

### New Clark House encourages services back to Shipston

Six months on from the Town Council's move to New Clark House, the former police station is now hosting a number of services and providing a useful resource for community groups and charities.

Stratford District Council has confirmed it intends to install a Customer Access Terminal (CAT) in New Clark House as soon as possible. CATs are already in place elsewhere in the district. They enable residents to speak face to face with a customer service officer at the district council via Skype. The terminal also allows people to show, scan or fax documents as required, reducing the need to travel to Stratford or send documents by post.

Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "We were all very concerned when Stratford District Council closed its office in Shipston. Installing a CAT is a very positive step forward in giving residents easy access to district council services and I'm delighted Shipston Town Council has the facilities to accommodate this technology."

The Citizens' Advice Bureau holds weekly advice sessions at New Clark House and the Safer Neighbourhood Team also operates drop-in surgeries from the council offices on alternate Thursdays. In addition, over 40 meetings have been held at the new building. Shipston has established a 'cluster network' with local parishes, inviting nearby villages to make use of New Clark House. The Town Clerk is also making arrangements for a tourist information display to be provided in the foyer.

### Neighbourhood planning starts early!

Approximately 100 people took part in a public meeting arranged by Shipston Town Council to find common ground between those for and those against proposals for a supermarket and petrol station. The session asked attendees to come up with ideas for how Shipston could be improved and enhanced. 'Protecting Shipston's unique identity', and 'improving employment opportunities in the town' came out as top priorities, with 'investing in future health services' and 'developing services for 16-19 year-olds' coming joint third.

Many people have fed back that they found the session constructive and interesting and the results will now help inform the initial stages of the Neighbourhood Plan. Some members of the public expressed concern that the meeting wasn't sufficiently focused on the issue of the supermarket, however.

Although a useful starting point, the findings are just an indication and limited to the views of those attending the meeting. The Town Council is therefore very keen to ensure the Neighbourhood Plan reflects the aspirations of the community as a whole and is actively encouraging as many people as possible from all age groups to get involved. "New Clark House is increasingly being used as a central hub for community meetings. Not only does this ensure the building is well used, it attracts more people into the town and raises awareness of the shops, events and services Shipston has to offer," Fay Ivens added.

### Warding off winter burglaries

Winter is well on its way and with the reduction in daylight, Shipston's Safer Neighbourhood Team has issued the following advice to help protect your property after dark.

• Use an automatic time switch on an indoor light, either in a room that cannot be peered into from the road, or upstairs. Change the timings regularly.



- Put a time switch on a radio that has been tuned to a chat station
- Ensure that gates or other accesses to the rear of the house are locked and secure and don't forget to lock your shed.
- Secure windows, paying particular attention to those on the ground floor and above flat roof areas. Keep all your keys out of sight and out of reach.
- Property-mark your valuables by using your postcode and your house number or name. If they're not suitable for marking, photograph them with a ruler in view for scale.
- Make use of your intruder alarm if you have one, or consider investing in one that is suitable for your needs.
- Join a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. For details of a local scheme, see the article on page 11 or call 101.
- Trust your instincts. If you think a crime is about to happen or is in progress dial 999.

All residents are invited to join the Service of Remembrance at St Edmund's Church, which will mark Remembrance Sunday on the 11th November 2012.

The Royal British Legion will be joined by the Scout Group, Young Fire-fighters and St John's Ambulance in a parade from the High Street to St Edmund's prior to the service. The parade, accompanied by the Town Band and civic dignitaries, will commence at 10.30, halting at the War Memorial for the laying of wreaths before entering church.



The annual Poppy Appeal to raise funds for ex servicemen and women and their dependants, will begin on the 28th October for two weeks. ### **October's hot topics**

**Dangerous Zebra:** Jackie Warner expressed concerns about the position of the Zebra crossing in Church Street. Its proximity to the gyratory means cars approach it too quickly and often don't notice it at all. Chris Saint will raise the matter with the Highways department.

**Loud and clear:** A hearing loop has now been purchased for New Clark House and will be available for use soon.

**Primary problem:** Station Road keeps flooding opposite the entrance to the Primary School. A blocked drain is the likely cause. The Town Clerk will raise the issue with Warwickshire County Council (WCC)

**No way through:** Roy Munden reported concerns that a Right of Way opposite the Honnington turn on Stratford Road is impassable. WCC will look into whether it falls within the Shipston or Tredington parish boundary but stressed that parish paths are most effectively managed when there is support from local volunteers.

**Car park blackout:** Jackie Warner alerted councillors to the faulty street lighting in the Mill Street Car Park which is currently in darkness outside daylight hours. The Town Clerk will investigate further.

