Anne Sankey celebrates Stuart Eastbury's community spirit

Community First Responder, Stuart Eastbury, has been awarded the Anne Sankey Medal for services to Shipston and local charities. At 21, Stuart is the youngest person to have been given the prestigious medal.

The medal was presented to Stuart by the Town Mayor at the September council meeting. In announcing the award, Fay Ivens praised Stuart for his enthusiasm and commitment to Community First Responders, St John's Ambulance and the Warwickshire & Northamptonshire Air Ambulance. "Stuart has shown a tremendous commitment to this community at a very young age. I'm delighted to present him with the Anne Sankey Medal and hope he will continue to play an active role in providing vital services to the residents of Shipston," she said.

The Anne Sankey Medal is awarded in recognition of voluntary work to support the town and local community. A number of nominations were received this year, providing a positive insight into the amount of generous voluntary work done by individuals in and around Shipston. Fay Ivens thanked all those who put forward nominations. She said, "on behalf of my fellow councillors, I would like to thank the other nominees, and all those who support our town, for their dedication and hard work."

Stuart Eastbury was pleased to accept the award. "This award is a real honour and I would like to thank all those who nominated me."

Neighbourhood Plan launch

The creation of a Neighbourhood Plan to guide development in Shipston is set to begin this month, with the launch meeting taking place from 4pm to 8.30pm on 24th October at the Townsend Hall.

The meeting will provide an opportunity to share information about why the Town Council has decided to develop a Neighbourhood Plan, what the process will involve, the timetable for completing it and information about how residents and local businesses can take part.

It is essential that the plan is developed in a fair and collaborative way and it will therefore be overseen by an impartial and independent steering group. The aim is to end up with a plan that is accepted as part of the Local Development Framework, giving Shipston a genuine voice in the planning process.

Town Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "planning has become an incredibly emotive issue in Shipston. This plan is not about debating specific applications – it is about reaching a collective view on what is needed for Shipston. I encourage everyone to get involved to help deliver a plan which meets the needs of the whole community."

Mencap proposes redevelopment of Stratford Road site

Learning disability charity, Mencap, has put forward proposals to redevelop and expand its existing site on the Stratford Road, in partnership with Orbit Homes.

Following a public consultation event in September, the charity intends to submit a planning application to Stratford District Council for the redevelopment of 27 – 29 Stratford Road into purpose built flats. The flats would be designed to provide a supported living environment for local people with learning disabilities, and enable existing and future residents to enjoy a high standard of ergonomically designed accommodation.

Once the planning application has been submitted, local residents will have the opportunity to view the plans submitted online at www.stratford.gov.uk and send comments on the proposals to the District Council.

This year, Shipston Town Centre will once again be lit up by the Rotary Tree of Remembrance.

The bulbs will be lit in memory and celebration of loved ones who are no longer with us. New name, bright future at Shipston Youth Club

Shipston Youth Club (formerly 'The Outhouse') was officially reopened after the summer holidays by Nadhim Zahawi MP, in the presence of volunteers, supporters and young people.

The Club is now a community-led initiative, run by a committee of volunteers. Nadhim Zahawi MP said "it's obviously unfortunate that



Shipston Youth Club lost its finding from the County Council, but its rebirth as a community run facility is a true example of the Big Society in action... It is the spirit of the staff and users which make it such an attractive place for the young people of Shipston."

The former 'Outhouse' building has been renovated to serve as an asset for Shipston High and Shipston's wider community, as well as being a base for Shipston Youth Club.

Shipston Youth Club will be offering a Juniors night on a Tuesday from 7.30pm and a Seniors night on a Wednesday Evening from 7.30pm. The club has already begun to introduce a 'Detached Youth Work Evening' when existing staff members, Katie and Shellie, walk around the town engaging with young people.

Residents urged to register on the electoral role

Residents in Shipston are being urged to safeguard their vote at election time and the forthcoming Police and Crime Commissioner elections in November by registering on the electoral roll. As well as losing the right to vote, people who do not register are committing an offence which may lead to a maximum $\mathfrak{L}1,000$ fine and/or jail term of up to six months. September's hot topics

Skate park: Wear and tear has caused some bolts to come loose at the Skate Park by the Leisure Centre. The Town Council is responsible for maintaining the facility. Arthur Ivens will investigate.

Tree trimming: The tree at the corner of Orchard Close will soon be trimmed back to improve visibility/access

Rubbish problem: Large amounts of rubbish are still being left outside the Sheldon Bosley Hub. Richard Cheney will chase up collection but the problem is being caused by some people using the area to dump household waste rather than recyclables. If anyone has any information, please report it to Richard Cheney or the Town Clerk.

A draining issue: Drains were brought up again by both councillors and members of the public. In particular, concerns were raised about drains in Stratford Road and the bottom of Darlingscote Road.

