Councillor Philip Vial has been elected Mayor of Shipston at the Annual General Meeting of Shipston Town Council, which was opened by Town Crier, Marion Lowe.

Philip Vial was delighted to accept the role, receiving the chain of office from former mayor, Ronnie Murphy. "I am honoured to be elected mayor of Shipston and look forward to representing the town and supporting our local community." Philip said. "I am extremely grateful to Ronnie for the excellent service and dedication she has shown over the past year and I will do my best to maintain the high standard she has set."

In stepping down from her previous role, Ronnie Murphy said: "I feel honoured to have had the opportunity to represent Shipston at over 100 civic functions and community events over the past 12 months. I wish Philip every success in his new role."

A vote was taken to decide on the Deputy Mayor, after two nominations were received. Jackie Warner was duly elected, having been nominated by Brian Healy. Jackie Warner said: "I am delighted to take on the role of Deputy Mayor and look forward to working with Philip and my fellow councillors to

I sincerely hope that with a strong petition and objections from councillors, we will be able to secure a positive result for Shipston's Young Firefighters."

Shipston to host new pop-up Heritage Centre

The Shipston Wool Fair committee has successfully bid for funding for a heritage centre, designed to encourage more visitors to the town from the end of May to September.

The Wool Fair is now an established and highly popular event, attracting visitors from far and wide. Keen to build on its success, the committee applied for funding from Operation Footfall run by Warwickshire County Council to support visitor and footfall projects for market towns in Warwickshire. The funding has enabled a small pop-up heritage centre to open in Shipston every year,

to encourage and welcome more visitors into the town from May to September. Because it is a pop-up centre it can be moved to empty shops around Shipston, or any locations that want to be involved.

The centre is starting out its life in the Shipston Post Office, with its first day on the 26th May and then it will be open from 10am to 4pm daily for visitors to come and find out about how wool and sheep have helped to build up the rich history of Shipston.

The centre will feature the Shipston Tapestry, which was woven by over 200 local people and has taken over 3,000 hours to weave. The Tapestry was designed by Ros Lobb for the Queen's Jubilee in 2012 and the weaving has been supervised by Ros and Ann Howells of the Stratford Guild of Weavers, Spinners and Dyers to deliver an amazing pictorial landscape



of Shipston and some key buildings. Finished this year for the Wool Fair, it was inspired by the famous Sheldon Tapestries woven in Barcheston in the late 1580s, which were based on maps of the area. Come and find out all about the full story of these tapestries at the Heritage Centre.

The Shipston Heritage Centre is looking for local people who may like to volunteer at the centre for two hours at a time to meet and greet visitors to the area and help them get the best out of their visit. Can you help people get web wise?

Web Wise, an organisation dedicated to helping the over 50s make the most of the internet, is due to start courses in Shipston soon and is looking for tech-friendly volunteers who could help teach newer users some simple techniques.

This year is the 25th anniversary of the internet, which is now an essential part of the global economy. Yet 11 million people in the UK, most of them older people, lack the necessary skills and capabilities to participate in what most of us now regard as normal life.

Web Wise is funded by Comic Relief, and is delivered by Age UK Warwickshire, in partnership with Citizens Advice Bureau Stratford District. The project provides free training to anyone over the age of fifty who wants to learn how to use the internet. The courses focus particularly on staying safe online, improving money management skills, saving money and keeping in touch. Each course is supported by Web Wise volunteers.

The Web Wise Project will be running courses in Shipston between the beginning of June and the end of August. Each course comprises six, two-hour sessions.

May's hot topics

Annual town meeting: Ian Cooper shared compliments from a member of the public who attended the Annual Town Meeting. They were very positive about the work done by the town council but disappointed to see so few people attending the meeting. A greater level of promotion may be considered next year.

Fabulous footballers: Roy Munden updated councillors on the string of successes Shipston Excelsior has had this season. All councillors expressed their congratulations and the Town Clerk will also write to the club to congratulate them.

Perilous potholes: Complaints were raised with Warwickshire County Council about the poor patching of the potholes in Station Road, while others were reported in Simpson Road. The blocked drain by Cripplegate was also reported.

