Shipston Town Council appoints Jackie Warner as Mayor

Shipston Town Council has elected Jackie Warner to the position of Town Mayor at its Annual General Meeting in May. Jackie was born and bred in Shipston and is a passionate supporter of the town. Jackie has been a town councillor for many years. Having served 12 months as Deputy Mayor, Jackie is looking forward to the year ahead.

On her election, Jackie said: "I feel honoured to be elected Mayor of Shipston. Shipston is a fantastic place to live and work and I am delighted to have the opportunity to raise the town's profile."

It is customary for the Mayor to appoint a consort whose role is to accompany the Mayor at official events. The Mayor has selected councillor Peter White as her consort.

Jackie's first responsibility as Mayor was to call for nominations for Deputy Mayor. Veronica Murphy was unanimously elected to the position and will support the Mayor on her official engagements and responsibilities over the coming year.

The Mayor went on to thank former Mayor and town councillor, Philip Vial, for his contribution to the council and town as a whole over his seven years on the town council.

"It's been an absolute pleasure to work on the town council over the last seven years." Philip Vial said. "There are a lot

The town council also confirmed monthly meetings for the year ahead as well as working group membership.

Richard Emms named first recipient of The Shipston Award

Shipston choirmaster, Richard Emms, was the proud recipient of the first ever Shipston Award, which was announced at the Annual Town Meeting in April.

Previously known as the Anne Sankey Medal, the Shipston Award is an annual accolade, awarded to an individual in recognition of their voluntary contribution to the local community.

Richard Emms was nominated for his extensive contribution to music over the past 40 years, including a long history of composing, performing and conducting.

Richard and his family settled in Shipston in 1975, where he founded a small choir, which quickly grew to a full and flourishing choral society, the Stour Singers. He retired from school teaching in 1995, and in 1997 founded Cantamus, which allows him to indulge and share his particular love for *a cappella* music. He also played a large part in the founding and early years of Shipston Proms.

Much of his musical life now revolves around the choirs, with Stour Singers recently celebrating its 40th anniversary at a special concert in St Edmund's Church. On receiving the award, Richard said: "What a lovely surprise! It is an honour to receive this award."

Roy and Grace Tanner were also nominated for the Shipston Award for their long term commitment to raising funds for the Katharine House Hospice.

Councillors expressed thanks to both Richard Emms and Mr and Mrs Tanner for their support and commitment to the local community.

May's hot topics

Slow down signs: The vehicle activated signs for Stratford Road and London Road have now been ordered and will be installed shortly. Warwickshire County Council has apologised for the delay.

Outdoor activity funding: Thanks to s106 money linked to local housing developments, Shipston Town Council has access to a pot of £60,000 towards outdoor facilities for non-child specific activities. Following a brief discussion about potential uses for the money, the matter will be added to the next council agenda.

Riverside walk update: Sheelagh Saunders reported that the landowners have changed their position regarding a potential walk. They are still happy to help facilitate a walk but only if it can be circuitous incorporating a river crossing. The working group will continue to consider possible options.

Licensing application: Councillors discussed a proposal from Martin McColl Newsagent to obtain a licence to sell alcohol. Concerns were raised about the hours of day the shop had applied to sell alcohol as well as the potential impact on other local businesses. STC opposed the application which will be raised with Stratford District Council's licensing department.

Campaigning for Shipston

Anti dog-fouling campaign: Councillor Sheelagh Saunders will be taking a creative approach to raising awareness of the continuing problem of dog fouling. More news will be reported on this next month.

Neighbourhood Plan: Brian Cooper provided an update on the status of the project, including a breakdown of costs to date and anticipated costs to complete the plan. The council anticipates applying for a further grant application to fund completion of the plan. In addition, work is being done to finalise the project plan. Councillors recognised that there continues to be only a small pool of volunteers delivering the project. Councillors have requested a monthly update of specific progress against the project plan.

