## Shipston Tapestry to be the 2012 Wool Fair Challenge

Following the successful creation of the Shipston Hat in 2011, Wool Fair organisers have decided to make a

The River Avon, as depicted within a large tapestry designed and produced by the Stratford Guild to celebrate their 25th anniversary in 2000.

Spinners, Weavers and Dyers, who will also help with the weaving.

The intention is to encourage as many residents, schools, organisations and retailers as possible to take part in producing the tapestry, so that the finished article is truly owned by the town.

Ann Howells, who is leading the project, is keen for everyone to get involved: "We are really excited about this tapestry project and hope residents will share our enthusiasm. We will be arranging dates when people can visit Clark House to add to the tapestry and also plan to take it to local schools and organisations."

The Shipston Tapestry will be on display at the Wool Fair on the 27th May, so that residents and visitors can see what has been done and continue to weave it during the day.

## Town Council mobile app puts Shipston 'in your pocket'

## Mayor's column

There are currently six separate proposals – yes SIX – to build further houses and accommodation in Shipston. If all were to be approved, this



would add over 300 new dwellings to the housing stock. This represents a possible increase in the town's population of some 20% within little more than a year. This is neither sensible nor sustainable.

An important document, Stratford District Council's Draft Core Strategy, is currently out to consultation. That document suggests Shipston should build 140-220 new units over the next seventeen years ie 8 to 13 a year not 300 a year! Large-scale developers do not have the interests of the town at heart. They will ruin it and then move on elsewhere.

The Town Council's position is both clear and consistent:

- We do not want to extend the five traditional entry points into the town.
- Developments should be contained within those existing boundaries.
- Small and modest developments, like the existing Angela's Meadow site and the planned Stratford Road development, will be supported.
- Large inappropriate developments, such as the two currently mooted on the Campden Road, will be opposed.
- There is a public meeting at the Townsend Hall on the evening of 6th March to debate one of the large-scale developments, the one with the superstore. I urge the public to attend.

#### Have your say on future development, town council urges

Public consultation has begun on Stratford-on-Avon District Council's Draft Core Strategy 2012 (which will replace the District Local Plan).

The document sets out how many homes are expected to be built in various parts of the district, including Shipston, as well as the amount of new employment land and where various types of development should take place over the next 20 years.

With Shipston currently facing the prospect of a number of small and large-scale developments, Shipston Town Council is urging residents to have their say. Mayor, Paul Rathkey, said "The town council is concerned about the amount of proposed development in Shipston and will be responding to the consultation to make our opinions known. Whatever your views, I would urge everyone to respond to the consultation so that we can feel confident the views of Shipston will be heard."

The final document will be used as the basis for future planning decisions in the district.

The consultation began in February and will run until Friday, 30th March 2012. Copies of the Draft Core Strategy 2012 are available online at www.stratford.gov.uk together with an online response form. Alternatively, CD versions and hard copies of the document can be obtained from the Policy Team, Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford-upon-Avon, CV37 6HX.

#### If you want faster broadband, WCC needs your views

Warwickshire County Council (WCC) has approved £3m to support the rollout of superfast broadband, to go with the £4.07m that is being made available to the area by the government body, Broadband Delivery UK. The private sector is also expected to invest to ensure all properties achieve speedier connections by the end of 2015.

WCC needs to demonstrate the service will be taken up and is calling on residents and businesses to help by completing its surveys about broadband demand and usage. The surveys can be found online at www.cswbroadband.org.uk

#### Transition Shipston launches campaign to protect Shipston town centre

A campaign to fight developers' plans to build a superstore in the Campden Road will be launched at a public meeting arranged by environmental group Transition Shipston, which will be held in the Townsend Hall at 7.30pm on Tuesday, 6th March. Everyone is welcome to attend.



