# Shipston's Woolly Wonderland

Shipston is once again gearing up for the annual Wool Fair which takes place on Bank Holiday Monday, 27th May from 10am to 4pm.

The Shipston Wool Fair is a great day out for all the family, celebrating the town's heritage together with everything Shipston has to offer today.

The highlight of the fair, as always, is the real life exhibition of sheep including many rare breeds and 'celebrity' sheep. Brought to the fair with long coats, they will leave after being shorn in front of a captive audience, led by shearer Alan Scorer.

A 'Wool Process' marquee will show the evolution of the product from fleece through spinning, weaving, knitting and felting. The Stratford upon Avon Guild of Weavers, Spinners and Dyers will be on hand with their support and craft demonstrations showing the many applications of wool, and there will be knitting tuition for all ages! Large screen entertainment will be a new addition this year, showing marvellous sheep dog demonstrations, filmed especially for the Wool Fair.

Throughout the day, there will be an abundance of games for children of all ages in the High Street, all manned by volunteers from Shipston Young Farmers. In addition, the very best of local entertainment will be on offer, with a musical and dancing line up that is sure to satisfy all tastes.

An extensive variety of stalls is set to fill the High Street, selling local crafts, food and drink, not to mention all manner of wondrous woolly items. Hook Norton brewery will be running a promotion and bringing along their heavy horses and dray to add to the attractions.

There will also be an opportunity to see the progress that has been made with the Shipston Tapestry project, as well as add your own threads to the work.

Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "Shipston Wool Fair is a wonderful showcase of Shipston past and present. It is a great chance for visitors and residents alike to enjoy the entertainment, displays and stalls, as well as shopping at the many independent retailers that Shipston is proud to offer."

Activities begin with the opening ceremony led by Claire Bowry of the Rare Breeds Survival Trust and Hook Norton Brewery. It's sure to be a fantastic day!

### Part-night streetlight petition gathers pace

A growing number of people are continuing to sign the town council's petition requesting a rethink on Warwickshire County Council's new part night streetlighting policy.

Since 1st April 2013, many of Shipston's streetlights have been switched off between 12:00-5:30am on Sundays to Thursdays and 1:00-6:30am on Fridays and Saturdays. The move has been introduced to save money and reduce carbon emissions. However, many are concerned about the impact on safety of pedestrians and possible increases in crime.



Town councillor, Melanie Trapp, has set up an open group on Facebook called 'No lighty no likey' which has over 300 members and has attracted a number of comments about the new policy.

Mayor, Fay Ivens, said "As a town council, we strongly oppose both the policy itself and the inconsistent way it has been applied. If residents share our view, please sign the petition which is available at New Clark House".

Warwickshire County Council estimates that £500,000 will be saved across the county by the reduction in street lighting, with a reduction in carbon emissions of approximately 3,000 tonnes.

### Shipstononline gets a facelift

The town council's website, www.shipstononline.org, has had a makeover designed to make it easier to use. Following the award of the website contract to Redwax, the online calendar has been completely overhauled and is now bursting with up to date information. Agendas, meeting notes and online copies of the Forum are also up to date and easily accessible.

In introducing the new system, the town council has taken on responsibility for updating the news content, while the majority of the calendar entries will be added by the Shipston Forum team, meaning local organisations only have to inform the council once for their information to be added to both outlets (space permitting). ### Shipston welcomes launch of University of the Third Age

The Shipston & District Launch Meeting was attended by well over 100 people who overwhelmingly voted to set up a U3A in Shipston and District. A Steering Committee has been formed from volunteers to take the launch forward. This committee will remain in office until the first Annual General Meeting in approximately one year's time.

A follow-up Inaugural Meeting is to be held on the 21st May in the Townsend Hall at 2:00pm. At this meeting, all prospective members will be able to formally register and join any Interest Groups that have been set up. There will be scope for discussion of future groups and activities, to determine the way forward for Shipston & District U3A over the next year.

Launch coordinator, Geoff Olsson, said "We are delighted to be able to add Shipston and District U3A to the already extensive list of activity and interest groups in Shipston. With the combined enthusiasm of the Steering Committee, supported by our members, we feel sure the club will have a successful future."

### April's hot topics

**A job well done:** All councillors thanked Fay Ivens for her hard work as Mayor and congratulated her on raising £1,000 for local charities.

**Persistent potholes:** Councillors have completed their pothole surveys and all the information has now been submitted to the Highways Department. Concerns were raised over ongoing delays to the repair of a pothole in Station Road, particularly when another was repaired right next to it in the meantime.