Sign success: Councillors are delighted to see that the Donnington Road sign has now been fixed thanks to Stratford District Council's Streetscene department.

Campaigning for Shipston

Proud of my Town: Several councillors have received compliments about how good the town has been looking recently. Thanks go to the monthly litter-picking team, Lawns2Mow and Shipston in Bloom for their efforts in keeping the town at its best.

Core Strategy: Stratford District Council has approved its draft core strategy which is now out for six week consultation. It includes plans to build 10,800 homes in the district, including a new settlement at Gaydon/Lighthorne Heath. For more information, visit www.stratford.gov.uk

Maintaining a thriving town centre: A number of new shops have opened in town recently, particularly along Church Street. However, the current state of the Post Office is a real cause for concern. At the request of local residents, the Town Clerk will contact the Co-op for an update on its expansion plans.

Proactive planning discussions: Meetings have been held between Shipston Town Council's Sustainability Working Group and ASL regarding proposals for the Campden Road site. Separately, a meeting was held with Warner's Budgens to understand their proposals for a new Budgens store on Tilemans Lane/Darlingscote Road.



A busy term for Shipston Pre School and Badger Valley Nurture Nursery

Children from Shipston Pre School and Badger Valley Nurture Nursery enjoyed a visit from Warwick the Road Safety Bear this half term. A Warwickshire County Council initiative, Warwick the bear teaches road safety to very young children in a fun and interactive way using puppets and songs. All the children received a storybook to take home reinforcing the message to take care on the road.

The Nurture Nursery has had an exciting first year with children benefiting from the small group sizes, and it has been a very busy year at Pre School with some sessions at capacity for the summer term.

Bookings are now being taken for September and both Shipston Pre School and the Nurture Nursery are offering free places for eligible 2 year olds. Funded places of up to 15 hours per week are available for 2 year olds if their families are receiving certain benefits. Shipston Baptists get a flavour of India!

Shipston's Stour Valley Baptist Church recently hosted a team of four young people including their own Jake Hudson Wood from Tredington. Jake has just returned from working with the team in Calcutta, India, as part of a Baptist 'Action Team' gap year.

This involved raising over £4,500 which meant Jack could spend six months working with children from the streets and slums of India's third largest city. The number of people who live on the streets in Calcutta is equivalent to the entire population of London, so there was a lot for Jake to get used to.

He and his team spent the bulk of their time working with a charity school that helps prepare street children for the discipline of actually going to school. Many who have attended have either eventually graduated from school or even university or have returned to help others escape the poverty of street life.

"Working with children is something I never thought I would enjoy, but I found that even if I had a day off I was disappointed not to be with the kids" Jake said. He and the team shared their experiences not only with the Baptist church but in classes and assemblies at Shipston's Primary and High Schools.

India had clearly had a huge impact upon the team. "Through working at the school I am sure I have learnt much more from the kids than they have from me" Jake continued.







This is not for books but for simple electronic aids to make living easier. Funded by the Department of Health, the library offers people the opportunity to borrow equipment for two weeks giving them the time to trial and assess its suitability for their particular needs without the expense of making a purchase. On requesting an item to borrow a 'payment' must be made but this is returned when the item is sent back to the library.

If you decide that the item is going to be beneficial to you the DLF can give you an impartial list of national suppliers whose prices will vary. There is an amazing range of products suitable for people with memory difficulties and for more information you can either visit the website www.dlf.org/library (the staff at the library in Shipston are always happy to help you access the internet there), or phone local volunteer Barbara Smith on 01608 662433 for a brochure.

District Council update

The District Council has now adopted a housing master plan, known as the Submission Core Strategy planning document that will go to a planning inspector for consideration, following a six week 'technical consultation'. As part of this plan, the council agreed that 10,800 houses should be built in Stratford District between 2011

and 2031 including a new settlement of 2,500 houses near Gaydon/Lighthorne Heath.

The Banner Homes planning appeal to build houses off the Campden Road, behind Oldbutt Road, will now be heard by a planning inspector on the 25th June in the District Council offices, Stratford.