Helen Winnifrith of Transition Shipston said: "Lancashire based developers Ainscough Strategic Land, are pressing ahead with their plans for a 2,500sq metre supermarket, despite widespread opposition

from local residents who fear that its development will sound the death-knell for our town centre shops and businesses. I urge everyone who values Shipston's town centre to come along to the meeting and help plan how we deal with the threat of this superstore – which would be 25 per cent larger than the Tesco at Stow."

The meeting will be chaired by Town Mayor, Councillor Paul Rathkey. After a short presentation by local speakers, people will have the opportunity to contribute their ideas to help plan the campaign, or simply pledge their support.

#### February's hot topics

**London Road proposed development:** Orbit Homes has secured an option to purchase land adjacent to Angela's Meadow for a potential new development of up to 70-80 homes (maximum). Plans are in the very early stages but it is expected the development will be private ownership-led, with a third of homes being affordable. The number and type of homes is yet to be decided and further details will be provided as the work progresses.

In response to the Orbit presentation, three local residents raised concerns about the scale of development in the town and the lack of jobs available for new and existing residents, particularly young people.

Willet's Piece: The town council confirmed it will not be selling the land at Willet's Piece.

**Dolly's delicious lunch:** Fay lvens congratulated the Diamond Jubilee Crew on an excellent Sunday Lunch event to raise funds for the Jubilee celebrations.

**Lacklustre lines:** Jackie Warner has asked that the markings for the disabled parking space outside Co-op be repainted, ideally in the correct colour.

**Drains again:** There were continued complaints about blocked drains throughout the town. Warwickshire County Council's (WCC) highways department is now looking into why work has not yet been carried out.

**Dropped kerbs:** Ronnie Murphy highlighted the dangers of motorised scooters being forced onto the roads because of a lack of dropped kerbs.

### **Campaigning for Shipston**

**Snow Wardens:** Fay Ivens led the thanks to the town's volunteer Snow Wardens for their hard work in clearing snow and ice at Shipston Medical Centre, Stour Court and other locations around the town. Thanks were also passed on from Shipston Medical Centre's practice manager, Rachel Vial.

**New bus shelter:** All councillors recognised the need for a bus shelter at the end of Telegraph St but it would have to be funded by the town council. This will be reviewed once the outcome of the Pettiphers planning application is known as there may be an opportunity to source funding from the developer.

**Future speed changes:** Chris Saint confirmed that changes are likely to be made to the current 40mph limit on London Road within the next 12 months.

**Lights out?:** Fay lvens queried news that WCC is considering switching some streetlights off between midnight and 5am. Chris Saint confirmed that this was being looked into. In the meantime, concerns were expressed about the number of streetlights not working around the town. The General Purposes Group will divide the town up among the councillors so that an audit can be carried out.

#### **Town Council business**

**Balancing the beds:** The town council supported Shipston in Bloom's request to establish a flowerbed on the right hand side of Campden Road as you enter the town, to match the one on the left. Shipston in Bloom will carry out the necessary work and will maintain the bed.

**Cemetery records:** Shipston Town Council (STC) is considering software which will move all cemetery records to an online database, to help maintain the town's history and aid people when researching family history.

**Housing needs survey:** Following discussions about the amount of development facing the town, STC will consider whether a new housing needs assessment should be done.

**Play equipment survey:** STC will enquire about the costs of commissioning its own play equipment survey from specialists used by WCC, rather than paying the insurance company to complete it. All play areas must be inspected annually for safety reasons.

**Communications:** Catherine Martin Communications Ltd and KMS Litho have been appointed for a second year to produce The Forum on behalf of the council, and Oliver James Enterprise will continue to manage the council's website and email system.

The Safer Neighbourhood Team will continue to be based at the police station and the town gardeners' store will move from the riverside site to the new building.

The Town Council's opening hours will remain the same. Please do keep an eye on the website for details of our move dates.

## ToughGuy challenge in honour of fallen Royal Marine

Twenty-four year old Shipston resident, Ben Fry, recently took on the ToughGuy 2012 challenge, in honour of his best friend, Marine David Fairbrother, who was killed in Afghanistan in September 2011.