Making Shipston's voice heard: Shipston Town Crier, Marion Lowe, reached third place for the best dressed town crier at a recent competition. Shipston's Town Crier also represented Shipston at the Shakespeare Birthday celebrations, resulting in her being pictured alongside other Warwickshire Criers in the Observer national newspaper.

New district councillors: Councillors welcomed new district councillors, Chris Saint and Jo Barker, following the election on 7th May. Both councillors attended the STC meeting and will share responsibility for updating residents on latest news from the district council in the Forum column on page 14. Thanks were expressed to the outgoing district councillors, Jeff Kenner and Richard Cheney, for their considerable work in recent years.

GCSE Students Get To Grips With Their Final Examinations

As for all secondary schools, the month of June at Shipston High tends to be dominated by the external examinations. Already by the beginning of June some of the examinations will have finished so, for example, Year 11 students at the High School have already completed most of their practical examinations in subjects like Physical Education, Drama and Art.

Anyone dropping into the school recently would have found it difficult not to have been impressed by the P.E. candidates keenly taking to the school playing fields on a blustery day in order to demonstrate their fitness and skills, or by the Art candidates focussing intently on their slowly emerging masterpieces, or the Drama students getting into character before performing in front of the visiting examiner.

If the work the students have produced to date is anything to go by, this year's crop of Year 11 students look set to achieve a record harvest of GCSE grades. The High School is already looking forward to the results day in August and seeing its leavers head off to their various sixth form and college places.

Election Fever Strikes Shipston High!

In the weeks leading up to the May General Election, election fever took hold of the High School as the students engaged with great enthusiasm in the school's mock election. Nine candidates stepped forward and between them they represented all the major parties as well as some of the fringe ones too. The candidates actively promoted their parties' manifestos and the school even had its own 'MyGov' opinion

poll which in its inability to predict a clear winner, strangely mirrored the opinion polls nationally. Then on the big day itself, the school set up its own polling station complete with monitors, ballot papers and a genuine polling box.

Once the votes had been counted and validated by the school's Returning Officer it emerged that the official Conservative Party candidate on 20% of the poll had the largest share of the vote closely followed by the Independent Conservative candidate on 18%. Together, however, they failed to gain a majority and, at the time of writing, are in heated discussions with the Liberal Democrat candidate, on 14%, about forming a coalition. The surprise of the election was the Green Party which took 16% of the vote.

As well as being a great source of entertainment and fun, the mock election had the more serious purpose of teaching students about the British Constitution and our democratic process. In this the election was a great success, and it was hugely rewarding to hear the youngest students in the lunch queue debating with great seriousness party policies and the idea of hung parliaments.

Shipston Arts and Crafts Society

At the April meeting of the Shipston Arts and Crafts Society, Helen Bratt-Wyton, the House Steward of Wightwick Manor, spoke about 'William Morris and Wightwick Manor'. Morris was the most influential designer of the nineteenth century who saw no distinction between the applied arts and the fine arts. His influence extended over many fields: in architecture, his house 'The Red House', Bexleyheath, Kent, was specially designed by his friend Philip Webb, and in its interior decoration other friends, including Edward Burne-Jones, were involved. The same group of friends decorated the interior of the Oxford Union in 1857. After 1861, Morris lead the firm, Morris, Marshall, Faulkner & Co, reorganised in 1875 as Morris & Co; its influence stretched across furniture and all aspects of interior decoration. Even in its most ubiquitous pieces, everything was handmade, even in the prolific decade between 1875 and 1885.

Wightwick Manor was designed in 1887 with a major addition in 1893 for the Theodore Mander by Edward Ould of the Chester architectural practice, Grayson & Ould, as an aesthetic house. The aesthetic movement was more concerned with how things look, in contrast to the Arts and Crafts Movement which is concerned with how things are made. The house contains many pieces by Morris and his circle, including the recently acquired preliminary drawings of the fox, rabbit, lion, and raven for the Forest Tapestry, a major piece of embroidery. Embroidery was

another of the specialities of Morris & Co.