**Out of date signage:** The Town Clerk will ensure out of date signs for the Harvest Fair and Stratford Food Festival are removed following a request from a member of the public.

**Luminous lines:** The white lines in the market square are due to be repainted soon, including the markings for the disabled parking space.

### **Campaigning for Shipston**

**Engaging with developers:** In line with previous approaches from developers, Shipston Town Council has agreed to meet with Banner Homes, to hear the developer's initial proposals for a site on Campden Road.

**Planner's briefing:** Peter Yates, acting planning manager at Stratford District Council has offered to visit Shipston to better understand the area (he is new to Warwickshire). Richard Cheney will meet him alongside town councillors.

**Public meeting feedback:** The Town Council would like to thank all those who attended the meeting on the 24th September, designed to find common ground between the campaign groups currently focusing on the supermarket issue (see article on page 1).

### **Town Council business**

**A second look at CCTV:** STC will invite the operators of the CCTV service to give a presentation about the service before further discussions need to be had regarding 2013/14 budget. The council is particularly keen to hear evidence from police about the impact of live 24/7 monitoring of the cameras.

**Improving New Clark House facilities:** A basic kitchenette will be installed in New Clark House to support the building's meeting room facilities. This money will come from the original amount allowed for improvements to New Clark House.

**Clark House:** Plans are progressing well for a potential long-term lease of Clark House. Further details will be announced when confirmed.

**Bus shelters:** STC will consult a specialist to find out whether bus shelters at the bottom of Telegraph Street and on Mill Street might be feasible and affordable. General Purposes working group will report back in due course.

### **New Clark House Update**

#### New contracts awarded

Shipston Town Council has awarded contracts for mowing, cemetery maintenance and street cleaning (including litter removal) to Lawns 2 Mow following a competitive tendering process.



Lawns 2 Mow won the cemetery contract initially last year, and took on other responsibilities on an interim basis a few months ago. We have received much praise for the work they have done already, and with a robust contract now in place, we look forward to maintaining those high standards.

These contracts will also deliver savings over the next three years, which will help the council to hold the precept at its present level, whilst aiding additional investment in much needed local services and charities.

#### Vandalism

A newly-planted tree on Telegraph Street has been snapped off in what we can only assume was an act of vandalism. This is the second time this has happened to a new tree in the town recently and is a real shame. Shipston Town Council has a successful track record of taking action against vandals. If you see anyone damaging public property, please report it immediately to the Safer Neighbourhood Team (see contacts on page 15) or report it to New Clark House.

#### Neighbourhood Plan

Stephen Miles has kindly agreed to lead the Neighbourhood Plan process on behalf of the Town Council. As the Forum went to press, we were in the middle of producing materials for the launch event on the 24th October. We plan to keep residents informed throughout the process via www.shipstononline.org and the Forum. Look out for a special pull-out section being planned for the Forum's January edition, with lots of information about neighbourhood planning and how you can get involved.

### Shipston Arts and Crafts Society

In September we welcomed Dr P J Crook MBE to speak of her life and work. She spoke of her need to paint from early childhood through being a student, meeting her husband and becoming a mother. She then showed her paintings on film, beginning with a view of a room filled with children ranging from baby to young adults - her two children as they grew and developed - the family through the years.

P J (as she is known) paints crowds - crowds of people such as a crowd watching a Gold Cup Race at Cheltenham Race Course on a small TV whilst the race itself ran outside. All of the racing fraternity were in the painting, from tinkers to lords. Among the pictures shown was one of lines of soldiers - heads wearing helmets denoting their country - faces all different hues and waiting to join the Gulf War was titled "A Mother's Son".

Commissioned to paint a mural for a college showing the classes they held, she painted an  $18 \times 6$  ft study of students - a dancer, a budding dress designer, mechanic, IT student and so on, all in bright acrylic colours. Her work is now sought after by collectors worldwide and is also shown in galleries in USA, Tokyo, Paris and the UK. The paintings are not to be just looked at, but should be read as they reflect all humanity of which we are part. Therefore we related to them. A unique experience and great privilege for the society.

### **Probus**

Ken Ingamells has spoken to the club several times and has a wide ranging list of travel and historical talks which result from a career as



a meteorologist. On 14th September, the talk was 'Scott of the Antarctic', describing how, by chance, in 1901, Scott became involved in an expedition to the Antarctic. It took until 1904 to organise and equip, but having set out for the South Pole, he had to turn back due to illness.

A further attempt to be the first to reach the Pole was made in 1910 but the group was beaten by Norwegian explorer, Roald Amundsen. The tragic return journey encoutered terrible weather and sickness and the party could go no further. All participants died within a few miles of a food supply that might have saved them.