Renowned for being 'the safest most dangerous event in the World', ToughGuy comprises of an eight mile cross country run through a 'Killing Fields assault course' with over 75 obstacles, where contenders face barbed wire, burns, electric shocks, claustrophobia, acrophobia (fear of heights) and dehydration. Freezing weather conditions also bring with it the severe risk and fear of hypothermia, making the finish line even harder to reach.

Dressed as fairies, Ben and his university friends completed the course in three hours, 17 minutes and have so far raised over  $\pounds$ 4,600 for the Royal Marines Charitable Trust Fund (RMCTF).

Ben said, "I've never been one for sports or athletics and the idea of ever taking part in ToughGuy was always laughable. Dave completed ToughGuy on three occasions and I thought he was mad. Knowing that I was doing this for such a good cause and in honour of my best friend and soul mate, I was determined to finish it! I'm so grateful for all the support and sponsorship I've received. Thank you again, to all those who donated."

### Children embark upon forest of learning

The arrival of an outdoor forest school has been a breath of fresh air for the children at Shipston Primary. Pupils from Year 1 have been the first to get into their wellies and waterproofs in order to explore the new forest school area, located at the top of the infant playground.

"The forest school offers an exciting opportunity for us to take the curriculum out of the classroom and into the natural environment," explained Head of Federation, Christian Hilton.

Forest Schools are about learning through experience and observation and were first established in Scandinavia in the 1950s, before being exported to the UK in more recent years. Research has shown that that this form of learning helps to boost children's confidence, self-esteem and independence, as well as nurturing respect for the natural world.

Teaching Assistant, Ms Westwood, has been leading sessions as part of her training to be a Forest School leader. She said, "It is lovely to see the children so absorbed in their learning and to see them working collaboratively.

"They all know the three forest school rules now too, which are not to run across the fire circle, not to pick living things

#### **Shipston Arts and Crafts Society**

The talk by Andrew Wilson-Jenner on Costumes in Theatre on Tuesday, 17th January, was split into two halves. The first was a detailed, hilarious, account of "behind the scenes" at Covent Garden Opera House. Mr. Wilson-Jenner was a tailor in the wardrobe department, working for a designer, making everything from hats to shoes (seven pairs per ballerina per performance!) There are usually four to five leading singers per character and they have to be costumed individually. When Covent Garden was closed for refurbishment, Mr. Wilson-Jenner got a team together and began making and supplying costumes for the theatre, film and TV.

Mr Wilson-Jenner's talk then turned to the costumes he had on display with him, including how they were constructed. Each costume is made in complete sections, which can be removed and replaced should repairs or alterations be needed

The evening ended with three ladies modeling, first a long cloak designed by Cecil Beaton. This was followed by a wedding gown for a private medieval wedding, which had cream and purple heavy brocade with purple lace and bead embroidery, crowned with a simple coronet of flowers. It looked fabulous! Lastly came the farthingale, petticoats, bodice, ruffle, collar and cloak of Queen Elizabeth I, each piece cleverly fastened together. A beautiful finish to a most entertaining talk by an expert speaker.

#### **Probus**

On 20th January, Ian Shapter described the battle of Agincourt with his usual clarity and humour. He has researched all the battles of the 100 years war in considerable detail, and included in his



slides pictures of the actual battlegrounds, some appearing to have changed very little.

In summary, Henry V landed at Harfleur with 2000 men at arms and 10,000 archers but numbers became reduced due to dysentery. They set off for Calais with 8 days food, but were diverted on their journey and it took 16 days to reach Agincourt, nevertheless they beat 25,000 Frenchmen. The casualties were astonishing - only 100 Englishmen but 10,000 Frenchmen were killed.