Making it clear: Jackie Warner has requested that the lines marking out the disabled space in the town centre are made clearer. Richard Cheney will look into this.

Lengthy letters: Concern was raised about the length of one resident's letter published in the September Forum. Although this was due to a lack of information being sent in by the deadline, efforts will be made to stick to shorter letters in future.

Plentiful potholes: Roy Munden raised concerns about the growing number and severity of potholes around the town. Chris Saint will find out whether resurfacing work is planned for the town and if so, when.

Campaigning for Shipston

Protecting our pavements: The Town Council will write to the manager of the Co-op after concerns were raised about lorries parking on the pavement by the Co-op delivery area on West Street. Residents are also reminded to avoid parking across pavements, particularly in the town centre.

In the dark: Shipston Town Council is very concerned about the potential impact of the planned street light switch off, due to begin in April. Councillors will look into the benefits and long term cost savings of moving to LED lighting, with a view to proposing an alternative scheme to Warwickshire County Council. In the meantime, Roy Munden requested that the white lines on the roads be repainted in the hope they will offer some direction to pedestrians and motorists on the move in the dark.

Town Council business

Planning: Decisions on planning items were delayed until 17th September after documents were received late from Stratford District Council. The Town Clerk will write to request earlier sightings of the documents in future.

Website content: Shipstononline.org is not being fully utilised by community groups and event organisers. If anyone is having problems adding events to the website, please report them to admin@shipstononline.org or contact the Town Clerk.

Hearing loop: A hearing loop system is being trialled in New Clark House. If successful, a permanent loop will be considered.

Bus shelter: General purposes will consider a proposal from a member of the public for a bus shelter on Mill Street.

Community governance review: Paul Rathkey was thanked by all councillors for considering the Community Governance Review. Shipston is operating according to best practice and therefore, no changes to the constitution are being proposed.

While contractors are hard at work on Shipston Primary's building expansion, parents are welcome to come and see how teachers are laying down strong foundations for children's learning.

Shipston Primary is rated 'Outstanding' by Ofsted, placing it among the top schools in the county. Earlier this year the school was selected by Government inspectors for a single subject inspection of English and was once again awarded the top grade in all four areas including achievement, teaching, curriculum and leadership.

Open mornings will be held throughout the week commencing 5th November. Parents of children starting school in September 2013 and other prospective parents are invited to book a slot during that week for a guided tour of the school with Head of Federation Christian Hilton. The school's annual open evening for parents and the wider community will be held later in the school year when the majority of building work is complete. The expansion programme is taking place to improve space and maximise learning opportunities for the children in school by providing larger classrooms, more school hall space, an additional outdoor learning area and new ICT suite, library and cooking area.

Shipston students excel in their GCSCs

Shipston High School students have once again excelled in their GCSE examinations with 74% of the year group achieving 5 or more passes at grades A* to C. Overall, the school achieved another record number of students achieving the highest grades. In the two 'core' subjects taken by the entire year group, Mathematics and English Literature, 30% and 36% of the grades respectively were at A* or A.

Particularly pleasing was the results of the school's 'Aim Higher' group which consists of the school's most academically gifted students. These students achieved a 100% pass rate in all their GCSEs including English and Mathematics with 75% of their grades being at A* or A, thus showing that these students at Shipston High School do as well as students in the top schools anywhere.

Headteacher, Jonathan Baker, said, 'The students concerned were a brilliant year group to work with and they deserve to be congratulated on their fantastic and well-deserved success.'

New academy for Shipston

Shipston High School has received confirmation from the Secretary of State for Education that it has been granted approval to become an academy from 1st September 2012. This means the school will now be independent from the Local Authority and will have a number of new freedoms to enable it to take more control over its future.

The school is not anticipating making any immediate alterations in the way it is run or in the name of the school. It is also committed to retaining its very special, small-scale, student-centred ethos. Its main priority initially will be to



use its greater autonomy to continue the improvements it has been making and to push for capital funding to develop the school buildings.


The school looks forward to using this new status and the opportunities it will provide to ensure it continues to provide all its students with a first-class education.





Clubs, societies and charities

Voluntary Action Stratford-on-Avon District

VASA is the lead organisation for the Voluntary and Community Sector in Stratford-on- Avon District.

VASA supports groups to recruit and manage volunteers, as well as offering them assistance in looking for funding and with issues such as governance, management, policies and procedures. The organisation also delivers services directly to members of the public.

Volunteer Transport Service

A dedicated office in Shipston coordinates VASA's Volunteer Transport Service, which helps people with a genuine need to attend essential health appointments. The transport service has been going for over 30 years and is much appreciated by clients.

VASA has approximately 51 volunteer drivers helping in the Shipston area. In the last financial year, these caring and patient volunteer drivers completed 4,332 trips from the Shipston area.

Where possible, volunteer drivers are recruited in each village to minimise the cost to clients (45p per mile from driver's home). More drivers are always needed, even if they can help on an occasional basis for holiday cover.

