case have signed a non-disclosure agreement as part of the settlement.

The Council voted to thank Councillor Paul Rathkey, Chair of the Council's Staffing Group, for the many hours he has put into supporting the Council's case throughout this process and to accept the settlement.

Young children from Shipston Primary School have been exploring the Animal Kingdom for their school trips this year.

One child in the Wrens class said: "My favourite animal was the tortoise because its shell was soft and smooth when I touched it."


Christian Hilton Headteacher said: "It is so important to take learning outside the classroom and both trips have brought school topics to life as well as giving the children a memorable day."



Shipston Music Society May Concert

It was a rare privilege to have the internationally renowned Classical Guitarist Dimitris Dekavallas perform for the Society in May. The audience even included guests who had travelled from South Wales just to hear him perform works ranging from Eastern European romantic pieces to the fast Latin American flamenco.

Dimitris is a D'Addario artist, a non-profit organisation committed to inspiring and assisting the growth and appreciation of music throughout the world by partnering with passionate music educators like himself. Graduating from the Royal Academy of Music in London he has given recitals and master classes around the World with some of the greatest musicians of today such as John Williams and Julian Bream.

The evening performance started with the Tarantelle by Janos Mertz the 19th century composer followed by his variation Mignonnes. Mertz's guitar music, unlike that of most of his contemporaries, followed the pianistic models of Chopin, Mendelssohn, Schubert and Schumann and was expertly interpreted and performed by Dimitris. Other treats included works by Issac Albeniz - Asturias and Sevilla, Gaspar Sanz popular piece Canarios and Manuel De Falla - The millers dance finishing with four traditional Spanish songs for the guitar.

As an addition to the programme Dimitris played "Greensleves" switching effortlessly between its traditional arrangement and a flamenco style much to the rapturous applause of the audience.



Shipston Arts & Crafts Society

The Society met on Tuesday, 21st May when Mr Mark Hancock, a wood turner, designer and lathe artist of international repute, told a crowded hall of his life working with wood.

Mr Hancock began by making bowls - beautiful bowls in exotic and natural wood from burr to burnt - making each bowl uniquely beautiful. Gradually the pictures on the screen changed as he began to experiment in shapes and his expertise in turning developed. He gained a place at a training workshop in Philadelphia, USA, where he began to make vases in contemporary shapes. It is well known that when collectors examine a piece they always turn it over and look at the base - causing much amusement!

He makes pieces like a Calla Lily, a hedgehog, a tangle of string, a tiny goblet on a twisted stem - each carved from a single piece of wood - beautifully and skilfully turned, lovingly polished to glow, sometimes embellishing with a touch of gold leaf. Mr Hancock's international reputation is appreciated by collectors of his work. This is well deserved and was greatly enjoyed by a fascinated audience.

There were interesting slides of the development of transport used by Warwickshire Police, from horse drawn carriages to Panda Cars.



On 31st May, Allen Reed, also well known in Warwick for his knowledge of World War One, spoke about the "life of the Tommy" covering the Trenches, fleas and lice, trench foot and gas masks. He also had an interesting array of artefacts including helmets, grenades, rifle and wiring posts.

Volunteer Transport Scheme – Shipston and Surrounding Villages

Our Shipston Office is a branch of the Volunteer Services, Voluntary Action Stratford-on-Avon District (VASA). The Volunteer Transport Scheme covers the whole district with offices at Alcester, Shipston, Southam and Stratford.

Across the district we covered over 27,800 passenger trips during the year 2012 - 2013 of which over 5000 passenger trips were from Shipston and surrounding villages to local Hospitals, Doctors and health related appointments, plus outlying hospitals at Warwick, Coventry, Oxford, Banbury, Birmingham, Worcester and as far as London. This is a true lifeline to mainly older people as they say they would not be able to attend appointments without our caring supportive volunteers.

The Shipston Office is staffed by 6 dedicated volunteers with a wonderful team of caring drivers, of which we would appreciate more, especially in Shipston town. Drivers can work to suit themselves and need only do local journeys if preferred. The drivers do receive the national volunteer rate of 45p per mile for authorised journeys, but give all their time and care free.

Normally the referrals are from clients who have been given the information from the hospitals, medical centres and clinics. We also arrange transport for the Mental Health Services, Social Services, Alzheimers Day Centre and Warwickshire Association for the Blind

District Council update

1st October marks the start of the Public Inquiry on the application for a supermarket, petrol station and extra care housing less than 800 metres from the town centre. In my opinion there is strong evidence that, if approved, the new development will increase trips to the town centre with a linked bus service, and, along with a regular market, can help to rejuvenate it.



I recently gave evidence at the Public Inquiry on an application for a mixed residential/business development on the Norgren site. I reiterated my view that, if there is a realistic prospect of industrial development of the site in the near future, I will maintain my opposition to the proposal. However, in the absence of such evidence, to leave the site empty indefinitely would be the worst option of all.

One fact revealed in a new independent housing assessment for the District Council is that, as of January 2013, Shipston was short of 77 affordable homes over the next five years. Moreover, the new Bedroom Tax, which, in my opinion, has hit many people unfairly, is increasing demand for smaller homes.

Finally, it gave me great pleasure recently to open a new shop selling electronic goods in the town centre. It is very encouraging, in these difficult economic times, to see the entrepreneurial spirit alive and well in Shipston.

Appointments

Over the past few months we have made a few changes to our appointment system.

Urgent Appointments

The main change is that a Doctor will telephone triage patients who feel they need an appointment urgently. We have found that the benefits of doing this are that some patients can be given advice or appropriate medications can be prescribed without them needing to have a face-to-face consultation. For other patients where there is a medical need, we are able to prioritise them and see them quicker.

Routine Appointments

Where people wish to make an appointment for a new problem, but don't feel it is urgent, there are usually some appointments available within the next few days. We would ask that for normal routine appointments, such as a check up for an ongoing condition, patients expect to book these at least 2 weeks in advance.

Appointments are available for booking up to three months in advance, and we would encourage patients to let us know

However, we have found that the numbers of patients requesting telephone calls has risen significantly. We would therefore encourage patients to consider if they really do need to speak to a Doctor, or whether one of our medical secretaries can help. Typically, our secretaries are able to help with queries relating to hospital appointments, information to and from hospitals and other care providers, referrals and reports. We would encourage patients to speak to Doctors only when they need medical advice, such as guidance regarding the management of their condition or taking medications. Our secretaries are bound by the same rules of confidentiality as the Doctors and will liaise with the GPs and/or pass messages on if needed. The secretaries can be contacted