Sir Andrew Hamilton was the speaker on 3rd February. He has written a much-acclaimed book titled "Meet at Dawn - unarmed" which describes the well-known Christmas Truce at the beginning of the First World War. The book is based on the diaries of his Grandfather who was a muchrespected Captain in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment. Sir Andrew has carried out extensive research and has put together a fascinating story, including some family history and First World War photographs. There are also cartoons by his grandfather's famous friend, Bruce Bairnsfather.

### Would you like to keep bees?

A lot of people keep bees because they produce honey, one of the healthiest and most natural foods. Others keep bees because they are interested in studying them; bees are fascinating creatures and there is always something new to learn about them.

With no means of dealing with the varroa mite that is now present in all UK honey bee colonies, a feral honey bee nest is unlikely to remain viable for more than a couple of seasons. With the help of beekeepers, it is only managed colonies that can survive to carry out the essential pollination of our food crops. Bees can be kept by almost everyone except a very small minority who are allergic to bee stings.

Shipston Beekeepers are holding an "Introduction to Beekeeping" day on Saturday, 14th April at the Old Free School, Brailes OX15 5HT. The day will deal with the basics of beekeeping for beginners or those with very limited experience of this craft.

Ainscough continue not to keep their word (non-delivery of thousands of leaflets they said they would send out to let people know their intentions) and to give false information. I've still not met anybody who actually received this leaflet, but it states that both Shipston's Co-ops are "small convenience stores". The Midshires Co-op is classed as a convenience store and accordingly open for longer hours on Sunday. The Manchester Co-op (previously Somerfield's) is too large to be classed as a convenience store, which is why it has limited opening times on Sundays. Why do Ainscough not get facts right or at least publicly correct their mistakes?

I hope the meeting on March 6th in the Townsend Hall will help all of us opposed to Ainscough's supermarket on the green field site work together to keep Shipston's town centre special.

Simple measure such as a brief history of an elderly or frail person will tell carers that this person, who may be unable to communicate now, was once a vibrant and active individual and had a career and/or family. This helps the person be seen as more than simply a patient.

Services such as manicures and massage are also offered to raise self-esteem and morale among patients.

At the moment the consultation has 8 plots for "potential locations for development". We do not want more building in Shipston so please make sure you have your voice heard and comment.

We seem to still be waiting to find out when the Norgren application will come to Planning Committee East. I ask everyone to keep a look out for this! It could mean up to 130 new homes in Shipston, and the more people we can get to the committee to say no the better as it will only help in our attempts for it to be voted against.

Lastly, I am interested in the idea of having the meeting times of all major committees and Full Council meetings at the District Council in the evening (no earlier than 6pm). I hope it will increase the public attendance at meetings and be fairer, as you have the right to know what is going on. Please let me know whether you like this idea.

#### **Be Active Daily!**

Now the evenings are beginning to get a bit lighter and spring is making itself felt, it is an ideal opportunity to consider what exercise you do.

To stay healthy, adults should try to be active daily & should do:

- At least 150 minutes each week of moderate-intensity aerobic activity such as cycling or fast walking. Moderateintensity aerobic activity means you're working hard enough to raise your heart rate and break a sweat. One way to tell if you're working at a moderate intensity is if you can still talk, but you can't sing the words to a song.
- Muscle-strengthening activities on 2 or more days a week that work all major muscle groups (legs, hips, back, abdomen, chest, shoulders and arms). Examples of

#### Council Tax

Warwickshire County Council has now set its Council Tax for 2012/13. It is unchanged for the



second year running at £1155.25 for a Band D property, with others pro-rata. This will be collected by Stratford-on-Avon District Council together with the precepts for the District Council, Shipston Town Council and the Police Authority in one bill.

Despite continual funding demands of Adult Social Care and Safeguarding Young People, there will be over £19 million savings generated county-wide to keep down the Council Tax.

Money is tight and we need to demonstrate that our focus is on what matters. Regular readers will know that I have not been afraid to be critical when my colleagues overlook that Shipston-on-Stour is more remote from its neighbouring towns.