**Town Design Statement:** The town design statement work, which began last year, is reaching a conclusion, with a report due to be submitted to the council in early summer. The findings will feed into the Neighbourhood Plan.

**A marathon effort:** Philip Vial led congratulations to Melanie Trapp for completing a half marathon in aid of the British Heart Foundation.

**Big blockages:** Ian Cooper circulated photographs of some of the worst blocked drains in Shipston. Chris Saint will look into the matter with the Highways Department.

**Kerb creep:** Concerns were raised about the new kerb installed at the top of Sheep Street. It has been built out too far and is likely to cause more issues rather than alleviate the initial problem of large vehicles not being able to pass along the street without damaging parked cars.

**A lighter path:** Mrs Merrigan (member of the public) expressed concern about the inadequate lights on the driveway leading to the Catholic Church hall. Although the road is privately owned, Shipston Town Council will write to the Catholic Church to request the lighting be improved.

### **Campaigning for Shipston**

**Turbine Blading follow-up:** District and town councillors and community representatives, attended a second meeting with Turbine Blading regarding the planned closure. A reduced level of work will continue on the site until the end of the year. The business is unlikely to be sold as a going concern and there are no firm plans for the land but the town council will be kept informed of developments.

**Operation footfall:** Money has been awarded by Warwickshire County Council to support the Shipston Loyalty Card scheme. However, the town council's bid for funding to pay for a town centre manager was not successful. Ronnie Murphy led the thanks to lan Cooper for putting time and effort into a strong bid and all councillors expressed frustration at not being awarded funding.

**Streetlight switch off:** Numerous concerns were raised, both about the part night streetlighting policy and about inexplicable differences in which areas are and aren't lit throughout the night. Melanie Trapp will raise specific concerns with Warwickshire County Council (WCC) where the policy is not being applied correctly. Meanwhile, the town council's campaign to switch the lights back on continues and Stratford has expressed interest in joining forces to present a combined petition to WCC (see article on page 2).

**Invisible lines:** Jackie Warner and Mark Wildish have received complaints about the poor state of white lining across the town.

**Neighbourhood plan:** The official green light to proceed with the Neighbourhood Plan has been received from the district council. A communications plan has been drawn up and community engagement activities will now begin in earnest (see update on page 14).

### **Town** Council business

**Education charity trustees:** Town councillors confirmed the appointment of Mr Little and Mr Taylor as trustees of the Education Charity for a further four years.

**Shipstononline contract:** The website contract has been awarded to local company, Redwax. The contractor will be responsible for design and web hosting, with the town council providing content for the site (see news article on page 2).

### National figures back Shipston Primary's Culture Week

Shipston Primary School has ignited the imagination of local children and national figures alike, through a special cultural week.

In a letter from 10 Downing Street, the school was told that as a child Prime Minister David Cameron enjoyed the book 'Our Island Story' by Henrietta Elizabeth Marshall and the poem 'The Dong with a Luminous Nose' by Edward Lear.

The week was the brainchild of Head of Federation Christian Hilton and class teacher and musician Jono Wright who wanted to give each year group the chance to discover seven cultural wonders. As well as appealing locally to children, parents and school governors for their ideas, Mr Wright contacted local and national celebrities.

Song suggestions poured in from the likes of guitarist Robbie McIntosh of The Pretenders, Sir Geoff Hurst suggested children should watch the 1966 World Cup final and Michael Morpurgo, former Children's Laureate and author of War Horse, described the week as a 'great project'.

Activities included reception children reading the Tiger who Came to Tea and discovering Henri Rousseau's artwork, Tiger in a Tropical Storm. Year 2 watched excerpts from the Lion King – a favourite of England Cricketer Chris Woakes - and read Where The Wild Thinas Are. recommended to the school Ragdoll by Productions and local artist, Alan Parry. Year sang 'All 1 Bright things and Beautiful', Year 6 sang



John Lennon's 'Imagine' and Years 3, 4 and 5 sang Beatles songs.

Head of Federation Christian Hilton said: "We are grateful to everyone who took the time to share their ideas for Super Seven Week. The teachers have been extremely creative with their planning and the quality of teaching and learning has been outstanding."

### School building project

Unfortunately, the High School's bid for  $\pounds$ 1.4 million to the Education Funding Agency to fund the new Phase 1 teaching block was unsuccessful. The EFA received bids which vastly exceeded the  $\pounds$ 325 million available. Whilst this news is hugely disappointing, the project is still being pursued and the school is already applying for a different source of funding, as well as following up contacts and attending meetings to try to turn its vision into reality.

