#### Shipston makes progress in becoming more Dementia Friendly

Following the launch of a 'dementia-friendly town' campaign some months ago, Shipston Town Council has been working in partnership with the medical centre, local charities, community groups and businesses to help make Shipston more dementia-friendly.

Since launching the campaign, workshops have been held with local businesses to improve awareness and understanding of dementia symptoms, as well as providing advice on how to support those with dementia and their carers. Several customer-facing businesses in the town now have staff who, having attended these workshops, are extremely sensitive towards the needs of customers who might be a little confused. Did you know, for example, that a black rubber mat at the entrance to a shop might appear to some as a 'black pool'? Or that the demarcation between adjacent objects or furnishings (such as a bannister and wall) should be clear to those who may have difficulty distinguishing them?

This knowledge-building activity is building on the fantastic work done by local charities and community groups in recent years which has ensured Shipston is not short of enjoyable and well-planned activities for people with dementia and their

#### Councillors get to grips with CCTV

Shipston Town Councillors have taken the opportunity to hear in detail about the benefits of CCTV footage in supporting local policing. Following a briefing from Stratford District Council officers and the local police force, councillors now have a more detailed understanding of the role the cameras have played in deterring crime and catching criminals.

Shipston benefits from a number of cameras which rotate fully giving a detailed picture of large areas of the town. All cameras record footage 24 hours a day, seven days a week and are regularly used to support police work. CCTV played a key role in apprehending thieves who stole a



cashpoint card outside Co-Op some months ago, and the automatic number plate recognition software helps police track suspicious vehicles.

As part of the briefing, there was a detailed discussion about whether the town council should put in additional funding to pay for additional live monitoring of the cameras in Shipston, which would ensure they were actively monitored 24 hours a day rather than 16. Although some evidence was provided to reassure councillors that live monitoring has helped prevent criminal activity, many councillors remained reticent to agree additional funding to extend the existing

No formal proposal was brought to the meeting but the additional funding decision is likely to be reviewed within the next 12 months.

#### Concerned about flooding? Get involved in reducing the risks

SAFAG (Shipston Area Flood Action Group) is developing plans to help minimise flood risk to the town and downstream villages and needs your

The group works directly with external bodies such as the Environment Agency and water authorities and has already been instrumental in getting drains and culverts around the town cleared and repaired.



The team, chaired by Phil Wragg, is currently made up of just eight volunteers, representing Shipston, Tredington and Newbold. With a growing workload, the team is really keen to welcome more volunteers.

SAFAG meets every 6 weeks at The George for about an hour and a half. There are also quarterly meetings with The Environment Agency and other agencies as well as occasional fieldwork. If you are interested in taking an active role in the group, please contact Phil Wragg on 01608 662922.

#### August's hot topics

**Noticeboard niceties:** Concerns have been raised about the town's public noticeboard which is becoming overcrowded with posters, including those advertising non Shipston events. Jackie Warner will now monitor the board on a weekly basis and remove any posters which are out of date or not appropriate for the board.

**Portobello promotion:** Marianne Westwood has continued to raise the profile of the campaign to improve safety at the Portobello Road junction. A recent interview about the issue was aired on Touch FM.

**Medical centre progress:** Brian Cooper informed councillors that Shipston Medical Centre is still in negotiations with ASL regarding the terms around the land potentially provided for a new centre on the Campden Road. The medical centre team is also working on a funding bid which is due to be put to NHS England next year.

**Event success:** Jackie Warner led the congratulations to all those involved in both X-Fest and the Fish n Frolics Festival weekend.

**Pointless pole:** Chris Saint has promised to look into whether an unused pole, presumably originally designed for a road sign, can be removed at the end of Badger's Crescent.

**Green Lane closure:** Green Lane is due to be closed for a short period from the 7th September to enable gas works to take place.

#### Campaigning for Shipston

**Town centre layout:** Following the submission of proposals for a one-way system for the town centre from a member of the public, councillors agreed to pass the information on to the Neighbourhood Plan team for consideration alongside other proposals.

Core strategy consultation: Shipston Town Council will prepare a response to the Stratford District Council Core Strategy Consultation, considering not only the housing numbers included but looking at the impact on infrastructure of the existing number of houses already approved for Shipston, which exceeds the number included in the draft plan.

#### **Town Council business**

**Neighbourhood Plan:** Good progress is being made on the options for the plan. For more information, please see page 14.

Adopting open spaces: Councillors have agreed that the decision to adopt new open spaces will be taken on a case-by-case basis. Many of these open spaces are included in new developments and can result in ongoing maintenance costs for play equipment. Councillors also discussed a desire to identify opportunities, where possible, for larger, more central open spaces for the community to enjoy.