Dementia – is it just about memory loss?



Dr Sue Pritchard gave a talk at the Alzheimer's Café held in Stour Court Friday 1st May.

The surgery has 25% of its total patient list over 65 years of age compared to 16% nationally and with increasing age, the prevalence of dementia increases.

Shipston as a Dementia Friendly Community is trying to get the message out into the community about Dementia. Short term memory loss presents as one of the symptoms of dementia, alongside impairment of cognitive skills, organisational skills and judgement. Delusions and sometimes hallucinations can also occur. Despite issues with short term memory, long term memories often stay intact. Dementia can be demoralising and scary, and sometimes people with dementia get low mood and medication can help.

Dementia can lead to changes of behaviour, which can sometimes be challenging, but we need to look behind the behaviour to see if it is a means of communication of other issues i.e pain or loneliness and respond accordingly.

We need to find ways of helping people to live well with Dementia. How can we support people day to day? The changes a person with dementia is experiencing can be anxiety provoking and we can help by being comforting, soothing, reassuring, and calming.

We are all social beings – we are part of a family, groups of one sort or another, friendship groups, in churches or with hobbies. Trying to keep involved with previous activities is important and we can help by focussing on things that can be done, not on where abilities may have been lost. We need to help preserve a sense of worth and value at whatever level. The use of photos and memory boxes help in preserving a sense of identity.

Support for dementia sufferers and carers

You are not alone with Dementia. There is a Local Carers group for those looking after someone with dementia (Stour Valley Carers), there is the monthly Alzheimer's Society Drop in Café, monthly Down Memory Lane with singing for all with memory problems, and a Befrienders group just starting. At all of these venues there are people who can help and advise, and point you to specialist help. Look out for notices on all local noticeboards and at the surgery. Alzheimer's Society have specialist support workers (Dementia Navigators) who provide help and advice one to one, and you can be referred to them if necessary. Louise Gillard-Brown is our local navigator.

Shipston – a Dementia Friendly Community, will be bringing forward new initiatives over the coming months, as we try to increase awareness of Dementia and provide much needed support to help people to live well with

Dementia. Read the Forum and watch your notice boards for more details.

Highways Budget

Members have settled the list of schemes that will benefit from member controlled budgets this coming year. Schemes I have promoted are:



- Portabello crossroads - £50,000 for new signage and junction improvements.
- A3400 by Horseshoe Public House - £12,000 for improved signage at the West Street junction

Additionally further funding is being sought from new housing developments to further improve the Portabello crossroads.

Joint Working

We are adding to the list of shared services to save you money. We have just agreed a scheme to provide Internal Audit Service to neighbouring Worcestershire County Council. Not very exciting, I hear you say but this work has to be done, a vital component of good management. Both Councils will make savings by working together.

Quality of Life

The pathway of Dementia diagnosis – What will happen when you go and talk to your GP?

There are over 100 different types of dementia, with Alzheimer's being the commonest. Short term memory loss presents as one of the symptoms of dementia. In addition, it causes impairment of cognitive skills, inability to find the right word, loss of ability to recognise faces/people/objects, loss of identity and loss of organisational skills and judgement.

If you are concerned about dementia, please book an appointment to see your GP who will ask you a series of questions. You can ask for a family member to be present. Your GP will organise blood tests and a CT scan to rule out other causes. You may then be referred to a specialist at the Memory clinic, often following a home visit by a nurse.

Once one has a diagnosis of dementia, it is important to ensure

that health care, wills and care options are discussed and put in place early on so you do not need to worry about these issues later.

What should you do if you are worried about yourself or a friend/family member?

If you are worried about someone else, who does not want to seek advice from their GP, ring the surgery in confidence, and the subject can be noted on file and raised opportunistically the next time the person attends surgery.