The Phase 2 Community Sports Project is still very much to the fore. The report below shows how the school's activities would be enriched by the addition of appropriate sports facilities.

#### **Physical education at Shipston High**

Extra curricular sports activities are a very significant part of life in the PE department and every effort is made to give students the opportunity to participate in sport. The range of sports on offer at the High School is extensive, including winter sports trips such as skiing and snowboarding.

Central to the Department is the GCSE Physical Education course. Year 11 students are well into final preparations for the summer exam. They have completed their coursework and practical moderation and are taking part in a structured programme of revision sessions in preparation for the written examination in June.

Year 10 students have been working through the concept of

diet and how this impacts on sporting performance. Students were given the assignment of creating a pre or post match meal for a specific performer, preparing an effective



menu for the performer and then cooking their suggested meals. All the groups produced effective meals that would have benefited their performer. However, there could only be one set of winners and this went to the group who cooked a post event meal for a 100 metre sprinter.

The winners, Naomi Parker, Hattie Baxter, Louis Jelf and Jim Smith cooked a fantastic Potato and Leek Soup, packed with carbohydrate to replenish energy stores, followed by a really tasty and filling Parma ham and stuffed chicken dish accompanied with whole grain rice, wholemeal bread and roasted vegetables to aid muscle repair and replenish

essential vitamins and minerals lost during performance. This all goes to show that there is much more to sport than purely the physical side!


### Growing every year





At our March meeting we were entertained by Dick Burge, one of the

Curators of Shipston Museum. He had a wonderful collection of slides, one of which was a drawing showing the layout of the town in the 18th century and photographs back to the late 1890s. What a busy

commercial place it was well into the 1960s.

Prior to the arrival of the train for passengers and freight, there was a horse-drawn tram which went to Stratford, a Brewery which had to be closed because of a shortage of water and both a gas company and an electric generating plant. A motor car showroom and a cinema opened in 1913 to "provide entertainment for the young people and to "keep them off the streets". There was even a work house.

One lovely slide of the High Street was taken before the first world war of "The Royal Horse Artillery", guns and horses apparently stopping for refreshments en route from Coventry to Oxford for manoeuvres.

For our longstanding residents of Shipston, nostalgia, and for the many "incomers", amazement that our town has had so many changes, both in size and employment opportunities.



### Readers' Letters

### Letter from James Law

Shipston Town Council held their monthly general meeting on 11th March 2013. The Agenda included the planning application for the proposed development on Stratford Road adjacent to River Way. Several residents of River Way attended the meeting and voiced their objections, which were:

- 1 The Councillors appeared to be under the impression that the proposed site was "within the boundary of Shipston". Even the original application clearly states that "the land is outside the built up area of Shipston".
- 2 The layout plan showed the houses fronting the river had been repositioned up to 10 metres nearer the river. Furthermore, a decking terrace had been added to the riverside of these houses so that the residents of the new houses will have a grandstand view over the River Way gardens.
- 3 The footpath shown on the plans runs along the River Way boundary, and if used to the extent anticipated by the application will become a continuing nuisance to River Way residents.

The Councillors were not inclined to reconsider any matter in respect of this planning application. The reason soon became clear, as apparently the Council had already sent their approval to SDC!

Furthermore, the Applicant was present at the meeting and was allowed to speak, even though he is a resident in the Brailes parish and NOT Shipston. Surely this was totally improper and contrary to standard procedure.

The Council's consideration of this Application requires the detailed scrutiny of the appropriate committee of the Stratford District Council.

### **Shipston Medical Centre**

### **Bobby the Cat**

Bobby the cat, who belongs to a neighbour, can often be seen in and around the Medical Centre. The automatic doors mean he can sneak in without any assistance, and the attention he receives from patients ensures he continues to visit.

Whilst we appreciate that many of our patients enjoy Bobby's company, and find his presence soothing, many other patients dislike cats, or are allergic to them, which can make a visit to the GP surgery more stressful than it might otherwise be. Bobby's presence was the greatest cause of concern from patients in our recent patient survey.

We therefore ask all our patients to help us prevent any distress or harm to visitors to the Medical Centre that may occur as a result of Bobby's presence. We have already tried a number of methods to prevent Bobby entering the premises, such as strategic placement



of plants that cats are supposed to dislike, use of a formulated spray to deter Bobby and staff members moving him outside the building when their workload allows them to do so. Please assist us in our efforts by not petting Bobby and taking him out of the building when he comes in. A clinical environment really isn't the right place for pets.