The Shipston Office is based at the Medical Centre in Badger's Crescent. It is staffed entirely by excellent dedicated volunteers who cover the office Monday to Friday 10am to 12.30pm. Any urgent calls out of hours are referred

to the Stratford Office.

Dementia Resource Café

On 7th September, members of the Alzheimer's Society Dementia Resource Café were extremely grateful to be able to put their questions to Dr Sue Pritchard during her presentation on the medical aspects of dementia. With prevention always being better than cure Dr Pritchard confirmed that "What is good for the heart is good for the brain", ie a sensible diet together with keeping active physically, mentally and socially.

As with any illness, an early diagnosis is beneficial as it gives time to sort out important matters such as a Lasting Power of Attorney and Will before mental capacity deteriorates. Following a diagnosis of dementia and appropriate medication from a consultant, GPs will assist patients and their carers by referring them to appropriate sources of support. One of these will be the Books on Prescription service and it was good to hear that Shipston library will be taking stock of new books related to dementia at the end of September.

The next meeting is at 2pm, 5th October at Stour Court, when we will be talking about and experiencing the benefits of massage for those who have dementia and their carers.

Neighbourhood Plan Launch Meeting – 24th October 2012, 4pm – 8.30pm

The aim of the Neighbourhood Plan is to show how the town can and should evolve over the next 10-15 years to best meet the needs of the community. Residents, local organisations and businesses are invited to channel their ideas, opinions and information into this rigorous process.

In line with the regulations and guidance, the plan will be independently examined to check it has been prepared rigorously and fairly, and that proposals are based on sound evidence and analysis. That status will ensure that the Neighbourhood Plan is formally taken into account when planning applications are considered; and future plans related to the Core Strategy come forward such as the Site Allocations development plan document (which identifies where future development may take place).

The Neighbourhood Plan is expected to take approximately 12 months to complete and adopt.

The launch event will outline how a Neighbourhood Plan can be produced and the Town Council's role in managing and funding the process. The process will be open and collaborative, and will involve several community workshops to explore what really matters locally. No doubt there will be some lively discussions.

The launch event will get straight into what people think are the good, and less good, features of Shipston. Current and future housing, local economy, education, leisure, healthcare, transport, facilities and services will all be considered during the plan-making process.

Further information will be published around the town and online at www.shipstononline.org. We hope as many people as possible will get involved.

It seems more and more that this council is working with un-elected groups that seek to model the town around their own political and social agenda.

This has not been more apparent than when the former Mayor, Paul Rathkey, chose to chair a number of their meetings and dismissed the views of the greater populous. If Shipston Town Council is to carry on in this manner it is time that their intentions were bought into question and they have the courage of their conviction to explain why they are happy to work in hand in hand with the opponents of any new development.

As a long time resident of Shipston I do have serious concerns, as should all hard working families within the town, especially the younger generation as it is their future the council seem happy to dismiss.

Town Council response: The Town Council has arranged a meeting on 24.9.12 for all campaign groups to discuss issues and find common ground.

Letter from James Law

I read with interest Jonathan Gullis' "District Council Update" in the Shipston Forum, particularly the item on the land west of Hornsby Close. I quote "housing we did not need as it would have gone onto Greenfield Land" and "more importantly, it would have been built outside of the town boundary setting precedent for future applications".

He didn't make these comments at the Committee Meeting to consider the Planning Application for housing on the field north of River Way. This field was both Greenfield Land and outside the town boundary! Indeed, he didn't even turn up for the meeting! The application, which was enthusiastically supported by the District Council officers, was approved by 5 votes to 3, with both of Shipston's Councillors absent from the meeting.

He and others, don't seem to understand that the River Way decision has already set the precedent that Greenfield land outside the Shipston town boundary can now be approved for development.

District Council update

At a recent District Council meeting it was announced that the date for finally signing off the Core Strategy has been delayed once again. The process is not likely to be completed until autumn 2013. The Core Strategy will provide a locally relevant planning policy, meanwhile the



planners have to rely on old policies that comply with the Government's planning policy, known as the NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework).

I am concerned that there may be very little defence against the plans that developers have for large housing estates and out of town retail stores. This will have an impact on everybody in the District.

Following the Draft Core Strategy consultation exercise which took place last March (the responses can be read on the District Council web site), the officers are now preparing the final draft which should go out for a 6 week consultation in December and January. The policy document should then be presented to a Planning Inspector in March 2013. The Inspectors comments will be taken note of before the Core Strategy can be finally signed off. This should be in autumn next year.

Meanwhile, I understand that the planning application off the Campden Road for a 2,500 sq. metre supermarket, 130 Extra Care houses, 50 market houses and a petrol station is likely to go to planning committee in October or November. I am still maintaining my objection to this developer-led proposal.