On the 28th September. Hugh Davies was welcomed back to Probus. Hugh is a guide at Bletchley Park and has an expert knowledge of Enigma, the Special Operations Executive and intelligence during the war. The talk was about propoganda - white, grey and very dirty black.

Hugh's talk covered a wide range of wartime deceptions carried out by both the Allies and the Germans, including the development of a very high powered radio transmitter that was able to broadcast on a German wavelength so the listeners thought it was their own station.

### Shipston-on-Stour WI

The October Meeting of Shipston-on-Stour WI was a celebration of 90 years as a WI Branch. Shipston Branch was



formed on 20th October 1922 and has an unbroken record of active participation in the life of the town and as an important part of members' lives.

The President welcomed visiting members from other WIs and from the Warwickshire Federation. There was a delicious supper and drinks, and a display of records and documents dating from 1922. These records are a window into a forgotten world – during WW2 meetings began earlier at 6pm to save lighting and members voted to forgo their refreshments as part of the war effort!

In 1976 and 1987/88 the WI produced surveys of Shipston which capture the nature of the town at that time and it is fascinating to compare then and now. Shipston has changed physically, but many of the people remain the same!

Our gallant secretary has been keeping a diary of this 90th Birthday Year and in the future this will give historians an insight into life in a market town in the early 21st century.

Shipston WI is missing a chunk of records for the 1950s and 60s – if anyone comes across these, please get in touch.

The next meeting is the AGM on 7th Nov, 7pm. David Howe will be talking about the Edinburgh Festival.

I have now lived in the wonderful market town of Shipston-on-Stour for fifty-five years and can honestly say I would not choose to live anywhere else at this later stage in my life.

The shops of Shipston town centre have always, and will continue, to provide a range of goods and services, yet the debate [about supermarket proposals] rolls on, primarily led by the new 'Shipston Heart Alive Campaign'. I [spoke] to one of their representatives and was firmly informed that they oppose this development as it would decimate the town centre. On the same day, I had to wait a ridiculous amount of time in Shipston's (only) under-stocked and poorly maintained supermarket. #### **Speed limits**

Yes, you did hear last month that I have been promoting new speed limits on the A3400 and the B4035. I can confirm that



the Portfolio Holder approved the new restrictions on 21st September.

There will be a 40 mph speed limit around the Brailes Road recycling centre and in Fell Mill Lane and the 30 mph speed limit in London Road will be extended.

#### **Broadband roll out**

Yes, you have heard me say this before. The money is in place and it will provide superfast broadband to 90% of South Warwickshire. That is 24Mbps to 90% of premises and a minimum of 2Mbps elsewhere.

Anticipated dates have now been published. Faster facilities will be introduced from September 2013 and be completed by March 2015. That appears slow, but do not shoot the messenger.

Do you want to be in the 10% that might miss out? I suspect that the answer is NO, so keep up the local survey on line at www.cswbroadband.org.uk. This web site will provide you with a facility to measure and record your broadband speed. These measurements will help determine the priority areas for a better service. Keep measuring to ensure we do not ultimately miss out on the enhanced facilities.

#### **Bogus inspectors**

Have you heard the story about the individual who visits homes to carry out a Government compulsory loft inspection? If he calls, don't let him in, there are no such inspections. Inform the Police or WCC Trading Standards. He could be looking around preparing for a burglary.

### Top Winter Health Tips – Shipston Medical Centre

There always seems to be more illness around during winter, so take precautions to keep well. Wash your hands regularly to help prevent colds, as this kills any bugs you might have picked up. Sore throats are common in winter and are almost always caused by viral infections. Gargling with warm salty water will help sooth a sore throat as it has anti-inflammatory properties.

Asthmatics can experience worsened symptoms as the weather gets colder, so try and stay indoors on cold windy days. Use a scarf to cover your nose and mouth if you do need to go out. Make sure you take your regular inhalers and have your rescue inhaler nearby, in case it is needed.

#### Flu – symptoms and management

Flu starts with a raised temperature, fever, headache, muscle aches and chestiness. There is no cure, and the

virus has to run its course but some symptoms can be managed with paracetamol and ibuprofen (never exceed the dose stated on the packet



- watch out for cold remedies containing paracetamol).

The symptoms of flu can continue for up to two weeks, although the fever should resolve in 3 to 5 days.

#### When you should contact your GP:

- Your symptoms have got much worse, or you have developed other symptoms that are not typical of seasonal flu, such as a rash.
- · Your symptoms have lasted for longer than a week.
- You have a medical condition that is making your flu worse