#### **Proud of My Town**

#### **Shipston Fallen**

#### R/9744 Rifleman RICHARD PERCY HADDON

Dick was born on 17th April 1895 the only son of Ellen Haddon, who came originally from Tysoe. On the 30th May, Dick was baptised at St Edmunds and is recorded as living in the Shipston Workhouse. The 1901 census notes that Ellen was working as a Domestic Servant and that both she and Dick were residents of Shipston-on-Stour Union Workhouse. Ellen later went on to marry Mr Hemmings.

On the 1st July 1902 Dick moved up from the Infants School to the Boys School and left, nearly seven years later, at the age of thirteen on the 5th February 1909.

Richard enlisted in Stratford upon Avon and joined the 9th (Service) Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps who were already in France. Richard arrived in France on the 16th June 1915 as part of a draft of men who replaced men killed and wounded in a battle at Bellewaarde.

On the 25th September 1915 the Battle of Loos commenced. This was the original 'Big Push' and involved six divisions. In addition to the main thrust of the attack, three diversionary attacks were also launched in an attempt to tie up German reserves and stop them being deployed in the area of the main attack. The 9th KRRC were to attack in a diversionary action called the Second Attack of Bellewaarde, near Ypres. This was the Battalion's second visit to Bellewaarde and they suffered far worse this time.

From a letter sent to his mother, it appears that Richard was killed before the diversionary attack was launched on the 25th September and had been buried. Although he was buried, the location of his grave was lost in subsequent battles, and his name is therefore recorded on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium. In Shipston he is remembered on the Town and both of the School Memorials.



#### **Shipston Arts and Crafts Society**

At its July meeting the Shipston Arts and Crafts Society heard Linda Farrar speak on 'Late Roman Mosaics' with a focus on early Christian mosaics.

The images used on early Christian mosaics had much in common with those used in the long tradition of mosaic production throughout the Roman Empire in centuries before Constantine proclaimed the empire to be a Christian one in 323. Images included vines, fruit and sheep, all of which easily adapt to new meanings in Christianity. There are also new, specifically Christian, symbols such as the Chi-Rho, the first letters of Christ's name in Greek. This is present in the mosaic from Hinton St Mary, Devon.

After 427, when the Emperor Theodosius forbade letting people walk on sacred images, wall and ceiling mosaics were used to tell Christian stories. They were the bible of the poor. An apse would be highly decorated with a scene showing Christ in glory. Among the mosaics shown were ones from Rome, Ravenna, Constantinople, and Antioch.

Mike is a cancer victim. He was diagnosed with Non Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2000 aged 37. As a triathlete and cyclist his reaction was to take the cancer head on by staying fit no matter what. Despite the cancer advancing, Mike continued to exercise and even climbed up the infamous challenge of Alpe D'Huez after three cycles of chemotherapy! In November 2005 after 10 days of continuous chemotherapy, and a bone marrow transplant at the QE, Birmingham, he had the idea of Cyclists Fighting Cancer.

CFC now donates bikes, specially adapted trikes and tandems to children and young people affected by cancer. What better way to encourage kids and teenagers to get active after what can be years of treatment and hospitalisation? Something as simple as a bike really does change their lives far more than Mike ever anticipated at the start.

Mike is an inspiration and his talk held us spellbound.

Although many of the old mining towns have disappeared, there is still a very active industry around Kalgoorlie with a huge pit mine which is the biggest in Australia.

The volunteer group have been discussing how to draft these policies, and further input and comment on these will be needed.

#### **District Council update**

#### Local Plan - Core Strategy

A new public consultation is now underway with a closing date for responses at 5pm on Friday 25th September 2015.

Views are invited, not on the entire Core Strategy, but on the additional work undertaken by the Council since the interim report by the planning inspector in March, earlier

this year. Once the consultation responses have been analysed, we should be in a position to assess any final modifications and progress towards adoption of the Plan.

This consultation is focused on housing issues, how many and where they go. The principal change is a 20 year target of 14,480 new dwellings. This is substantial rise and many other districts have needed to accommodate similar changes. A number of strategic development sites have been identified, in addition to those previously in the public domain.

Representations can now be made to Stratford District Council on updated Core Strategy Policies CS.15, CS.16 and CS.17 together with those Strategic sites that could provide the bulk of the new housing. Shipston-on-Stour is not identified for any further major housing development.

A copy of the proposals is in Shipston Library and everything is available on-line. There is an official response form and we look forward to your comments. Please stick to the topics in hand. Much of the Core Strategy was adopted on an interim basis in June. Comments on those wider issues are most likely to be discarded.

#### **Devolution**

Like Warwickshire County Council, we are keeping a close eye on developments and have a special Council meeting on 1st September to debate the West Midlands Combined Authority.
